Seven Golden Rules for Prospecting

Put safety first

- Make sure you have enough water, fuel, maps and first aid supplies.
 - Give serious consideration to taking some form of telecommunications and a global positioning system to fix locations, and a Personal Locator Beacon (PLB)

 it may turn out to be your most important safety device.

Obtain a 40E permit
prior to prospecting within an exploration tenement
(if you don't have written permission from the
tenement holder).

4.

Get written permission

from the tenement holder when prospecting on:

- a mining lease
- . an exploration licence (if you don't have a 40E permit)
- · a prospecting licence

5.

Comply with all legal requirements

when prospecting on a pastoral lease. You cannot prospect within 100 metres of any occupied building or within 400 metres of any livestock watering point without the consent of the pastoralist.

6.

Show respect when on Crown land

because it is used by other people or set aside for many purposes.

7.

Fill any holes

that you dug and repair ground that has been disturbed.

DID YOU KNOW ... that the maximum penalty for an individual prospecting illegally is \$150,000

FROM THE CEO

While I have officially returned to work from annual leave, I am currently still in Launceston with my family, working from home. I had delayed my return to WA in the hope that the hard border restriction would be lifted in time to avoid quarantine requirements on my return, however developments in Victoria spoiled those plans. I will now be returning to WA on 10 July where I will be required to self-isolate at home for 14 days before I can return to the office.

Meanwhile, in Cue, the "new normal" is beginning to take shape. All Shire facilities have now been reopened, with appropriate COVID-safe plans in place for the protection of patrons. The photographic display in the admin building is open to the public and all playgrounds and outdoor facilities are able to be used.

The Cue Tourist Park is busy with our regular guests returning to the park and a consistent flow of travellers passing through and stopping for a look at our historic town. Later this month we are expecting Australian country music superstar, Adam Brand, and his family to arrive at the park for a new adventure, *Road to Gold*. While Adam's music career is on hold due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, he will try his luck at making a living prospecting for gold, documenting his efforts on his YouTube channel and Facebook to over 100,000 followers. When asked why he is going to these extreme measures he answers, "I have lost my livelihood the same way thousands of other Aussies have, but we can't give up! Having the courage to roll the dice and try something completely different is the only way I see us getting through these troubled times. I'm going to do whatever it takes to provide for my family. I also hope that I might be able to inspire some others to not give up and keep on fighting"

Just like chasing a musical dream the *Road to Gold* can bring heartbreak, pure elation or both. Will Adam find gold and steer his family through this uneasy time in our history, or will it be another bumpy track he is leading them down? One thing for sure is, and in his own words from one of his songs, "I aint gonna die wondering."



Works are continuing on the refurbishment of the old Railway Station building, which is being restored and repurposed as a Youth and Community Centre, with assistance from Lotterywest. The stonemason has removed all the old paint from the exterior of the stonework, and it has already begun transforming the building. Repairs to the stonework will be followed by re-pointing of the joints. Inside, restoration works have commenced with the timber work being stripped back and repaired and the window frames being sent away for re-glazing. The Shire is excited to be breathing new life into this significant heritage building for the benefit of the community.

Barefoot bowls initially recommenced on Saturday evenings, however low numbers participating suggested that the dark, cold and competition from footy on the TV meant that bowling is probably not top of the list of things to do on a Saturday night. A new winter timeslot of 1pm on Sundays will hopefully be more attractive. Everybody is welcome, with plenty of bowls available for those who do not have their own.

Keep an eye out for more details of the Murchison Youth Sports Carnival to be held in Cue on Wednesday 15 July. The Stephen Michael Foundation will be conducting supervised sports activities at the town oval for boys and girls aged 8-17.

At the June Council meeting, Councillors agreed to set fees and charges for the 2020/21 financial year, with the exception of one, at the same level as 2019/20 in recognition of the economic impact of COVID-19 on the general community. Burial fees at the Cue Cemetery will increase slightly, to help offset the current cost of digging a grave, as this amount is not fully recovered by the charge.

