

CHC NEWS

The word Circa comes from Latin and means 'around, about, roughly, approximately' and is abbreviated as C. Circa is widely used in historical writing when the dates of events are not accurately known. For example, "circa 1900" means around the year 1900 without specifying the exact year. The CHC uses C1900 in its descriptions of items.

The CHC has had quite a few items donated recently from people who have visited and decided they could do with a clean out at home. Most items have come from Perth, some locally and some from outlying WA towns. Surprisingly, a few small items have arrived in the mail from other Australian states which is a mark of how well the CHC is being received.

Local items include a Meekatharra number plate (MK 718) and an antique brass and wood surveyor's tripod with a central plumbob. This tripod is C1880-1900 and both of these items were donated by JC from the Shire Works office. The dumpy level that goes on top is missing so that is an item we are looking for to complete the tool.

We also have an antique galvanised steel and wood extension leg tripod. This is C1900-1930. It is a camera tripod and we are on the lookout for antique cameras such as the ones pictured below to complete the display.

About Remembrance Day

On the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month, a minute's silence is observed and dedicated to those soldiers who died fighting to protect the nation.

At 11am on 11 November 1918, the guns on the Western Front fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare. The Germans called for an armistice (suspension of fighting) in order to secure a peace settlement. They accepted the allied terms of unconditional surrender.

The conflict had mobilised over 70 million people, left between 9 and 13 million dead, and as many as one third of these with no grave.

The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month attained a special significance in the post-war years. It became universally associated with the remembrance of those who had died in the war.

Originally known as Armistice Day, it was renamed Remembrance Day after World War Two to commemorate those who were killed in both World Wars.

Today the loss of Australian lives from all wars and conflicts is commemorated on Remembrance Day.

We will remember them.

FROM THE CEO

This month saw the retirement of Shire President Ross Pigdon. Ross chaired his last Council meeting on 17 October before stepping down from the role and Council. A dinner was held after the Council meeting to thank Ross for his dedication to the community over the past eight years. At the Special Meeting on 24 October 2023, new Councillor Neil Montgomery was sworn in along with returning Councillors Les Price, Ron Hogben and Leonie Fitzpatrick. Councillor Les Price has been elected the new Shire President.

The Shire will be holding an auction at the Cue Shire Hall on Wednesday 06 December 2023 at 12.00pm, for the sale of properties with three years or more outstanding rates in accordance with *section 6.64 of the Local Government Act 1995*. Further details are available on the Shire notice boards.

Thank you to Phil and Cheryl for their donation of time to the Feed it Forward cause that saw a donation of food distributed throughout the region and town.

A full-scale Aerodrome emergency exercise was conducted on 09 October 2023. This exercise was facilitated by Aerodrome Management Services. All our local emergency services including Westgold's Emergency Response Team attended along with a representative from National Jet Express and Penjet. We were able to secure use of the Dash 8 Q400 aircraft to enable us to simulate this exercise. A big thank you to everyone involved.



I attended the opening of the new visitor hub at Wooleen station. The opening was well attended with the building being officially opened by Regional Development Minister Don Punch and supported by grant funding through the Mid West Development Commissions' Regional Economic Development Grant program.

The owners of Wooleen Station have relocated and refurbished a 100-year-old shearer's shed kitchen and have transformed it into a reception, café and art studio. Originally situated 7km from the homestead, it's relocation to the entry of Wooleen Station provides another great stopping place and attraction in the Murchison.

The Shire of Cue had a Tesla electric vehicle on trial in Cue for a couple of days in early October. The Electric Vehicle Tour, a joint initiative between WALGA, Horizon Power, Energy Policy WA, and MoJo Car Share provided a Tesla Model Y electric vehicle which was made available for Mid-West Shire's. A number of people got to have their first drive of an electric vehicle and were impressed with the capabilities and new technology.

It's that time of the year again!!! The Christmas Light Competition is open for 2023. Please see details in this edition of the Dryblower. Remember to fill in your registration and return to the Shire Admin Office to be eligible for prizes.

