The Cue CRC would also like to welcome our new Headmaster—Susan and her husband Jeff to town (sorry if I got the spelling wrong).


And finally, the Cue CRC now has EFTPOS facilities.

From the CEO

The positive start to 2020 has continued, with news that the Shire of Cue was one of only six successful recipients of funding through the Mid West Development Commission Regional Economic Development grants. The Shire was allocated \$135,000 to assist with the construction of a six-unit building in the light industrial area designed to accommodate businesses providing a range of trades and services supporting the mining sector.

Following widespread damage to roads across several Midwest shires during a rain event in 2019, a natural disaster was declared, triggering the Federal government's Natural Disaster Relief & Recovery Arrangements. The Shire was successful in obtaining grant funds through this program to enable repairs to be done on the following roads:

- Afghan Rock-Coodardy Road
- Beebyn-Karbar Road
- Beringarra-Cue Road
- Big Bell-Coodardy Road
- Big Bell-South Road
- Brega Wells Road
- Cogla Downs-Taincrow Road
- Coodardy-Noondie Road
- Dairy Wells Road
- Dalgaranga Road
- Inglewood Road
- Kalli Road
- Lakeside Road
- Rifle Range Road
- Scenic Lookout Access Road

At a special meeting of Council held in January, the tender for the provision of road construction plant and operators to undertake repairs to these roads was awarded to Lacy Bros Pty Ltd for an estimated value of \$3,589,425. Works are likely to be in progress for up to eighteen months.

Council also considered a tender for the reseal of town streets at the special meeting, with a tender from Colas being accepted to reseal all town streets in a bituminous micro slurry at an estimated cost of \$341,900.

Reconstruction of a section of Wittenoom Street is continuing, with the aim of eliminating flooding issues in this area during heavy rain. This will be completed prior to the remaining streets being resealed.

As there will be a significant amount of roadworks being undertaken throughout the Shire in the coming year, it is requested that road users remain alert and follow all traffic management signs and instructions to ensure their own safety, as well as that of workers and other road users.

On Sunday, 26th January, the Shire held its Australia Day celebrations. Shire staff and Councillors combined to prepare breakfast for approximately fifty hungry locals, former residents and visitors.



Ratepayers and residents are encouraged to attend the Annual Electors Meeting in the Shire Council Chamber on Tuesday 11 February at 6:30pm, when the 2018/19 annual report will be presented.



HON ROBIN SCOTT MLC OF KALGOORLIE-BOULDER Member for Mining and Pastoral



At the age of sixteen Robin Scott came from Scotland with his parents to Western Australia, where he enrolled as an apprentice electrician. Immensely proud of his trade, Robin has worked for more than 30 years as an electrical contractor to the WA mining industry, especially the Goldfields. Flying himself and his staff to electrical contracting assignments, Robin logged 4,000 hours in his Rockwell Commander, the aircraft he now uses to service his constituents in the vast Mining and Pastoral Region.

Robin is an enthusiastic campaigner for job opportunities through creating more apprenticeships for young men and young women. The Federal Government has partially embraced the Pauline Hanson's One Nation Policy of subsidising apprentice wages 75% in the first year, 50% in the second and 25% in the third year.

Robin Scott moved the Disallowance Motion which defeated the Government's attempt to increase the Gold Royalty by 50%. Robin is determined to protect and promote mining and led the defence against water charges for prospectors and small miners.

Robin's priorities for 2019 include:

- New hospital for Laverton
- New hospital for Meekatharra
- Ensure the Nursing posts are manned by more than one nurse and are secure and safe for staff
- Abolish fringe benefit tax to encourage FIFO workers to live locally
- Speed up dog fencing and increase the number of professional doggers
- More jobs through quicker approvals for mines





HAM & PINEAPPLE PIZZA SKEWERS



INGREDIENTS

3 x 100g ham steaks
1/4 small pineapple
1 medium red capsicum
1/2 x 440g pizza base
1 teaspoon dried oregano
1/3 cup pizza cheese
Mixed salad leaves & cherry tomoatoes
to serve

METHOD

STEP 1

Cut ham, pineapple, capsicum and pizza base into 25cm cubes.

STEP 2

Preheat oven to 200 degrees or 180 for a fan forced. Line a baking tray with baking paper.

STEP 3.

Thread ham, pineapple, capsicum & pizza base pieces onto skewers. Place on tray.

STEP 4.

Sprinkle cheese and oregano over skewers. Bake for 15 minutes or until heated through and cheese melted. Serve with salad leaves and tomatoes.

PEANUT 'CARAMEL' BLISS BALLS



INGREDIENTS

12 fresh medjool dates
1 tablespoon maple syrup
1/2 cup crunchy peanut butter
3/4 cup almond meal
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/4 cup sultanas
1 tablespoon black chia seeds
1/2 cup granulated peanuts, finely chopped

METHOD

STEP 1

Place dates, maple syrup, peanut butter, almond meal, vanilla, sultanas and chia seeds in a food processor. Process until well combined and mixture forms a thick paste like consistency.

STEP 2.

Place granulated nuts in a small bowl. Press and roll level tablespoon of date mixture into a ball, then roll in the nuts to lightly coat. Place on a plate and repeat with remaining mixture and nuts. Refrigerate for 20 minutes or until firm. Serve.
