Anyhoo, I hope that you are all sticking to your resolutions and they haven't crashed and burned already?



Discover local history from over 100 years ago!



Cue, Western Australia, 1895

THESE ARE THE DAYS, THAT YOU'LL REMEMBER

Cue was discovered in the 1800's, and in those early years the population of Cue was in excess of 10,000 people.

From the late 1800's to the early 1900's the foundation and construction began for shops, accommodation and the hospital. Most of those buildings are now heritage listed and majority of the structures remain today.

The Shire of Cue building was one of the first to be built and then restored in 1980's, The Government Building was built between 1895 - 1897 (which is also known as the largest building in Cue).

The old Hospital was constructed in 1892 and was upgraded with local stone in 1895. In 1896 the Municipal Chambers opened and become accessible for the first General Meeting.

A year later, in 1897 the first train arrived in Cue, making history and creating the famous "Railway Demonstration" on April 20th 1897.

DO IT, I DARE YOU!

In just 39 days two young girls, Jean Simmons and Anne McNally, both 19 years old, covered over 1000km by foot.

They were dared to walk from Perth to Cue and quickly accepted the challenge.

Leaving Perth on March 25th 1938 and arriving in Cue on April 14th 1938. The two young women spent a total of 15 pounds between them.

Along the way they were accompanied by Hazel Erlandsen, who figured with another companion the walk would be rewarding and easier.

After learning about the fast times that Jean and Anne shared, Hazel decided to part ways with them. Before leaving she wrote a farewell note on their helmets reading, "Good Luck. Well done!"



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Pastoral specialist joins team

THE Rural Financial Counselling Service of WA (RFCSWA) has welcomed on board a pastoral specialist as part of its rural financial counselling team.

WA's pastoral industry is a unique sector and it has faced challenging conditions in recent seasons. For that reason, this new Rural Financial Counsellor will focus solely on the pastoral industry — but he's actually not that new.

John Dymond had only recently retired from the RFCSWA but jumped at the chance to return when he was offered the opportunity to work with pastoralists and their communities.

He rejoined the RFCSWA team in June and has spent the past couple of months on the road, meeting people across the southern rangelands.

John's keen interest in the industry can be traced back to his first stint of on-farm work experience in the 1970s at a station just outside of Sandstone.

"I came from a grazing property in New Zealand, so it was a big eye opener — just to see the scale and understand how a grazing property like that operated," he said.

John spent more than 30 years teaching farm management at Muresk, including the arid land management course.

"It was a great unit, but it was also a really good excuse to take students on

a tour through the rangelands and I got just as much out of it as they did," he said.

John has urged pastoralists and small businesses to get in touch with the RFCSWA if they

Poor seasons and rising debt are situations that many Rural Financial Counselling Service of WA clients are familiar with and have worked with a Rural Financial Counsellor to successfully navigate.

South East farmers Jim and Jenny were hit by five years of drought, followed by two below-average seasons.

The poor seasons saw their business chew through its cash reserves, resulting in pressure from the bank to reduce debt. Their Rural Financial Counsellor was able to negotiate with their bank and explain the need for ongoing finance to run the business until a more permanent debt resolution could be organised.

"Just knowing that you can pick up the phone and there is somebody there that you feel comfortable with and you can talk to, that's one of the biggest helps," the couple said. "We can see our way clear now, to doing what we want to do with our future."



Improving water quality in the Murchison



Water Corporation is building four water treatment plants in Mount Magnet, Cue, Sandstone and Meekatharra to improve water quality in the Murchison region.

The water treatment plants will use a desalination process called electro-dialysis reversal (EDR). EDR technology has been successfully used in regional towns across Australia to improve water quality conditions, reduce nitrate levels and convert over 90% of the treated water into drinking water. It is currently used at the Wiluna and Yalgoo water treatment plants in the Murchison region.

December 2019 update

We are working with our authorised contractor, Guidera O'Connor to complete the design of the four treatment plants and will begin construction on the first plant site in late 2019.

Recent milestones

- Contractors will start work at the Mount Magnet site in December 2019.
- Heritage surveys in Cue are still in progress and expected to be complete in December 2019. Once we have
 these results, we will complete our final approvals. A new 600 kilolitre water storage tank has also been
 added to the project scope to provide extra storage in town.
- In early 2020, we expect to complete final approvals and consultation with land owners in Sandstone and Meekatharra.
- Another project update will be provided in February 2020.

