



FROM THE CEO

Rob Madson is currently on leave and spending time to unwind and catch up with family at home in Launceston. Rob is expected back on Monday 15 June.

It was an interesting start to the month with the State in full lockdown and positive signs that restrictions might be easing just starting to emerge. Over the month we have seen the State and the Country control the outbreak and start the process of re-opening the regions and starting the process of returning to some kind of normal.

Here in the Shire of Cue the Shire office is now open to essential business with the photographic display still closed to the public at this stage. As more restrictions ease it is expected that this will open along with parks and playgrounds. The Cue Public Library and Community Resource Centre are open to the public. Please follow physical distancing and hygiene rules in place.

The ordinary meeting of Council that took place on 19 May was held in person in the Council Chambers and it is hoped that future meetings of Council will continue to be held in person as restrictions ease. The next meeting of Council is on the 16 June, to be held in the Council chambers.

With the State opening up regional borders for Intrastate travel, the Cue Tourist Park has begun opening up and inviting pre booked guests into the park. The office staff have done a great job contacting all of the Tourist Park bookings and inviting them back to Cue. The park is expected to fill up over the coming weeks with most of our regular guests returning for the tourist season. Physical distancing and gathering restrictions are still in place and must be adhered to.

Works have commenced on the refurbishment of the old Railway Station building which is being restored and repurposed as a Youth and Community Centre. A big thank you to Lotterywest that have provided grant funding to enable this project. The fit out of the building is in consultation with the local youth to provide facilities that they would like to have in the Centre. This project is part of the Shire's vision to revitalise the heritage buildings in Cue and develop a recreational space around the town oval. It is planned that works will be completed by September 2020.

Road works are underway with the widening and resealing of Wondinong Road out to the Airport and resealing works on parts of the Beringarra Cue road. Sealing works will also be undertaken on some town Streets with further resealing of the town Streets to be undertaken in the coming months. Please slow down and observe all traffic signs through these areas.

The Shire of Cue has been successful in being awarded a \$13,000 grant from the 2020-2021 Regional Events Scheme to be utilised towards QFest. The QFest has been rescheduled to take place on the WA Day long weekend from 4-7 June 2021.

Mosquitos are still prevalent around town and it is asked that people check their yards for pooling water and check rainwater tanks for any breeding activity. The shire will continue to undertake intermittent fogging as weather conditions allow.

On a sad note a long term employee of the Shire was recently laid to rest. Gordon Fraser was the Roads Supervisor as well as a grader driver, road train operator and roads builder for the Shire of Cue. Gordy made a significant contribution to the operations, culture and dynamics of the Shire. He will be missed by his friends and colleagues and I would like to pass on condolences to his family on behalf of the Shire President, Councilors and staff at the Shire of Cue.

POLICE BEAT

Traffic

G'day good people of Cue and a warm welcome at long last to our tourists and other visitors, it's about time!! We hope everyone has been able to fight their way through lockdown and is ready to get out and support their local regional community.

Cue Police have still been diligently patrolling the Great Northern Highway, north and south of Cue and unfortunately there has been no reduction to the amount of people caught speeding. You would have to think that the law of averages due to less people being allowed to travel would cause a reduction, sadly not. I for one have my own reasons for not speeding besides the obvious safety benefits – the state government take enough money from me in taxes and utilities, I'm not given them another cent!

I'm sure we all welcomed the lifting of Regional Border restrictions on 29 May 2020 to now include the Mid West Region which means we can all get down to Perth or to the southern parts of the state. It also importantly allows others to travel to Cue and inject some much-needed fiscal prosperity into local businesses.

Can I please ask our visitors to be mindful of the local road conditions as they may be not what you are used to at home? The Great Northern Highway is littered with heavy vehicles (mostly road trains) which can be difficult to navigate at times and there is a constant stream of wide loads passing through to the mining regions of the north of the state. Please take care and be more cautious than you normally are to prevent any disastrous incident. If you are driving during darkness (now 5.45 pm and 7 am!!) please reduce your overall average speed, be patient and watch out for wildlife.

You will now be likely to be stopped for random breath testing as things return back to normal and Police are always targeting anyone contributing to road trauma on our roads such as dangerous driving, drink and drug affected drivers.

<u>Crime</u>

It has been a good month for crime in Cue with very little reported.

I acknowledge the good work parents have been doing to ensure they know where and what their children are doing. It also appears that school attendance has been excellent for the start of the term 2 which is good news. A good education is one of the most important ways our children can prosper and provide for their own families once day.

Hi Cue Community,

Well the last month or two has seen a lot of changes for all of us personally and for the roadhouse in general.

