CHC News

On a recent visit to a distant station some items were collected for the CHC. We discussed the probability of finding a large crucible to fit the giant tongs found at another station a couple of months earlier. Everyone agreed it was unlikely as most gold mining crucibles were broken up to extract the most minute particles of gold that may be present in the pots.

On walking around the plethora of discarded mining equipment there was a sudden whoop of excitement in the distance. Phil had seen an object mostly buried but the outline suggested something interesting. On digging it up there was a giant crucible that looked as though it would fit in the jaws of the tongs.

Back in Cue, the tongs and crucible made a perfect match. The crucible has had bricks painted onto it so it's believed it was once used as a garden planter when its mining days were over. It is remarkable that it is one piece after so many years underground. **Historical information**

Assay is a process of metallurgy and chemical analysis used to determine proportions of precious metals in ores such as silver or gold. The process helps identify pollutants present within a sample and can indicate a high level of pollution in a mining site.



Stoneware crucibles are used in the fire assay process due to their ability to withstand high temperatures. Fire assay is a process where samples from the mine are ground into a fine powder and then mixed with dry powder chemicals. This mixture is heated in а crucible to extreme temperatures until all of the powders fuse into a glass-like slag. Once this reaction is complete, the contents are poured into a cooled. The mould and mixture is separated in a fire assay cupel which will reveal a button of precious metals.



From the CEO

I hope everyone survived the hot temperatures we endured during the month of February. Thankfully we had 21mm of rain in Cue on Saturday 24 February accompanied by very strong gusts of wind. This is a timely reminder for all of us to be mindful to secure any loose items around yards, particularly if you are going away and use caution on Shire roads after rain. Arrangements to have any larger items removed can made by contacting the Manager of Works and Services at the Shire.

Council received Cr Neil Montgomery's resignation on 11 February 2024. I would like to thank Cr Neil Montgomery for his contribution to Council. We wish Neil and Melanie all the best for their future endeavours and thank both of them for their time in Cue.

The Annual Meeting of Electors was held on Monday 12 February at 5.30pm in the Council Chambers. The minutes from this meeting are published on our website <u>www.cue.wa.gov.au</u>. A small turnout of electors attended the meeting and discussions were held on topics such as mining artifacts, solar power allocations, traffic concerns and historic buildings.

On Friday 16 February 2024 more than 160 people paid their respects by attending Rodney Dongara's funeral in Cue. Rodney was a very well respected and liked member of our community who will be greatly missed.

The Shire has secured a transportable office to be used as a Refuse site office. We are working towards having a transfer station located at the entrance where refuse will be sorted and made available for reuse with the intention of minimising the amount of waste going into landfill and maximising recycling initiatives.

The National General Assembly of the Australian Local Government Association is holding its annual conference in Canberra from 2 - 5 July 2024. Five Councillors and myself have nominated to attend the week which will provide a great opportunity for Councillor's personal development and to represent the Murchison region. The Regional Development Forum will enable shires to discuss regional issues and opportunities. The General Assembly provides partnership between Local Governments and Federal Governments on a wide range of policy positions and the opportunity to submit motions directly relating to local government challenges.

The Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions has expressed an interest in leasing the Shire of Cue owned industrial property located at Lot 592 Heydon Place, Cue. For further information please see the Public Notice in this edition of the Dryblower.

The Shire of Cue is commencing an initiative to have a Seniors Morning Tea, every month at the Queen of the Murchison to encourage the senior members of our shire to come together. This is an opportunity to have a cuppa and chat, and also to raise any ideas and/or concerns as shire staff will be in attendance.

The outdoor exercise area located next to the Town Oval has had artificial turf laid under the equipment to make this area more enjoyable to use. The Shire conducted a Bulk Rubbish collection on Monday 19 February 2024. Thank you to everyone who participated. Patching works have been completed on the Beringarra-Cue Road north of the Wilgie Mia turnoff.