Construction schedule

We will build each water treatment plant in stages and expect all plants to be operational by mid 2021. This schedule has been determined by each town's specific plant requirements and available power supply.

- Mount Magnet plant construction to begin in December 2019
- Cue plant construction to begin in early 2020
- Sandstone plant construction to begin across two sites in mid 2020
- 4. Meekatharra plant construction to begin in late 2020

How we will power the water treatment plants

Existing Water Corporation assets on the water treatment plant sites will continue to operate using grid power.

As part of our commitment to improved sustainability, solar power and batteries will be installed at the Mount Magnet, Cue and Meekatharra sites. This will minimise the amount of additional grid power required to run the new water treatment plants, including the EDR technology.

A diesel generator will be installed at all sites for additional power support.

Sandstone will also receive two new 200kL water storage tanks and a booster pump station to improve their water storage. As this site is the smallest, solar power and batteries will not be required to power the Sandstone plant, which will use grid power and a diesel generator when required.

At the age of sixteen Robin Scott came from Scotland with his parents to Western Australia, where he enrolled as an apprentice electrician. Immensely proud of his trade, Robin has worked for more than 30 years as an electrical contractor to the WA mining industry, especially the Goldfields. Flying himself and his staff to electrical contracting assignments, Robin logged 4,000 hours in his Rockwell Commander, the aircraft he now uses to service his constituents in the vast Mining and Pastoral Region.

Robin is an enthusiastic campaigner for job opportunities through creating more apprenticeships for young men and young women. The Federal Government has partially embraced the Pauline Hanson's One Nation Policy of subsidising apprentice wages 75% in the first year, 50% in the second and 25% in the third year.





FAST MEX SHAKING BEEF

INGREDIENTS

2 garlic cloves crushed

1/2 teaspoon caster sugar

2 tablespoons tequila

2 tablespoons lime

500g scotch fillet

60ml extra virgin olive oil

2 corncobs

300g red cabbage

4 radishes

1 small red onion

1 small bunch coriander

4 brine pickled jalapenos Chipotle chilli sauce

soft torillas

lime wedges

METHOD

STEP 1.

Combine garlic, sugar, half tequila and lime juice in a glass or ceramic bowl. Stir until the sugar dissolves. Cube the beef in 2cm cubes then add into sugar mix and toss to combine. Cover and set aside for 10 minutes to marinate.

STFP 2

Meanwhile, heat 1 tablespoon oil in a large frypan over medium high heat. Add corn and cook, turning, for 4 to 5 minutes or until slightly charred. Transfer to a board and use a long sharp knife to remove the kernels in large pieces.

STEP 3.

Shred the cabbage finely, slice radish and cut onion into wedges, then combine into a large bowl. Add 1 tbs oil and remaining lime juice, season and toss to combine.

STEP 4.

Heat remailing oil in a large frypan over high heat until smoking. Add the beef mix in a sigle layer. Cook for 2 minutes, without stirring or turning.

STEP 5.

Shan pan to toss beed. Cook for further 2 minutes, add remaining tequila. Cook for a few seconds. Divide beef, cabbage mixture, corn, jalapenos & coriander onto serving plates. Drizzle with sauce and serve with warmed torillas & lime wedges.



CLASSIC CUSTARD TARTS

INGREDIENTS

11/2 cups plain flour
1/3 cup icing sugar
125g butter, chilled & chopped
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 egg yolk

FILLING

3 eggs 2 teaspoons vanilla extract 1/3 cup castor sugar 2 3/4 cups milk, warmed pinch of nutmeg

METHOD

STEP 1.

Grease six 3.5cm deep, 7.5cm round pie tins. Process flour, icing sugar and butter until mixture resembles fine bread crumbs. Add vanilla and egg yolk. Process until dough just comes together. Shape into a disc. Cover with plastic wrap. Refridgerate for 30minutes. STEP 2.


Preheat oven to 200 degrees or 180 in a fan forced oven. Place baking tray in oven. Divide dough into 6. Roll each between 2 sheets baking paper until 3mm thick. Line tins with pastry, cover with baking paper and fill with weights or uncooked rice. Place on hot baking tray and bake for 10 minutes. Remove weights and paper, then bake for 5 minutes or until pastry turns golden. Cool completely.

STEP 3.

Make filling: reduce oven to 160 degrees or 140 for fan forced. Which eggs, vanilla, sugar and milk together. Pour into pastry. Sprinkle with nutmeg. Bake for 35 minutes or until just set. Cool completely and serve.