Norm (Our new Manager) and I are endeavoring to cater to your requirements daily, and we welcome any feedback or suggestions you might have where we can improve the experience at the roadhouse for you.

THIS MONTH:

We would like to bring you all up to date regarding Australia Post. Many of you will not be aware of the processes Aust Post require from us so hopefully we can shed some light, and this will bring some clarity.

All our mail has a 10 DAY turn around (Aust Post directive), so if you are getting your mail sent to the post office it WILL BE returned to sender after 10 days.

We have completed an audit of our P O Boxes and many leases have lapsed for more than 3 months, and therefore have been cancelled by Aust Post.

It is a simple process to renew your lease if you wish to keep your P O Box number the Roadhouse owners have generously agreed to cover the cost of this for you as a community resident. They will pay the annual fee for the year. So, come on in with some photo ID and we can complete the process in just a few minutes.

Here is a list of the P O Box numbers available. If you see your number here come in quickly to renew your lease to avoid disappointment. We will be offering these numbers to all Cue residents who would like a P O Box.

Our console staff are required to follow strict Aust Post guidelines so please be respectful as we know refusal can be frustrating for you. Any questions you may have regarding Aust Post, please do not hesitate to approach the team next time you call into the roadhouse.

<u>Have coin laying around?</u> We would like to encourage you all to bring in any coin you may have accumulated. Leave it with us and we will count it for you and cash it in. Call back in at your convenience to collect your cash.



Food for the Mob teamed up to help deliver Emergency Relief Packages to



remote Aboriginal communities.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions, the ABC Foundation Limited (Aboriginal Biodiversity Conservation) spearheaded a collaboration between the Foundation's *Food for the Mob*TM program with community partners Yullela Aboriginal Corporation, Mungullah Community Aboriginal Corporation, along with Bundiyarra Aboriginal Corporation and MEEDAC to deliver 800 Emergency Relief Packages.

Helping to combat isolation in WA remote regional Aboriginal communities, the packages - made up of much needed cleaning and sanitary supplies donated by Bundiyarra and MEEDAC, along with food donated by Foodbank, Second Bite and Coles via the ABC Foundation *Food for the Mob*TM program - were delivered to communities throughout the Mid-West and Gascoyne regions.

Wayne McDonald, Bundiyarra Aboriginal Corporation's Manager Operations, said the "organisations have had calls from people in critical need, people in lockdown where there are no shops, they are not allowed to leave their communities, and they are running low on cleaning products, hygiene needs and food".

The ABC Foundation collected seven pallets of food along with a ton and a half of milk to contribute to the Emergency Relief Packages and saw Chief Advisor Brad Rowe working with Bundiyarra health workers and MEEDAC representatives to then help organise, pack and distribute the packages to those in need.

"This was a great outcome all round, we're excited to move forward and strengthen the ABC's partnership with Bundiyarra and MEEDAC along with our current community partners Yulella and Mungullah through further collaborations utilising the *Food for the Mob*TM program" said Rowe about the collaboration.

ABC Foundation community partners Yullela Aboriginal Corporation and Munugullah Community Aboriginal Corporation assisted in the distribution of packages to remote communities in the Meekatharra and Carnarvon areas, while Bundiyarra Aboriginal Corporation delivered to remote communities in the Murchison and Geraldton areas.

- Granted Funding for Palliative Care I accomplished a desired result with obtaining a multi-million-dollar funding injection for Palliative care in regional WA. I was disappointed to hear that the government had • again let our people down with in the health department and knew that people deserved to die with dignity.
- Blocked Removal of Education components with School of the air - I won the fight with members of the cross bench when the state government proposed that they wanted to remove critical education components with School.

- Advocating the PHON plan to subsidise apprenticeships by 75% in the first year, 50% in the second year and 25% in the third year.
- Investigate unfair Native Title Claims
- Create Suitable accommodation in regional towns for remote community visitors.
- Continue to follow up on the current status of the MRI machine for the Kalgoorlie Health Campus.
- Begin the construction on the Kimberly Water Pipelines.
 Bring Royalties for Regions back to Regional WA.

Continue to push for the Wiluna to Meekatharra road to be sealed.

WAM HEADS TO THE MID WEST REGION IN WA TO RECORD NEW ALBUM

West Australian Music (WAM) is excited to launch the next instalment of its regional recording project series, *Sounds* of *The Mid West*, with artist applications now open. The project is delivered with the ongoing support of the **State Government of Western Australia's Contemporary Music Fund**, and aims to showcase the musical talent, stories, and provide opportunities to artists and sound engineers in the region.

