CHC News

With the focus on heritage items, the CHC recently had a most unusual gift of a spinifex hopping mouse. The desiccated body was found during the Western Australia bank building restoration. It is in very good condition and was brought to me by Dave Mowbray to see if I was interested in preserving it for display. Of course I was. It was fun working on this unusual project.

The spinifex hopping mouse is indigenous to Cue and surrounding areas and extends throughout central and Western Australia dependent upon the availability of water. They inhabit spinifex-covered sand flats, sand dunes and loamy mulga and melaleuca flats. They live in small family groups of up to 10 individuals in deep, humid burrow systems. The entrances to the burrow are hidden in grass and the burrow maintains a constant temperature helping them to survive in the heat of the desert.

The spinifex hopping mouse has a fawn or chestnut coloured back with some longer coarse black hairs; it has a white underside. The ears, feet and nose are pink with the eyes being large and black. They are grey around the muzzle and between the eye and ear. From the head to the base of their furred tail measures between 9.5 - 11.5cm. An average weight is 35g so they are a little larger than a common house mouse.

These animals are omnivores. Their diet includes seeds, leaves, roots, fungi, plants and insects. To survive in the desert the spinifex hopping mouse is adapted to draw all of its water needs from the food it eats. Predators of the spinifex hopping mouse include dingoes, snakes, owls, foxes and cats.

Thanks to Dave and Phil who contributed to producing the diorama on display in the CHC. It has been a very popular exhibit so come in have a look. It is quite rare to spot one of these cute mammals so keep an eye out and you might be lucky to see a living one.

From the CEO

I would like to congratulate Mal Taylor on his retirement from the Shire of Cue. Mal was an integral part of our Works Department for many years, and we all wish him all the best.



On Wednesday 01 November 2023, the Water Corporation's Cue Water Treatment plant won an award for best tasting tap water in Western Australia. This attracted some media attention with Shire President Les Price giving interviews to various radio stations.

To celebrate WA Seniors Week the Shire of Cue, with assistance from the Queen of the Murchison, held a morning tea on Monday 13 November. Around fourteen people attended the morning to catch up with a cuppa and a slice of cake.

The Shire of Cue hosted the Murchison Country Zone of the WA Local Government Association (also affectionally known as Cue Parliament) which was attended by representatives from the Shires of Sandstone, Yalgoo, Mt Magnet, Meekatharra and Murchison on Friday 17 November. The meeting was held in the Council chambers and was officially opened by Shire of Sandstone President Beth Walton. Hon Neil Thomson MLC Member for Mining and Pastoral and Merome Beard MLA Member for North West Central also attended. Presentations were provided by a number of agencies including Department of Fire and Emergency Services, Water Corporation, Telstra, Regional Development Australia and Midwest Development Commission. In keeping with tradition, the Shire of Cue with assistance from the Cue CRC hosted the sixth running of the Cue Calcutta Cup. Attendees purchased tickets for a chance to secure a horse in the phantom race. Proceeds from the ticket sales raised funds for the Cue St John Ambulance Sub Centre and Royal Flying Doctor Service. A big thank you to Westgold for providing sponsorship that greatly contributed to the success of the event.

At the Ordinary Council meeting on Tuesday 21 November 2023, we had the Rates Incentive Prize draw. 1st Prize - A4104 Big Bell Gold Operations Pty Ltd 2nd Prize - A4968 Sinclair

3rd Prize - A9401 Cullen Exploration Pty Ltd

The winners will be contacted by the Shire.

The Shire of Cue Administration and Works Department will close at 12 noon on Thursday 21 December 2023 for the Christmas break and reopen on Monday 8 January 2024.

Fenix Resources has bought a 10Mt high grade iron ore deposit for \$1/tonne from Sinosteel next to its Iron Ridge mine. The company has already mined more than 3Mt from its flagship mine at Iron Ridge and generated more than \$150 million in free cashflow. With 6 Mt of iron ore left to mine at Iron Ridge the acquisition of a further 10 Mt nearby significantly extends mine life and should be a valuation catalyst. Fenix Resources will look at increasing parking areas on the Miners Pass to keep the traffic on each side of the road. North bound to pull over their side and South bound on their side. They will also be expanding their housing in Cue. They are currently endeavouring to purchase another block, preferably in Dowley Street to construct a unit development like the current accommodation at the South end of Dowley Street.

The Shire will be holding an auction at the Cue Shire Hall on Wednesday 06 December 2023 at 12.00pm, for the sale of properties with three years or more outstanding rates in accordance with *section 6.64 of the Local Government Act 1995*. Further details are available on the Shire notice boards.

Preparations are underway for Australia Day 2024, and it is looking to be another spectacular event with live music and fireworks. We were successful in obtaining grant funding again this year through National Australia Day Council. More details will be provided closer to the event.

The Shire working in conjunction with the Department of Fire and Emergency Services will be undertaking fire break works around Cue town site. Owners and occupiers of land are reminded of their obligations to clear and maintain fire breaks over the summer months. The summer months are also a time of storms and cyclones. Residents are also reminded to clean up and remove any unwanted or loose items from their property that could cause damage in a storm. Larger items can be collected by contacting the Manager of Works and Services to make arrangements.

