CHC NEWS

The CHC recently had a visit from some former residents of Cue. Graham Forth, and his daughter Roslyn, who brought some items to add to the CHC collection. Items include a church pew, dog trap, ox bell, farming implement and indigenous items. Among those are some rare clay items used as toys by children.

The pew was used in the Lutheran church at Day Dawn. During WW2 the Italian and German people around Cue were sent to internment camps. At the same time many of the church items were also moved around the state so it is fortunate that the pew has been well looked after and returned to its roots.

Graham arrived in Cue in 1948 at the age of 14. His first job in the same year was at the Bluegum tearooms which were across from the Queen of the Murchison. His sister was sent by a Gribble's Garage taxi from Cue to Big Bell hospital to have her baby as there was no doctor available in Cue. Graham left in the 1950s but has many fond memories of Cue so often drops in during his travels.

The CHC has also had one of the first Garrett metal detectors donated by Cheryl and Ken Upton. Cheryl, and her late-husband Paul, lived in Cue from 1984 – 1993. They ran the newsagency, grocery and butcher shops.

Paul's father, Jack Fenn, painted the scenes on the walls of the op shop and produced a set of charcoal/pencil line drawings of Cue landmarks. Jack also designed the Shire of Cue's logo around 1986. It is always great to learn some history of our town from past residents and we appreciate them adding to our displays in the CHC.

FROM THE CEO

The past month is probably the coldest weather I have experienced in my time in Cue, certainly the coldest June I have witnessed here. While it is quite refreshing in the mornings, the frost is unexpected, and the nights are a cold that is born of the desert. It is amazing how quickly this has changed from the warm weather we were getting just recently, and I am sure will be back again before we know it.

Shire of Cue Cr Les Price, Deputy Chief Executive Officer Glenn Boyes and I attended the Australian Local Government Association conference held in Canberra from 13 – 16 June 2023. It was a very busy week with the Regional Development Forum held on the first day. Delegates discussed a wide range of issues including regional connectivity, road maintenance, healthcare, climate resilience, natural disasters and skills shortages. Guest speakers for the forum included Federal Local Government Minister Kristy McBain, who discussed disaster mitigation and rural and regional health issues. Shadow Local Government Minister Darren Chester also addressed the conference and highlighted the importance of regional development and connectivity to support local communities. A number of delegates from the Murchison attended a meeting with Darren Chester at Parliament House on Tuesday afternoon to discuss the railway crossing safety improvements proposal that was presented at last year's conference.

Over 1,100 delegates from across Australia attended the National General Assembly of Local Government (NGA) to share innovations. Opening the NGA, the Governor-General, His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley thanked and acknowledged local governments for their dedication and work for local communities. Many federal members of parliament who attended and spoke at the NGA or associated events included Prime Minister the Hon Anthony Albanese, the Hon Catherine King, the Hon Kristy McBain, the Hon Peter Dutton and the Hon Darren Chester. Councils also welcomed His Excellency, Vasyl Myroshnychenko, Ukraine Ambassador, who provided an update on the Ukrainian people's progress to protect their national sovereignty and welcomed and encouraged sister city arrangements between Australian and Ukrainian regions.

The Australian Council of Local Government was held on Friday 16 June. This year's Assembly program included consideration of 260 notices of motions submitted by councils. These motions identify opportunities where a strong partnership between the Federal Government and local government can progress our mutual policy interests and the ALGA Board will now consider these in forming its policy positions and federal advocacy. These motions included solutions to address the financial sustainability of councils, climate change adaptation and renewable energy, improved transport and communications, improved natural disaster preparedness and management, Closing the Gap and the Voice, enhancing the circular economy and improving housing and homelessness outcomes through partnerships.



The Senior Citizens group in conjunction with volunteers from the Cue Tourist Park have done a great job of cleaning the premises and moving all the stock. The shop looks great and always worth a look as there is usually a gem that awaits among the shelves. Thank you to everyone involved.

