During his time away, Rob has also attended the Australian Local Government Association National General Assembly in Canberra along with the Shire President and Deputy Shire President. The conference was well represented by the Murchison region with attendees from Cue, Mt Magnet and Yalgoo. Delegates heard from a range of speakers and voted on motions submitted from Councils across Australia on matters of federal significance including financial assistance grants, transport, health, education, drought, communications, gambling, waste and the environment. Murchison delegates also attended a series of meetings with Federal Ministers at Parliament House concerning issues directly affecting the Murchison region. Rob is expected to be back in the office from Monday 15 July.

The market day held on Sunday 26 May had a great turn out, with an increase in stall holders and patrons. The next markets will be held on Sunday 30 June from 10.00am, with more market stalls booked for this growing event. It is hoped that the growing numbers will continue with future market days.

Social bowls is receiving a good turn out on Sunday afternoons and anybody interested in joining in is welcome to attend. The bowling green is situated adjacent to the Shire Hall. Players meet at 1.00pm for a 1.30pm start and play winds up around 5.00pm. BYO drinks and snacks.

Community groups and emergency services in Cue are always looking for volunteers. If you would like to donate any of your time to the community, please consider contacting a community group or emergency service and get involved. The Cuerosity shop are currently looking for volunteers to help out in the shop, enquire at the shop during opening hours.

At the June Council meeting, Council accepted a tender from Modular WA for the construction of a new Manager's residence and office for the Cue Tourist Park and two houses to be leased to the State Government through the Government Regional Officers Housing (GROH) program for police officers. Council also agreed to raise a loan to fund the GROH houses, which will be repaid through the lease payments.

The process of preparing the Shire budget for the new financial year is well underway, with Council proposing to maintain the rate in the dollar at the same level for most rate categories for the second year in a row. Mining property rates will experience a reduction in the rate in the dollar for the second year as well. Overall, the total rates expected to be raised to support the 2019-2020 budget will rise by a modest 1.15% due to an increase in property numbers and valuations.

Recently there has been a spate of vehicle crashes at various points along the Great Northern Highway. There will be various reasons why these incidents occur no doubt but at a guess things like driver fatigue, speeding, inattention or alcohol/drugs in the drivers system, will be contributing factors.

HON ROBIN SCOTT MLC OF KALGOORLIE-BOULDER Member for Mining and Pastoral



At the age of sixteen Robin Scott came from Scotland with his parents to Western Australia, where he enrolled as an apprentice electrician. Immensely proud of his trade, Robin has worked for more than 30 years as an electrical contractor to the WA mining industry, especially the Goldfields. Flying himself and his staff to electrical contracting assignments, Robin logged 4,000 hours in his Rockwell Commander, the aircraft he now uses to service his constituents in the vast

Mining and Pastoral Region.

Robin is an enthusiastic campaigner for job opportunities through creating more apprenticeships for young men and young women. The Federal Government has partially embraced the Pauline Hanson's One Nation Policy of subsidising apprentice wages 75% in the first year, 50% in the second and 25% in the third year.

Robin Scott moved the Disallowance Motion which defeated the Government's attempt to increase the Gold Royalty by 50%. Robin is determined to protect and promote mining and led the defence against water charges for prospectors and small miners.

Robin's priorities for 2019 include:

- Water pipeline south from the Kimberley
- Supply good clean water for all regional people
- Sealing the Wiluna-Meekatharra Road
- Insist on rapid delivery of the promised MRI machine for Kalgoorlie
- Big upgrade for palliative care in the regions
- Aged care facility for Leonora
- New hospital for Laverton
- New hospital for Meekatharra
- Ensure the Nursing posts are manned by more than one nurse and are secure and safe for staff
- Abolish fringe benefit tax to encourage FIFO workers to live locally
- Speed up dog fencing and increase the number of professional doggers
- More jobs through quicker approvals for mines



NAIDOC History

1920s & 1930s

Before the 1920s, Aboriginal rights groups boycotted Australia Day (26 January) in protest against the status and treatment of Indigenous Australians. By the 1920s, they were increasingly aware that the broader Australian public were largely ignorant of the boycotts. If the movement were to make progress, it would need to be active.

> Several organisations emerged to fill this role, particularly the Australian Aborigines Progressive Association (AAPA) in 1924 and the Australian Aborigines League (AAL) in 1932. Their efforts were largely overlooked, and due to police harassment, the AAPA abandoned their work in 1927.

> > In 1935, William Cooper, founder of the AAL, drafted a petition to send to King George V, asking for special Aboriginal electorates in Federal Parliament. The Australian Government believed that the petition fell outside its constitutional responsibilities.

1940-1955

From 1940 until 1955, the Day of Mourning was held annually on the Sunday before Australia Day and was known as Aborigines Day. In 1955 Aborigines Day was shifted to the first Sunday in July after it was decided the day should become not simply a protest day but also a celebration of Aboriginal culture.

1938

On Australia Day, 1938, protestors marched through the streets of Sydney, followed by a congress attended by over a thousand people. One of the first major civil rights gatherings in the world, it was known as the Day of Mourning.

Following the congress, a deputation led by William Cooper presented Prime Minister Joseph Lyons with a proposed national policy for Aboriginal people. This was again rejected because the Government did not hold constitutional powers in relation to Aboriginal people.

After the Day of Mourning, there was a growing feeling that it should be a regular event. In 1939 William Cooper wrote to the National Missionary Council of Australia to seek their assistance in supporting and promoting an annual event.

