CHC News

In October a very large pair of crucible tongs was donated by Brian.

Crucible tongs are handheld metal tools for holding and transporting hot crucibles. They come in many styles with most resembling scissors, forceps or tweezers. Instead of blades there are two metal grips that concave together which allows the user to grasp a hot crucible safely. Our display item has a scissor-like action.

Tongs have been an indispensable partner of the crucible since the ancient origins of metalworking. Nesting a crucible in hot coals was a primitive way of smelting metals and ores but created a challenge when it came time to remove it from the heat.

Crucible tongs are typically longer than other tongs. The length provides the user some distance from the flame, the crucible and any chemicals inside it.

Crucible-specific tongs came about in the Medieval era as smithing and alchemy grew. There were many types of tongs in the following centuries, specific to the smith or artisan who used them but patterns emerged and were replicated. Crucible tongs with bent jaws were designed for handling the crucibles from the edge of the dish. Others were more like long

tweezers with bowed tips to accommodate the crucibles' round sides more securely. There were also crucible tongs resembling long-handled pliers with rounded jaws that functioned like a hybrid of both previous styles. Ours is an example of this.

In the 19th and early 20th centuries, crucible tongs began to be

associated with scientists, foundry workers and gold miners.

The CHC has a couple of different crucible and blacksmith tongs but the chances of finding a crucible to fit such huge tongs is highly unlikely. If anyone has mining crucible tongs they would be happy to add to the collection it would be most welcome.



The Annual Meeting of Electors will be held on Monday 12 February at 5.30pm in the Council Chambers. The Annual General Meeting of Electors provides an opportunity for electors to discuss the contents of the previous year's Annual Report and to address any other general business. I encourage all electors to attend.

This month we've had numerous sightings of snakes in town. We ask everyone to be vigilant as the hot weather brings out the snakes in and around town, which means they are out of hibernation and active again. Please use caution when out walking. Keeping grass short and cleaning up around the yard will help to keep them away.

Residents are asked to be mindful of the potential for heavy rains and damaging winds in the early months of the year. Please secure any loose items around yards, particularly if you are going away and use caution on Shire roads after rain. Arrangements to have any larger items removed can made by contacting the Manager of Works and Services at the Shire.

Dog owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their dogs contained within the boundaries of their property or on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained dogs in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Mosquito fogging operations are being undertaken when weather conditions allow. Residents are asked to check their properties and remove any potential mosquito breeding areas, by emptying containers holding water, ensuring gutters are not holding water and checking yards for areas that hold water.

February 2024

The Moon has a lot to offer us this year, including lunar *occultations* (when an object, such as the Moon, appears to move in front of another, blocking it from view) and several conjunctions (when two astronomical objects, likes planets, appear close together in the sky). If you want to make the most of your summer stargazing, we recommend escaping to an Astrotourism Town in country WA and enjoying an unspoilt view of the sky.

15th February Lunar conjunction with Jupiter

On 15th February, the moon is a beautiful waxing crescent — and it's visible in conjunction with the king of the planets, Jupiter, all evening. The pair are sitting together in the constellation of Aries. For best visibility, look north-west around 7.45pm. This conjunction is a good one for naked-eye stargazing or viewing with a pair of binoculars. You'll be able to follow the conjunction until the moon sets at 10.29pm and Jupiter follows a few minutes behind.

Check out the image from Stellarium above to get an idea of what to look for with the conjunction of Jupiter and February's moon.

When and where to look: 7.40pm, 15th February in the north-western sky.

18th February Lunar occultation of the star, Elnath

Three days later, on the 18th, February's moon blesses us again — this time with an occultation of the star Elnath. An occultation is when an object, such as the moon, appears to move in front of another, blocking it from view (like with a solar eclipse, when the moon appears to block the sun), and Elnath is visible in our night sky from around 7.45pm.

Also known as *Beta Tauri*, Elnath is around 700 times the luminosity of our sun, but because it's approximately 134 light years from Earth, it is only the *second*-brightest star in the constellation of Taurus. At 10.22pm (AWST), the star will appear to vanish behind the moon, and to appreciate this conjunction fully, we recommend a pair of binoculars.

The star will appear to disappear into the dark limb of the Moon. This will make it easier to see, rather than when it reappears just after 11.35pm from the bright limb of the Moon.

When to look: The occultation of the moon and Elnath starts at 10.22pm on 18th February, but it's best to start watching from about 10pm. The star will begin to reappear at 11.35pm. **Which direction to look:** Look to the north-western sky.





Leap Year - 2024

2024 is a leap year, here is an article with facts about the phenomenon.

Every four years, we have an extra day in February, this is called a leap year. While this phenomenon may seem like a simple adjustment on the calendar, it carries historical, cultural and scientific significance.

The origins of the leap year date back to ancient Rome – Julius Caesar's time. The Roman calendar was based on the lunar system, whish resulted in misalignments with the solar year. To rectify the misalignments Julius Caesar introduced the Julian calendar, which would add an extra day to the calendar every four years.

The Julian calendar was still not perfect in its alignment with the solar year and by the 16th century, the discrepancy led to the Gregorian calendar being introduced in the late 1500s. The Gregorian calendar is the most widely used calendar today.

The leap year left its mark on various cultures around the world. Traditionally, the leap year was the year women could propose to men. Superstitions also surround the leap year, such as bad luck and unpredictable weather patterns.

The mathematics behind leap year is an intriguing aspect, showcasing the precision with which we measure time. The Earth takes approximately 365.2422 days to orbit the sun. To account for this fractional part of a day, the leap year system adjusts our calendars every four years, adding an extra day to keep our reckoning of time in sync with the astronomical year.

Leap years also play a crucial role in astronomy, influencing the timing of events like the equinoxes and solstices. The additional day helps align our calendars with the Earth's axial tilt and the changing seasons.

A leap year is more than just an adjustment to our calendars – it represents a fascinating intersection of history, culture, mathematics and astronomy. As we celebrate each leap year, it serves as a reminder of our ongoing efforts to understand and measure the passage of time. So, embrace the extra day, explore its cultural nuances and marvel at the precision with which humanity has crafted a calendar that mirrors the dance of our planet around the sun.

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

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