Preparations are underway for Australia Day 2024, and it is looking to be another spectacular event with live music and fireworks. We were successful in obtaining grant funding again this year through National Australia Day Council. More details will be provided closer to the event.

WA Seniors Week runs from 12 to 19 November to recognise the important role that seniors play in our community and acknowledge the contributions of older Western Australians. On Monday 13 November we will celebrate Seniors Week with a morning tea at the Queen of the Murchison from 10.00 to 11.00am. Bookings are appreciated for catering purposes by contacting Tracy at the Shire office. Please let us know if you require assistance to attend the event.

On Wednesday 25 October 2023, the Shire Youth Program held a "Taste of Mexico" at the Railway Station precinct. This event was to introduce different foods and culture. We had a slippery slide consisting of tomatoes to emulate "La Tomatina" and I was subjected to tomatoes being dumped over me. All the children and staff had a great time. Thank you to the Shire staff and volunteers for organising this event.

The Murdoch University Vet Program was held on Friday 27 October at the Shire Hall. Students from the university provided free pet checks and sterilisation under the guidance of a senior vet. Other services available included microchipping and vaccination. Around twenty-five animals were seen on the day and the program was again a great success. Thank you to Peter Smith from Canine Control for organising this again and ensuring everything ran smoothly on the day.

The Shire working in conjunction with the Department of Fire and Emergency Services will be undertaking fire break works around Cue town site. Owners and occupiers of land are reminded of their obligations to clear and maintain fire breaks over the summer months. The summer months are also a time of storms and cyclones. Residents are also reminded to clean up and remove any unwanted or loose items from their property that could cause damage in a storm. Larger items can be collected by contacting the Manager of Works and Services to make arrangements.

CEO REPORT cont.

Dog owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their dogs contained within the boundaries of their property or on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained dogs in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Mosquito fogging operations are being undertaken when weather conditions allow. Residents are asked to check their properties and remove any potential mosquito breeding areas, by emptying containers holding water, ensuring gutters are not holding water and checking yards for areas that hold water.

As a reminder, there are still a number of Shire roads waiting for repair works to commence. Road users are asked to take care when travelling, particularly at flood crossings. Please drive to the road conditions and observe any traffic directions. Road Condition Reports are available on the Shire of Cue's website, the Public Notice board and on our Facebook page.

We ask everyone to be vigilant as the warmer weather brings out the snakes in and around town, which means they are out of hibernation and active again. Please use caution when out walking. Keeping grass short and cleaning up around the yard will help to keep them away.



Country Stargazing

Here Comes Astrofest!

with Carol Redford and Donna Vanzetti, Astrotourism WA

November has a bumper line-up of fabulous stargazing treats and the big-ticket item is this year's WA Astrofest! Held on Saturday 18th November, this free and family friendly event will have dozens of big telescopes to look through, astronomy talks, children's space activities, astrophotography and much more to overload your cosmic senses! For more information

For early risers, dazzling Venus will make a close approach to the lovely thin slither of the Moon on November 10th. The best time to see this stunning duo is one hour before sunrise, looking low towards the east.

Adding to this month's stellar diary, stargazers will be treated to a special display from the Leonids Meteor Shower. The Leonids meteor shower is generated from comet Tempel-Tuttle. The shower peaks on the night of the 17th/18th of November but can be viewed several days either side of the peak. The best views will be under dark skies, after midnight.

This shower emanates from the constellation Leo, which is visible just about everywhere on Earth. For those in northern WA, Orion will be higher in the sky, and may produce clearer meteors.

When to look: From midnight to early morning, 17th/18th November.

Which direction to look: Toward the northern horizon



Meteor showers happen when our planet Earth crosses the orbital path of a comet. As comets pass by the sun, the extreme temperatures heat up some of the nucleus and cause debris particles to spread out along the comet's orbit creating a comet tail. As Earth passes through this debris cloud, we have the opportunity of viewing the fiery spectacle of a meteor shower.