1956-1990

Major Aboriginal organisations, state and federal governments, and a number of church groups all supported the formation of NADOC, the National Aborigines Day Observance Committee. At the same time, the second Sunday in July became a day of remembrance for Aboriginal people and their heritage.

In 1972, the Department of Aboriginal Affairs was formed, as a major outcome of the 1967 referendum.

In 1974, the NADOC committee was composed entirely of Aboriginal members for the first time. The following year, it was decided that the event should cover a week, from the first to second Sunday in July.

In 1984, NADOC asked that National Aborigines Day be made a national public holiday, to help celebrate and recognise the rich cultural history that makes Australia unique. While this has not happened, other groups have echoed the call.

1991-Present

With a growing awareness of the distinct cultural histories of Aboriginal people and Torres Strait Islanders, NADOC was expanded to recognise Torres Strait Islander people. The committee became known as the National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee, NAIDOC. This new name has become the title for the whole week, not just the day. Each year, a theme is chosen to reflect the important issues and events for NAIDOC.

During the mid-1990s, the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Commission (ATSIC) took over the management of NAIDOC until ATSIC was disbanded in 2004-05.

There were interim arrangements in 2005. Since then a National NAIDOC Committee, until recently chaired by former Senator Aden Ridgeway, has made key decisions on national celebrations each year. The national committee has representatives from most States and Territories.

CUE-RI-OS-II - Is Dirt Alive?

A REAL PROPERTY.

On his recent trip to the Goldfields, Professor Andy Whiteley sparked the cue-ri-os-ity of the students at Cue Primary School by asking the question,

"Is dirt alive?"

Professor Andy, is the head scientist for the MicroBlitz Project, based at the University of Western Australia. He was lucky to find so many keen helpers in Cue, and is hoping to see some of these apprentice scientists studying at UWA in the future.

Like many people around Cue Professor Andy is curious about what is in the ground. But, instead of looking for gold, he's taking soil samples to find out what kinds of tiny, tiny creatures (microbes) live hidden underground.

The microbes Professor Andy is looking for in the soil are so tiny, that to be able to identify and count them he has to test their DNA.

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

Spiced Chicken Wings with Ranch Dressing

(INGREDIENTS)

- 1 kg chicken wings
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon tomato sauce
- 1 tablespoon worcestshire sauce
- 2 teaspoons sweet paprika
- 2 tsp dried oregano
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon ground allspice



Preheat oven to 200°C. Line a baking tray with baking paper. Combine chicken, sugar, tomato sauce, Worcestershire sauce, paprika, oregano, cumin, garlic, allspice and chilli flakes, if using, in a bowl. Season.

(RANCH DRESSING)

- $1/3 \operatorname{cup}(100g)$ mayonnaise
- 2 Tablespoons sour cream
- 1 tablespoon white wine vinegar
- 2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
- 2 teaspoons finely chopped dill
- 2 teaspoons finely chopped chives
- 1/4 teaspoon sweet paprika

Arrange the chicken mixture in a single layer on the lined tray. Bake, turning occasionally, for 40-45 minutes or until the chicken is golden brown and cooked through.


Meanwhile, to make the ranch dressing, place the mayonnaise, sour cream, vinegar, mustard, dill, chives and paprika in a small bowl. Stir until well combined. Season to taste.

Arrange the chicken wings on a large serving plate. Serve with the ranch dressing.

Little Fruit Loaves with Toffee Nut Topping

(INGREDIENTS)

- 2 cups Sunbeam mixed dried fruit
- 1 1/2 cups finely chopped dried pitted dates
- 1/2 cup red glace cherries, quartered
- 1/3 cup cream apera (sherry)
- 1/3 cup marsala
- 125g butter, softened
- 1 cup caster sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 1/4 cups plain flour
- 2 tablespoons self-raising flour
- 3/4 cup blanched almonds
- 3/4 cup dry roasted hazelnuts
- 3/4 cup pecan nuts



Place mixed dried fruit, dates, cherries, 2 tablespoons cream apera and 2 tablespoons marsala in a glass or ceramic bowl. Cover. Stand overnight to allow flavours to develop and liquid to absorb.

Preheat oven to 150°C/130°C fan-forced. Grease an 8-hole, 3/4 cup capacity mini loaf pan. Line base and long side of each hole with 8cm x 15cm strips of baking paper.

Using an electric mixer, beat butter and 1/2 cup sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition (mixture will curdle). Sift over flours. Stir until just combined. Add 1 tablespoon cream apera and 1 tablespoon marsala and dried fruit mixture. Stir until well combined.

Divide mixture evenly between prepared pan holes. Level tops. Combine nuts in a bowl. Divide between cakes, gently pressing down on topping.

Bake for 40 to 45 minutes (covering with foil if over-browning) or until a small knife inserted in centre of 1 cake comes out clean. Remove from oven. Drizzle cakes immediately with remaining cream apera and marsala. Cover with foil. Cool cakes in pan for 2 hours. Transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.


Combine remaining sugar and 1/2 cup warm water in a heavy-based saucepan over low heat. Cook, stirring, for 4 minutes or until sugar has dissolved. Increase heat to high. Bring to the boil. Boil, without stirring, for 12 minutes or until mixture turns golden. Set aside for 30 seconds for bubbles to subside.

Place cakes on a wire rack set over a baking tray lined with baking paper. Carefully spoon toffee over cakes. Stand for 15 minutes or until toffee has set. Serve.