The Shire has some blocks of land for sale that have been taken possession by the Shire for non-payment of rates. More information is available on the Shire notice boards and website.

We are still getting reports of snake sightings in town. We ask everyone to be vigilant as the hot weather brings out the snakes in and around town, which means they are out of hibernation and active again. Please use caution when out walking. Keeping grass short and cleaning up around the yard will help to keep them away. This month a number of shire workers participated in a Snake Handling Course. Once the shire has secured the correct equipment, we may be able to assist in the removal of snakes, when required.

Dog owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their dogs contained within the boundaries of their property or on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained dogs in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Following the recent rains, mosquito fogging operations may be undertaken when weather conditions allow. Residents are asked to check their properties and remove any potential mosquito breeding areas, by emptying containers holding water, ensuring gutters are not holding water and checking yards for areas that hold water.

Proposed Lease of Lot 592 Heydon Place, Cue

In accordance with Section 3.58(3) of the Local Government Act 1995, notice is hereby given that the Shire of Cue proposes the following disposition:

 Lease of the Shire of Cue owned industrial property located at Lot 592 Heydon Place, Cue to Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions. The proposed lease is for 2 years and will be reviewed within three months of expiry. Rental for the property is proposed at \$26,000 per annum or \$500 per week, payable monthly in advance. All outgoings are to be paid for by the tenant. The property valuation as of 30 Jun 2023 determined its fair value to be \$367,000. This was declared as a true indication of the current market value of the property for the purpose of satisfying section 3.58(4)(c)(ii) of the Local Government Act 1995.

Submissions are invited with respect to the proposed disposition. All written submissions should be forwarded to the Shire of Cue - PO Box 84 Cue, WA 6640 by 4.00pm on 12 March 2024.

Council News

Hi Everyone,

How the days roll into weeks and then months! The official business of Council got underway in February 2024 following a long break over Christmas and the New Year.

Following the Local Government Elections in October 2023 the then Cue Primary School Headmaster, Mr Neil Montgomery was elected as first time Councillor to the Shire of Cue. Council was looking forward to working with Neil particularly with his hands on involvement with the parents and children of the school. On 11th February 2024 Neil advised Council that he had taken up a role as Headmaster at the Dwellingup Primary School and would not be residing in Cue and therefore, tendered his resignation as a Councillor. CEO Richard Towell formally accepted Neil's resignation on 15th February 2024. Neil was looking forward to serving the people of Cue; however, through circumstance Neil's elected member role was short lived. He will be missed at Forums and Council Meetings.

We wish Neil and Mel every success in their future endeavours.

At present the Council is functioning with six (6) Councillors until a new election is held. The timing of a further election is a matter for the CEO to determine in conjunction with the WA Electoral Commission following which ratepayers and residents will be advised by way of a Public Notice.

The role of a Councillor is a critical part of the fabric of our community and, for those who aspire to serve on Council, I ask that you give some thought to nominating at the appropriate time. The role is a rewarding one particularly when both the Council and the Administration are working together for your benefit and the benefit of the town.

Councillors attended the monthly Forum along with the CEO Richard Towell and Deputy CEO, Glenn Boyes and other administration staff. These Forums are informal and provide Councillors with an opportunity to discuss any matters of interest affecting the community. The CEO and Works Supervisor, John Curtin, provided Councillors with an update on current work related activities within Shire. Councillors have the opportunity to ask questions and discuss various operational aspects of the Shire.

The Forum also provides Council with financial performance data relating to the Cue Airport and the Cue Caravan Park and it is satisfying to see that both of these activities are making a valuable contribution to the overall financial sustainability of the Shire. The financial management of the Shire's resources has placed us in a sound position going forward.