At twice the size of Victoria, the Mid West region covers almost one fifth of WA's land mass. It boasts some of the state's most iconic landscapes, spanning from the Gibson Desert in the East to the Batavia Coast, the Abrolhos Islands and north through the mighty Murchison. The Mid West is home to many first nations Yamatji peoples and languages, as well as Martu peoples to the east, where WAM recorded their regional compilation, *Sounds of Wiluna* in 2011.

The **Sounds of The Mid West** recording project will provide 10 Mid West artists the opportunity to record their original song with some of WA's best award-winning producers, including; **Matt Gio** and **Dan Carroll** (Rada Studios), **Andy Lawson** (Debaser Studio), **Sean Lillico** (Fur Real Studio), **James Newhouse** (Real2Reel Studios) and **Ryan Brennan** at a pop-up studio in an iconic Mid West location this September/October.

The final compilation will be released in 2021 on digital streaming platforms, limited-edition CD package, and distributed by WAM to local and national radio, industry and the public. The compilation cover will feature the artwork of a local Mid West artist to capture the spirit of the region.

Sounds of The Mid West is the fourth of nine new regional recording projects supported through the State Government's Contemporary Music Fund, and fourteenth of WAM's 'Demos from / Sounds of' series. Since launching in 2006, the series has brought great exposure to 120 artists based regionally across the expansive state of WA. WAM's latest regional compilation, **Sounds of The Kimberley**, has garnered significant digital streaming and radio airplay across ABC networks, and community radio nationally.

Applications to take part in the project are now open to Mid West region **songwriters, acts/bands** and **studio sound engineers** of any level, age, and genre. BEEF STROGANOFF SOUP

INGREDIENTS

3 cups chicken stock 1/2 x 20g packet dried porcini mushrooms 700g piece beef topside roast 1/3 cup extra virgin olive oil 2 brown onions, thinly sliced 3 sprigs of fresh thyme 1 dried bay leaf 3 garlic cloves, finely chopped 250g button mushrooms, thickly sliced 250g fusilli avellinesi pasta (any short pasta is fine) 1/2 cup thicken cream Roughly chopped fresh chives, to serve

METHOD

STEP 1.

Bring stock and 3 cups of water to the boil in medium saucepan over high heat. Add porcini. Set Aside.

STEP 2.

Meanwhile, season beef with salt and pepper. Heat 1 tablespoon oil in a large saucepan over high heat. Add beef. Cook, turning for 8 minutes or until well browned on all sides. Transfer to plate. Carefully wipe pan clean with paper towel.

STEP 3.

Heat 2 tablespoons remaining oil in pan over high heat. Add onion, thyme and bay leaf. Season with salt and pepper. Cook, stirring occasionally, for 6 minutes or until softened. Reduce heat to medium. Add garlic. Cook for 4 minutes or until well browned. Strain stock mixture into pan with beef. Roughly chop porcini. Add to pan. Bring to the boil. Cover. Reduce heat to medium-low. Cook for 1.5 hours or until beef is tender. STEP 4.

Meanwhile, heat remaining oil in a large frying pan over high heat. Add button mushrooms. Cook, stirring occasionally, for 5 minutes or until golden. STEP 5.

Using tongs, transfer beef to a board. Using 2 forks, shred meat. Remove and discard herbs. Return beef to pan. Bring to the boil. Add button mushroons and pasta. Boil, partially covered, for 15 minutes or until pasta is tender. Add cream. Stir to combine. Serve soup sprinkled with chives.



CHAI PANNA COTTA

INGREDIENTS

3 cardamom pods, bruised 2cm piece ginger, peeled, grated 2 chai & vanilla tea bags 1/2 cup boiling water 1 litre buttermilk 3/4 cup caster sugar 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon vanilla bean paste
1 tablespoon powered gelatin
1/4 cup chopped pistachio kernels
1 tablespoon orange zest

METHOD

STEP 1.

Place cardamom, sugar and tea bags in a heatproof jug. Add 1/3 cup boiling water. Set aside for 30 minutes for flavours to develop. Strain mixture into a bowl. Discard cardamom, ginger and tea bags.

STEP 2.

Place buttermilk, sugar, cinnamon, vanilla and tea mixture in a saucepan over low heat. Cook, stirring, for 3 to 4 minutes or until sugar is dissolved and buttermilk is just warmed through. Remove from heat.

STEP 3. Place remaining boiling water in a heatproof bowl. Sprinkle over gelatine. Whisk to dissolve. Add gelatine mixture to buttermilk mixture, stirring constantly until combined. Pour into 8 200ml capacity glasses. Refridgerate until set. STEP 4.

Divide pistachios and orange rind between glasses. Serve.