Members of STORMCO (Service To Others Really Matters Company) are once again visiting Cue to present their school holiday programs from 3 to 8 July. The Kid's Club will be at the Shire Hall from 9.30am to 12.30pm, entry is free and snacks provided. The effort put in by this group over many years is outstanding and we thank them for visiting again this year.

Over sixty five people attended Abra Da Cameron who performed at the Shire Hall on Monday 19 June 2023. The audience enjoyed an interactive magic show with card tricks and Houdini style escape artistry with plenty of humor thrown in.

The Cue Aerodrome is open again following sealing works and line marking to the runway. This took a little longer than expected as the aerodrome could not be opened until the centre line marking was in place. The cold and damp weather did not hold things up too much and operations are back to normal again. The sealing works have been funded through assistance from the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program, Westgold Resources and the Shire of Cue.

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POLICE BEAT

Hello Cue and Visitors.

And as if on script, following last month's article about prospectors getting lost, that's exactly what occurred this month.

To give you all a bit of an idea of what is involved in a large-scale land search, I'll give you a quick insight.

On Saturday evening, Police received a call notifying us that a 72 year old male had not returned from prospecting after leaving his mates about 3 pm, in the Lake Austin area. The male had some medical issues which made the search all the more urgent with no food or water. We conducted a brief search on Saturday night to no avail in preparation for the following days.

The following day the search started in earnest with Police officers coming to Cue from Geraldton and Perth to assist. This included staff to set up a Police Command Centre, Emergency Operations Specialists helping with Planning, Logistics, Communications and Intelligence personnel.

We also used Police Airwing Aircraft to search at night and day with an Infrared radar, Mounted Section horses as well Specialist Trackers working alongside local Police Officers from nearby stations.

We were fortunate enough to have a group of SES volunteers assisting who came from Perth, Geraldton and Kalbarri to assist who searched on foot and in vehicles tirelessly for three days. I can't praise their efforts enough.



By day the end of Day 2 and early Day 3, our trackers had located the gentleman's foot prints crossing Lake Austin in the direction of Tuckabianna and were hot on his trail.

By the end of Day 3, the male had crossed the lake and was resting. Day 4 he was exhausted and could no longer walk. All personnel continued to search.

By Day 5, we were thinking the worst wasn't too far away for the gentleman and we had a lucky break with two searchers finding him under some trees on the northern side of the lake.

The gentleman was conveyed to Meekatharra Hospital with care from Allan (SJA Mt Magnet) where he rested and recovered for 5 days.

We were very lucky to have great outcome on this occasion but you all know there are plenty of searches that don't have a good result.

So there are a few lessons to be learnt from this for all you prospectors and I know I harp on about it but it's your safety that matters.

If you do find yourself lost, its best you stay where you are so we can find you. Do your best to make yourself easily seen from the air. A fire or some sort of sign on the ground would be good.

Don't keep moving, this just expands the search area and decreases our chances of finding you.





Dance of the Planets

Just as our daylight skies are ever-changing, with new sunsets and shifting cloud formations, our evening skies are constantly changing too, as the planets of our solar system appear to move across the sky throughout the year. The word planet means "wanderer", given by the ancient Greeks who studied the night sky and began to understand their orbits.

From our perspective here on Earth, as the planets continue their never-ending 'waltz' around the Sun, their orbits can sometimes bring the planets together to form incredible conjunctions or 'Planet Parties'.

Across the month of July, stargazers will be treated to a sunset display as Mars, Venus and Mercury take centre stage. Starting on the 10th, Mars will appear right next to the bright star Regulus and Venus! Keen eyed observers may also spot the ISS passing by this triplet of lights around 6pm. Watch Mars drift away from Regulus and Mercury and take centre stage throughout the month, culminating in Mercury making a very close approach to Regulus on the 29th. Even the Moon will join the party, making a close approach on the 20th and 21st!

When to look: Earlier in the month, watch from sunset to 7.30pm, by the end of July, this event can only be seen from 6.00pm to 6.30pm.

Which direction to look: West north-west, very low to the horizon.