Dog owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their dogs contained within the boundaries of their property or on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained dogs in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Mosquito fogging operations are being undertaken when weather conditions allow. Residents are asked to check their properties and remove any potential mosquito breeding areas, by emptying containers holding water, ensuring gutters are not holding water and checking yards for areas that hold water.

As a reminder, there are still a number of Shire roads waiting for repair works to commence. Road users are asked to take care when travelling, particularly at flood crossings. Please drive to the road conditions and observe any traffic directions. Road Condition Reports are available on the Shire of Cue's website, the Public Notice board and on our Facebook page.

We ask everyone to be vigilant as the warmer weather brings out the snakes in and around town, which means they are out of hibernation and active again. Please use caution when out walking. Keeping grass short and cleaning up around the yard will help to keep them away.

That means locking up your house, double checking your windows and doors, making sure your shed is padlocked up and there is nothing of interest in easy view which might create interest for potential thieves.

This month we have had quite a bit of crime, for Cue at least with a small group of kids aged 6 to 12 years being responsible. Instead of just processing them through the law and not achieving anything, Mr M and I, the victims and the mums got together with the kids involved and had a chat how best for the children learn from their misdemeanors. The result was with the consent of their parents and carers, the kids would do some community service to learn but also as a way of giving back to community. 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WESTERN AUSTRALIA

A Volunteer's Point of View

On October 9th, 2023, Phil and I were fortunate enough to roleplay as patients involved in a full scale emergency air disaster scenario just out of Cue. Despite the unfolding drama, the pilot had managed to land the plane safely and taxi off the runway. At the briefing, run by Regina from Aerodrome Management Services, each of the patients was given a description of their injury to



hang around their neck. Someone must have had fun thinking up names for these patients. I was Harry Hand, wasn't breathing and had no pulse.... so basically, dead. Phil was Adam Ant with no visible signs of injury but in shock, talking incoherently, lost and confused. So... no acting involved at all really.



I was happy to be on the plane where it was quite cool while others sweltered outside under a burning sun. Jacqui, seated across the aisle from me, was paralysed and it was planned she would be the first person evacuated as #1 priority. So there I was lying back enjoying a nap (I was deceased, remember) when an enthusiastic medic checked my neck pulse and lifted my chin suddenly to which I groaned. Oh dear. That meant I had made a miraculous recovery - but with a severe neck injury a whole new set of protocols had to be put into place. Quickly. I was now #1 priority and poor Jacqui was relegated to sitting still for a much longer than anticipated. Perhaps that was a blessing in disguise for her... getting to stay cool on the plane instead of sweltering off it.

It became an interesting exercise as the emergency staff had to think on their feet and adapt their rescue dramatically. A medic now had to hold my neck up and still for many minutes (I'm now 2cm taller) until a brace arrived for support. Meanwhile, I was holding my groans in. A strap was slid under me so I could be manoeuvred from the window to the aisle seat and a fancy brace contraption put behind my back and head. The next phase entailed four people having to carry my dead weight (excuse the pun) down the aisle to the door without a stretcher and then get down the steps without dropping their patient... please. It was not at all comfortable but given my state of undead injury it didn't really matter. Everyone did very well and I arrived onto the



ambulance stretcher in one piece. Thank you. My hope was that Jacqui would now be rescued as well as mine had taken quite awhile. At least being paralysed she wasn't feeling any pain and was probably numbed by the whole experience by then anyway.



Once on the stretcher and reassured by the medics I was loaded into the ambulance, the doors closed and that's where my involvement came to an end... basically because the battery was flat and we were going nowhere. It wasn't my first role as a patient in such an exercise but it was the most interesting and most fun and I learnt a lot about how such emergencies are carried out. It was an eye-opener and I thank everyone for the opportunity to participate and for their professional rescue. I'm now fully recovered, my neck is straighter than it has been for years and I'm doing very well, thanks.

Meanwhile, back on the tarmac there was another drama being played out about which those on the plane were completely oblivious. It seems Adam Ant really took his role to heart and he managed to escape from his carers on several occasions. At one point he lay on the hot tarmac in full sun for ten minutes (Ouch! Now that's dedication!) before anyone approached to check on him. He wandered dazedly in front of the fire engine essentially stopping it and making it difficult to extinguish the engine fire. The fireman jumped out but had a job to do



(said engine fire in fact) so couldn't help relocate Adam. Eventually, someone else retrieved him and later he absconded from the briefing room when everyone's backs were turned. He silently meandered off making ant trails enough times that he was put into the ambulance and locked in to keep him safe... but he escaped from there as well. There was nowhere that



could keep Adam 'Houdini' Ant under control. He was in shock and disoriented, after all, but clearly determined in his quest. But what was his quest?

