FROM THE DESK OF THE CEO

A warm welcome to all our visitors, it is great to see the town alive and busy with a number of projects on the go.

Firstly on a sad note, there have been some unfortunate incidences where local residents have lost their dogs to baits recently. While the Shire of Cue is not involved in baiting programs it serves as a reminder that baiting is taking place in the district, so please be vigilant with your pets and take precautions to avoid our domesticated friends from exposure to something that is aimed at our feral problem.

Resurfacing works through the main street of town have been delayed but are now expected to start in mid to late June, depending on the weather. Works are expected to take several weeks to complete with traffic restricted to one lane and traffic control in place.

Sealing works on the Berigarra Cue Road are expected to be undertaken before the end of the financial year but again this depends on how much rain we receive over the coming week.

During periods of wet weather, it is highly likely that the Shire's roads will be closed to all but essential traffic. This action is taken to minimise potential damage to the road surface in order to keep the road as safe as possible. For information on road conditions please contact the Shire or check the notices on the office window or our website.

It is great to see the way they have transformed some of our disused buildings into screen sets. Former Resident Turn's 100!



Fortunately her Grandfather, Joe Bowes offered her a job in the office of the Murchison Club Hotel in Cue. She did everything that was required, including polishing the silver for the dining

She said the silverware, including cutlery, sugar bowls, salt and pepper shakers and bread bowls had to be shining as to see your face in it. White starched tablecloths and serviettes were part of the establishment as well, and Glad enjoyed folding the serviettes into certain designs, mainly Kings Crowns. She would go and pick wild tobacco plant leaves to put in the fruit bowls to be placed on the table. Again her forte in display and design came to the fore and she always said the Dining Room looked so beautiful, in a mining town where dust was difficult to keep out.

Glad previously had very good memories of U.S. President Hoover coming to Cue. She remembers when the train got in at midnight in Cue. The travellers would go to the rooms, the keys left in the doors, leaving early the next morning and putting the money in a honesty box.

She enjoyed a social life in Cue going to dances, pictures, etc. When the football teams from Meekatharra and Mt. Magnet came to town, they would eat in the dining room and she would have to collect the money at the door. When the Pastoralists came to town for either the races or meetings, they would use the hotel and that was a very busy time. She enjoyed her time in Cue, would sometimes play the piano quietly in the hotel and her Grandfather would ask her to play one particular piece. When she turned 21 he gave her the piano, and it is still in the family now.

Her eye for detail and perfection was well known, with her ability in dressmaking and cake decorating .Glad was self-taught and came about after she was married, especially the cake decorating. It was hard to figure out how many dresses, mainly ball and wedding gowns she made, but many of her nieces relay fond stories of her sitting at

Born on the 14th May 1918 Glad Keeffe (nee Olsen) celebrated her 100th birthday, surrounded by family and friends in the David Buttfield Aged Care Centre in Gwelup where she resides.

Glad's grandparents owned the Murchison Club Hotel in Cue and her mother travelled to Cue to give birth to Glad. She was born in the family cottage to the rear of the hotel, which until recently was used as the staff accommodation. Glad was educated at Mullewa State School, and has fond memories of school. She did win a Scholarship for further education but her parents could not afford the ongoing costs. She then went to the Convent in Mullewa to learn Book-keeping and worked at the Drapery store, Molsters. As well as working in the store she also did the book-keeping. Glad enjoyed window dressing of the store and during certain social events, fashion played a big part, and she got a lot of pleasure out of doing the window displays. Glad worked here from when she was fifteen for about a year, but the shop became bankrupt.

her treadle sewing machine, peddling away. Some ladies have told me when it came to social events like the Mullewa Show, they would all want to see what she would wear, as she was always dressed so elegantly. She would also have made new dresses for her daughters. She had a passion for sewing and never required a pattern and many gowns were very elaborate. The only time she charged was to alter a gentleman's suit, and she later regretted charging, but was a very difficult job. She did a smocked child's dress, which she sold to Mrs Molster, who then sold it in the store.

With her cake decorating, she designed many styles, keeping up with the fashion, mainly what she would see in magazines. Once again how many she decorated is unaccountable, be it 21st, wedding, Christening, Anniversary and many others cakes. I don't think she could even put a sponge cake on the table, without making it look just too good to eat.

Her ability didn't stop there, extending her crafts to knitting, crochet, tapestry, patchwork, embroidery, etc. When she came to Perth, she entered a tapestry in the Royal Show and received a highly recommended prize. She knitted baby clothes voluntarily for premature babies for King Edward Hospital. She also knitted Teddy Bears for an organization called Jacob and his coat of many colours. These Teddy Bears went to orphans overseas, and little did these children know they were receiving a work of art, as she dressed them in knitted clothes as well, even knitting ear rings and necklaces, and were just delightful. She was still making gowns in her 80's as well as decorating cakes.

She was also a very good cook, known for her scones, and always tried different recipes from other countries. During school holidays, her daughter Rhonda would bring home two Malaysian girls for holidays, they became part of the family and I think this influenced her, as she made some of the food they were accustomed too.

Glad married a local farmer Tom Keeffe, they had four children, Ray, Phil, Lynette and Rhonda. She adapted to farm life, stating that Tom was a better cook than she, as she had only made bread up until the time she married. But she adapted to farm life and her dedication to Tom. Tom being a very good sportsman, playing football and cricket was the main occupation of a weekend and she supported him in every possible way. Also on the farm, with her ability to drive in this period, was very beneficial. She was a keen gardener, but it was very difficult, living on a hill with rocky soil and salty water. Once she got Tom to dynamite a section of her garden, so as to have roses, but the water was always a problem, thus the roses didn't survive.

They later came to Perth to live, she never forgot Mullewa or Cue, cherishing her times there and the lifestyle that she considered herself fortunate to have.

Glad was very independent, caring for Tom, later with Alzheimer's, for a long period, until such time, where he went into an aged care home. She drove until she was 85.

Unfortunately the memory is no longer there, but she gave us the chance of hearing so often her life, which we are thankful for.

Glad quoted "that life goes on, be it good or bad, but family is my life so I think of myself as being fortunate".

We as a family are the fortunate ones, to have her in our life. We wish Mum a very Happy Birthday on her 100th Year. Lyn Freeman (Daughter of Glad).

Both the Shire of Cue and The Murchison Club Hotel sent Glad bunches of flowers to wish her a very happy 100th birthday.

Local artists selected for new cancer hostel

Five local artists have been selected to provide artwork at the new Midwest Cancer Hostel. The artwork comprises paintings and photographic canvases which will adorn the walls of the hostel as well as screening to separate the onsite car park and communal garden areas.


The \$1.38 million Midwest Cancer Hostel is on track for completion next month and will include seven double rooms providing accommodation for cancer patients and their carers from outlying remote communities, to enable access to cancer treatment and/or specialist cancer services closer to home.

The hostel is being constructed by the WA Country Health Service as part of funding totalling \$5.48 million provided by the Australian Government's Health and Hospitals Fund (HHF) which included \$4.1 million for the Midwest Cancer Centre that opened in November 2016.

Pictured below is an example of the screening which depicts the unique Australian native fruit – the quandong. (Acknowledge: Ms Rose Holdaway)

Quandongs were once prolific in the Geraldton area including behind the Geraldton Health Campus. Quandongs were used as both a food source and medicinal aid for local Yamatji people in times past. The ripe, red quandong fruits would be eaten raw or dried for later use. Some local families still gather quandongs for jam making.

The artists selected are: Janeen Horne, Rachel Weaver, Rose Holdaway, Andrew Binsiar and Graeme Gibbons.