They will continue their beautiful dance throughout July, and this will culminate with another special grouping on the 20th and 21st, when the stunning thin slither of the Moon joins the party to form a striking nightscape with Mars and Venus.

Enjoy the cosmic views stargazers.

Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act 2021 **How am I impacted?**

The Department of Planning Lands, and Heritage will be conducting an Education and Information Workshop on the implementation and operation of the Guidelines and Regulations around the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act 2021.

The Department will present the workshop in Mt. Magnet on 27th July 2023 and in Meekatharra on 28th July 2023.

All land more than 1,100sqm will be impacted by the new rules which requires owners to be aware of Aboriginal Heritage in areas where ground disturbance is proposed.

The department will take attendees through some practical examples of how identify the Tier level of activity, to access the new online portal and the processes to be undertaken in seeking a permit or preparing a management plan, depending on the extent of the project being planned and its impact on ground disturbance.

This act affects out pastoralists, residential landowners (over 1,100sqm), Local Governments, mining companies and other stakeholders including prospectors.

Anyone who is affected is urged to attend one of these workshops so that you are fully away of the implications of the new Act.



Referendums

A federal referendum is a national vote on a question about a proposed change to the Constitution. The Constitution is the founding document for how our country is governed. There have been 44 referendums held since 1901. It's been quite a while since we held one - the last referendum was more than 20 years ago in 1999.

Who needs to vote

All Australian citizens aged 18 and over must vote in a referendum. You must be enrolled and you should update your enrolment details if you have:

- recently changed your name or address
- turned 18. or
- become an Australian citizen.

Visit aec.gov.au or pick up an enrolment form from any AEC office.

When and where to vote

Voting day will be held on a Saturday with polling places open between 8am and 6pm around the country.

Mobile polling teams will also visit many remote areas in the weeks leading up to voting day.

If you can't make it on the day, you may be eligible to vote early either in person or by post.

How to vote


Voting in a referendum is different to an election. You only need to complete one ballot paper.

The ballot paper will show a question about a proposed change to the Constitution. To vote, write 'yes' if you approve or 'no' if you do not approve the proposed change.


At the polling place, you can ask a polling official, friend, or family member for help on how to cast a formal vote.



Ask for another ballot paper and start again.



Write YES if you approve the proposed change



Write NO if you do not approve the proposed change

OR

How the result is decided

The proposed change to the Constitution must be approved by a 'double majority' - that is:

- a national majority of formal votes cast (more than 50%) from all states and territories, and
- a majority of formal votes cast (more than 50%) in a majority of states (at least four of the six states).





The result is binding. This means the Australian Government must act on what voters decide.

Mythbusting referendums

MYTH: Referendums can be held about any topic or law. FACT: They're only held to make a proposed change to the Constitution.

MYTH: The 2017 marriage law survey was a referendum or plebiscite.

FACT: It was a postal survey, and participation was optional.

MYTH: It's not compulsory to vote in a referendum.

FACT: You must vote if you're an Australian citizen aged 18 and over.

MYTH: I need to enrol separately.

FACT: If you're enrolled for elections, you're enrolled for referendums too. Just make sure your details are up to date.

MYTH: I can only vote by post.

FACT: You can vote on the day or check your eligibility to vote early in person or by post by visiting aec.gov.au closer to the time.

MYTH: A referendum needs 70% or more 'yes' votes to pass. FACT: It must be approved by more than 50% of voters from all states and territories, and more than 50% of voters in a majority of states (at least four of the six states). This is the 'double majority'.

Stop and consider the source

Your vote at the referendum will help make an important decision for Australia.

During the referendum period, you may come across information that is deliberately misleading. Stop, check, and consider the source of what you see, hear, or read. Don't be misled by disinformation this referendum.

Role of the AEC

The AEC is an independent and impartial statutory authority.

Its role at the referendum is to provide enrolment, voting and information services.

While the AEC will deliver a yes/no pamphlet to Australian households, the information in this product is produced by Parliament. Beyond the delivery of the pamphlet, the AEC has no involvement with campaigns for or against the proposed change to the Constitution.