His main focus was looking for his injured wife despite assurances that I was ok and now safely off the plane, albeit with a cricked neck. Even after the exercise was all over and most had left Phil was found wandering down the road calling my name. Thankfully, someone came and found me and escorted me down the airport access road to reunite us. The poor confused guy was overwhelmed but calmed down rapidly with a kiss and cuddle of reassurance. I believe everyone was relieved to be able to hand him over as he had kept them on their toes throughout... and they needed to take a deep breath and relax.



The final activity of the exercise was a debrief at the Westgold camp where lots of things were discussed before enjoying a lovely lunch. The purpose of such an exercise is to see what works, areas where improvements can be made, existing procedures and communications between services examined. It was great to see that participants and trainees could all have input from their own point of view. Overall, the cooperation of everyone involved and the general positivity and success of the day was applauded. As was Phil and it was no surprise that he (aka Adam Ant or Houdini, take your pick) was nominated for a coveted Cue Oscar for his wonderful portrayal of a confused, shocked, incoherent man. Hmmm... no comment.



Thank you to everyone involved in this entertaining and educational exercise. We look forward to the next one.

Christmas Stargazing!

With Christmas just around the corner, it's a hectic and crazy time. So why not take a breather, head outside and look up at the beauty of a star-filled night sky. Stargazing is awe-inspiring and yet peaceful and calming at the same time. It's bound to refresh your spirits and get you ready to tackle the Christmas preparations with renewed vigour.

This month, stargazers will be treated to a special display from the Geminids Meteor Shower. On a dark night, away from artificial light pollution, you might see up to 120 meteors (or "shooting stars") an hour! The Geminids meteor shower is generated from asteroid 3200 Phaethon and is one of the most active and best meteor showers to see.

When and where to look: The best time to watch is after midnight until early morning on 13th and 14th December. Look to the northeast and north about 45 degrees above the horizon.

Throughout December the planets are also celebrating Christmas by putting on a 'Parade of Planets'! From our perspective here on Earth, as the planets continue their never-ending path around the Sun, their orbits can sometimes bring the planets together, along with the Moon, to form incredible conjunctions.

On Dec 24th, we have a special Christmas Eve treat. From 8pm, high in the north, the brightest star you can see is not a star at all – it's Jupiter! And to the east of Jupiter, a very bright moon lights up the sky!

To end our cosmic year on a high, early risers on New Year's Eve will be treated to quite a show in the low eastern sky. A bright Venus sits near to the constellation of Scorpio, while Mars and Mercury huddle together just underneath. Look from 4.30am-5.00am, 31st December.

Use the Quasar Publishing image as a guide. To find out more about what to see in the night sky, grab a copy of their latest Astronomy Australia almanac at <u>Quasar Publishing</u>.

Invitation to User Research Sessions with Centre for Inclusive Design & Australian Digital Health Agency for Community Members

Centre for Inclusive Design (CfID) is working with the Australian Digital Health Agency (ADHA) to research improving access to pathology reports through the online platform, My Health Record, available via myGov. We are looking to hear feedback from the community regarding this.

The government is changing how information is shared to My Health Records, allowing people faster access to their health records without the previous 7-day delay. ADHA has engaged CfID to ensure that this change doesn't negatively affect people who will likely be impacted the most.

We are currently looking for people in **regional/remote/rural areas** who would like to provide feedback on the above in an online 2-hour workshop with lived experiences of being **65 years and older and/or who speak English as a second language.**

Workshops will be conducted both online (via Zoom) between the 3rd of November – 23rd of November 2023. Each workshop will have no more than 6 to 8 participants, with 2 facilitators from the CfID research team, and will be 2 hours long. 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
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

Magic Pavlova

Do you have a busy December lined up? You still want to make and share a pavlova though, right? Here's my take on an easy pavlova with a bit of cheating to take the hard work out of it. Pavlova may look fancy but it's actually easy to make especially with Pavlova Magic Dessert Mix. The instructions are inside the egg and are easy to follow. One pack makes a pavlova approx. 20cm round and 6cm high or make two smaller ones.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 Pavlova Magic Dessert Mix
- 130g Caster Sugar
- 140ml water

The plastic egg is the exact measure you need for the ingredients so it's all very convenient.

1. Preheat oven to 170 degrees Celsius conventional or 150 degrees Celsius fan forced. Line a 37 x 25 cm baking tray with baking paper.

2. Fill the bottom of the plastic egg with lukewarm water and pour into a high-sided large mixing bowl. Carefully add the Pavlova Magic mix and mix on low speed for 15 seconds. Mix on high speed for 4-7 minutes, scraping down the sides of the bowl occasionally, until the mixture is stiff and forms peaks. Switch mixer to the slowest speed. Fill the top of the plastic egg with caster sugar and sprinkle evenly into the mix. Mix on high speed for 1 minute. Pile mixture onto prepared lined tray shaping it into a high dome shape. 4. Rest...you and the pavlova! Turn off the oven and leave the pavlova until the oven has completely cooled down. It's tempting but...do not open the oven door at any time during the baking or drying process.

The cooled pavlova can be kept in the fridge in an airtight container for a few days until ready to use. Top with whipped cream and your favourite fruit toppings for an incredible dessert perfect for Christmas celebrations... or any other occasion.