Council has already decided to set the 2020/21 budget on the basis that the total amount of rates assessed will be the same as the previous financial year. This effectively means a nil rate increase for the Shire overall, however individual properties will be affected differently, depending on movements in revised valuations to Unimproved Properties recently provided by the Valuer General. Rate notices will not be sent until later in the year when the 2020/21 budget is adopted, however if you have a question about your rates, or the rating system in general I am happy to take your call.


Miss Dani awarded all of the students with a personalised award for the Term and Jayziah was awarded the Chaplain Award for his excellent participation.

RAILWAY STATION REFURBISHMENT

As many observant locals have noticed, we have commenced work on the Railway Station building. To date we have stripped out the old shower stalls, removed all the paint of the outside stone work and taken out the window sashes to be sent to Perth for repairs. The builders have also stripped the paint off the window sills and doors.

Work is progressing at a reasonable rate, with the render on the outside of the building already repaired through the court yard on the platform side. The building will also see a new colour scheme on the outside of the building, so look out for that!

We have had some discoveries during the demolition of the intrusive elements in the Station. Under the 100mm of concrete in the small rooms at the northern end of the building (the ladies ablutions), we found there was an original concrete floor with a cement dado around the edges. So instead of putting a timber floor in, we will polish up the concrete and leave it as it was 120 years ago. We also knocked through to the old fireplace in the ladies waiting room and found an old bit of railway line and some small concrete fixtures, so we will find a way to display them as part of the interpretation of the building. In the roof cavity we found the side of a spool of electric cabling from around the 1920's or 1930's by Craigpeak Electric Cabling Company in Glasgow, Scotland.

We have around 8 weeks more work until completion, so look out for further updates on the buildings progress! A big thanks to our major support Lotterywest, for their funding of this project.

As he stood at the foot of each house pad location, and from the many family photos in hand, Michael felt an overwhelming connection to his families past. He then contacted the Shire of Cue for permission to erect some informative family signs for the Blacklock and Houston families' history.

Finally, to have some acknowledgement for his Mum and Dad and Grandparents, both signs were erected on 17/6/20 at each location, by Michael Houston.

They all remained in Big Bell until closure of the mine on 22nd February 1955.



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



INGREDIENTS

150g macaroni 1 small cauliflower, cut into florets 2 cups milk 1/4 cup plain flour 1/4 tsp ground nutmeg 1 cup shredded tasty cheese 1 cup mozzarella cheese 1/4 cup chives, chopped 150g ciabatta or turkish bread, torn into pieces 60g soft margarine, extra., melted 1 garlic clove, crushed

METHOD

STEP 1.

Preheat oven to 200C. Grease a 10 cup ovenproof dish. Cook pasta in a large saucepan of boiling water for 3 minutes. Add the cauliflower and cook for a further 8 to 10 minutes or until pasta is al dente and cauliflower is tender. Drain. Return to pan.

STEP2.

Meanwhile, combine the milk, spread, flour and nutmeg in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Cook, whisking constantly, for 4 to 5 minutes or until the mixture boils and thickens. Season. Combine the tasty cheese and the mozzarella in a large bowl.

STFP 3

Add the sauce, half the chives and half the cheese mixture to pasta mixture. Stir gently to combine. Pour into prepared dish. Toss the bread, extra spread, garlic and remaining chives and cheese mixture in a medium bowl. Sprinkle over the pasta. Bake for 15 to 20 minutes or until golden.



INGREDIENTS

250g cream cheese, at room temperature 1 cup thickened cream 125ml double cream 1/4 cup caster sugar 1 lemon, rind finely grated 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1 small mango, peeled, thinly sliced Passionfruit pulp, to serve mint leaves, to serve edible flowers, optional

METHOD

STEP 1.

Beat cream cheese in a bowl until smooth. Add thickened cream, double cream, sugar and lemon rind. Beat for 2 to 3 minutes, until thick and creamy. Stir through lemon juice until combined.

STEP2.

Dollop some of the cream cheese mixture in the base of the four 250ml glasses. Top with sliced mango. Continue layering and finish with mango slices. Top with passionfruit pulp, mint leaves and edible flowers, if you like.
