# FROM THE CEO

The ANZAC Day memorial service will be held on Monday 25 April from 5.45am at Arthur Stanley Memorial Park. This will be followed by breakfast at the Murchison Club Hotel.

The month of April represents the start of the busy season for Cue with an increase in visitors, travelers and prospectors into the region. A big welcome or welcome back to Cue for all our visitors, we hope you enjoy your time here and enjoy everything Cue has to offer.

The past month has seen our first COVID cases in Cue and it is a reminder of the importance of using masks and practicing social distancing as well as good hygiene to minimise transmission within the community. The Department of Communities and the Shire of Cue Community Development Officer did a fantastic job of visiting homes in Cue to provide RATS tests and welfare checks on the community, thank you for your efforts it is appreciated. The Shire of Cue will continue to put practices in place to separate staff and maintain services where possible. Customers requiring Shire services are asked to be patient and follow protocols where necessary.

WA Country Health Service will be holding Vaccination Clinics in Cue regularly and will be at the town hall on Wednesday 6 April and Wednesday 27 April 2022 for anyone to receive a vaccination or booster, no appointment is necessary. It is expected that more clinics will be held throughout the year, currently on Wednesday's and three weeks apart to administer vaccinations.

The Shire has experienced high rainfall recently which has affected local roads with water over the road and soft shoulders. Please check road conditions daily before travelling on roads in the district. Care should be taken on all roads throughout the Shire, particularly at floodways. Please keep in mind that workers and machinery may be encountered on any of the Shire's roads at this time and observe speed limits and traffic directions posted through road works. This time of year is known for random storms and flooding in isolated parts of the Shire. Strong winds can cause damage and all residents of Cue are asked to secure loose items and dispose of unwanted clutter to reduce the risk of causing damage.

Rain and warm weather also mean prime mosquito breeding conditions. The fogger will be out intermittently, when conditions are suitable, just before dusk to control their numbers.

The final audit report for the 2020 – 2021 financial year is still with the Office of the Auditor General. Once completed, the Shire of Cue 2020-2021 Annual Report will be presented to Council for adoption and made available in the public documents section on the Shire's website. The date for the Annual Electors Meeting will be determined at the time of adoption and advertised in a public notice.

Dog owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their dogs contained within the boundaries of their property or on a leash while walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action to seize dogs that are found wandering in the street. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner and potential destruction of offending animals. The only authorised area within the town-site where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval.



# Pulse oximeter What you need to know!

Are you non-Aboriginal and over 65?

Are you Aboriginal and over 50?

Are you pregnant?



COVID-19

If you answered YES to any of the above – collect a free pulse oximeter from your local government today!

### What is a pulse oximeter?

It is a small, peg-like device that clips onto your fingertip to read your heart rate and blood oxygen level. It takes only one minute to work, is reusable and can be shared between other people in your household.



### Why do I need one?

If you become COVID-19 positive, you may need to be remotely monitored through the WA COVID Care at Home program. By having a pulse oximeter already in your home, a health professional can assess you and provide health advice from the comfort of your home.

Visit WA COVID Care at Home for more information.

#### Where do I get one?

Visit your local government to collect a free pulse oximeter for you and your household (each eligible household will receive one pulse oximeter).

Do **not** pick up a pulse oximeter if you are already COVID-19 positive. If you have already received a positive COVID-19 test result, the Department of Health will contact you and provide further information.



# FEEDING BIRDS IN YOUR BACKYARD PART 2

Unnatural food weakens birds, it fills them up, taking away the need to hunt for their natural foods that maintain their health. They breed weak young if they pass our food onto their babies.

Feeding stations can increase aggression and stress as many birds try to feed together, which doesn't happen naturally. It can cause a concentration of food and large numbers of birds in one place can spread Psittacine beak and feather disease. Seed that is left out in the rain or in damp conditions rots, grows mould and introduces disease to the birds.

Feeding can also increase the number of feral or non-native birds and attract pests like rats, mice and cockroaches.

Seed placed in feeding stations suspended above the ground may seem like a sensible idea to stop unwanted pests. However unfavourable seed is cast out or accidentally spilled onto the ground. Birds are then attracted to the ground to feed and predated upon by cats and foxes.

Some species of birds will artificially increase in numbers when more food is available. Artificial food can make birds overweight due to the high quantities of fat that is present in processed food and meat. Raw meat is lacking in calcium and has high levels of phosphorus which contributes to dietary imbalance and severe deficiencies. Supplementary feeding of birds has been shown to cause some species to breed earlier and more often than they would naturally. Native birds do not need extra food so artificial feeding is not necessary. Currawongs, kookaburras and ravens (omnivorous) that will eat anything are great opportunists. Increased numbers of these larger, more aggressive birds in many urban areas can be attributed to artificial feeding.

Currawongs and magpies have increased dramatically in numbers over time, forcing out smaller species from many areas. Currawongs, ravens, butcherbirds and laughing kookaburras (introduced into WA) also eat the eggs and chicks of small birds.


