

FROM THE CEO

Welcome to travellers and people visiting Cue. Tourist season has started noticeably slower than previous years, however our visitors are certainly enjoying their time in the Shire of Cue.

Heritage Minister the Honourable David Templeman announced on 18 May 2022 the little Wilgie Mia Ochre Mine and site has been included in the State Register of Heritage Places. This will provide protection for the site for future generations.

The Shire roads are still awaiting repairs following damage caused by a rain event in late March. Road users are asked to take care when travelling, particularly at flood crossings. Please drive to the road conditions and observe any traffic directions.

Roadworks are in progress 1km south of town on the Great Northern Highway. Westgold are modifying and improving the intersection where the Miners Pass Road meets the highway. Traffic management and reduced speed limits are in place. Travellers can expect minor delays.

The Volunteers night was well attended with around 50 people joining us for a bbq dinner, and live music provided by Emmet, who always provides great entertainment. A big thank you to Cr Les Price for articulating a great speech thanking the many volunteers who make up our community. I would also like to thank Tracy and the Shire staff for a great job in organising this event and the Murchison Club Hotel for hosting the evening.



Mosquito fogging will be carried out intermittently, when conditions are suitable, just before dusk to control their numbers.

Preliminary works in the form of an aerial survey have been undertaken to commence the Abandoned Mines Project in Cue. More work will be undertaken in June in the form of a ground survey to identify anomalies from the aerial footage. The Abandoned Mines Project is being undertaken by Department of Mines in conjunction with Gee Gie Consulting.

Shire of Cue Cr Les Price and Deputy Chief Executive Officer Glenn Boyes will be attending the Australian Local Government Association conference to be held in Canberra on the 19 – 22 June 2022. Cr Price has been requested by WALGA, representing the State Council to present the Railway Crossing Safety Improvements proposal.

Council adopted the 2020 – 2021 Annual Report at its ordinary council meeting held on 17 May 2022. The Annual Report, including the Auditors report, is available on the Shire of Cue website. The electors meeting is scheduled to be held in the Council chambers on the 14 June 2022 commencing at 6.30pm. The public notice is advertised in this edition of the Dryblower and on our website.

Council adopted a review of our Strategic Community Plan following a consultation period that was undertaken with the community in the latter part of 2021. The Strategic Community Plan outlines our aspirations for the Shire for the next 10 – 15 years and is available on our website.

The Corporate Business Plan that covers the next five years which guides councils budget deliberation for the next financial year was also adopted at the May meeting.

At a special meeting held on 24 May 2022 council approved the advertising of differential rates for the Shire of Cue. The Shire has undergone revaluations, conducted by the Office of the Valuer General, for all rate categories except the UV pastoral rates category that was revalued in 2019. The revaluations will cause fluctuations in individual rate assessment notices. However, Council has set the rates in the dollar to create an average of 3% increase across all rate categories. Rate payers that wish to lodge an objection to their new valuations can do so by following the instructions that are provided on the back of the rates notice.

Hello Cue

My apologies for failing to write an article last month but we've had a bit of business to deal with and it was one of my jobs that had to fall away. Unfortunately, it means we are sometimes away helping our neighboring towns when they need it and we take care of business in Cue on our return.

Part of this is assisting those towns is implementing Liquor Restrictions to prevent alcohol fueled violence which we do through our Liquor Accord. For that I give a shout out to and thanks to Helen and Ross and Pixie who back the other towns people and police by supporting those restrictions and limiting the sale of alcohol in Cue. We try to do this in such a way not to have much of an impost on the Cue community and I think the way we do it here works. If you are refused service, please don't behave badly and take out your frustrations with the employees. If you feel that aggrieved, it's a short walk to my office and you can apply for an exemption. No guarantees of course.

Crime wise, Cue hasn't been so good but we do our best with the evidence we have. Most offences have been committed and resolved quickly with offenders being promptly charged. We are hoping that will act as a deterrent for those offenders involved and reduce our crime.

Being tourist season, I also wanted to mention a couple of quick things to the prospectors out there. Please make sure you know how to use your GPS and stay with (near) your car. It is very easy to get lost and I know it first hand having had to searching for the odd lost person. Please make sure you are prepared and have a plan. A plan like, staying where you are, activating your Personal Locating Beacon, lighting a fire even so it makes lots of smoke, and even wrapping yourself in a space blanket. When we do get the AMSAR plane with the FLIR, we can't see you if you're cold, if your cold, your dead and that's a bad thing. Have a plan and tell someone where you're going and tell them when you got back.

You may have noticed that Phil hasn't been around for a bit and the upshot of that is that he and Beth have had a baby daughter Isla a few weeks back. As a result, they have decided it's best for them to be back in Perth where they have better support and Phil has been successful in getting a transfer back to Perth and is leaving shortly. 