The Annual Electors' Meeting was held on Monday 11th February 2024, and it was pleasing to see some representation from the ratepayer community participate in the meeting, where the Annual Report was presented for consideration. The meeting provided an opportunity for participants to have their say, engage with Council and the Administration about projects and activities being undertaken and those proposed for future consideration. The Annual Report contains a lot of valuable information about the performance of your Shire and includes Economic, Leadership, Social and Environmental Strategies of the Shire as well as Financial and Governance Reports. Councillor Ian Dennis and I went to Mt. Magnet on Wednesday 14th February 2024 for a meeting of the Murchison Regional Vermin Council ('MRVC'), of which the Shire of Cue is a member. Councillor Dennis and I represent your Shire on that Council. An Audit Committee Meeting was held prior to the Council meeting and CEO Geoff Brookes has done an outstanding job in managing the affairs of the MRVC.

One of the main discussion items was the completion of construction and the ongoing maintenance of the new vermin cell, which is the main function of the MRVC. The MRVC is a small Regional council stablished in 1963 with the prime function of constructing and maintaining a vermin proof fence for the protection of livestock. At the moment the concentration is around wild dogs which have decimated the sheep and wool industry in the Southern Rangelands. Successful pastoral businesses have a direct impact on local businesses not to mention the economic value to the State of Western Australia. Therefore, the MRVC has a key role to play in controlling the incursion of wild dogs and large herbivores.

A further item which came up for discussion was around the ongoing cost of running the council which is now becoming prohibitive with financial reporting, audit processes and regulatory compliance the main contributor. It is for this reason that the Local government Act 1995, allows for the establishment of a Regional Subsidiary in place of a formally established Council like the MRVC. At this stage all member Local Governments of the MRVC have agreed to move towards the establishment of a Regional Subsidiary. The Council has been working with the Western Australian Local Government Association to develop a charter for that purpose. Once approved by the Minister the Regional Subsidiary can be established. It is important that residents and ratepayers are aware of the additional activities that are happening within your town and the region in general.

On 1st February 2024 I met with the CEO to discuss the possibility of including Cue as a stopover destination for private air services currently enroute to Mt. Magnet, Meekatharra and Wiluna. Skippers Aviation has a 5 year agreement with approval from the WA State Government to service these towns and Cue was not included. I had recently contacted both Skippers Aviation and the Department of Transport seeking some explanation as to the reason for Cue's exclusion. The CEO and I had an online meeting with Ms. Natalie Webb and other senior representatives from the Department to see if there was any appetite to include Cue in its flight scheduling.

We put forward many reasons why Cue should be included as a destination none being more obvious than Skippers Aviation flies over Cue to Meekatharra and back over Cue for the return to Mt. Magnet then on to Perth. The meeting focused on the commercial considerations an airline would need to take into account before committing to making changes to its scheduling program. Local population numbers, mining population, potential users, existing mining flight charters, and tourism activity were some of the factors to be reviewed. Skippers Aviation has a minimum number of monthly passenger flights for each of its destinations which determine the economic viability of the route and Cue is unlikely to achieve that target based on current estimates.

We will keep in contact with the Department of Transport in the hope that the circumstances change, and our town can have a regular aviation service.

Council was pleased to see the completion of the Cue Hospital Incinerator/'Pizza Oven' which can be seen on the approach to the Cue township. Council is very mindful of preserving its unique history and we thank stonemason Nick for his excellent workmanship.

My role as the Murchison Country Zone representative on the Council of the Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA') has started off with a busy schedule. WALGA represents all 139 Local Governments across the State with the aim of advocating to the State Government on the many issues that confront the sector.

On 7th February I attended the State Council Information Forum which provides all 24 State Councillors with an opportunity to bring forward and discuss the pressing issues of the day. The Information Forum is similar to the Cue Shire Council Forums we conduct each month.

My role with WALGA extends to being a member of the Environment and Waste Policy Team which comprises four (4) WALGA State Councillors. Our prime focus is on all things environment and waste related. Both of these topics are now the centre of attention as the Federal Government seeks to reach a target of Net Zero emissions by 2050. I chair this team and met with members on 16th February 2024.

On 20th February 2024 I attended a WALGA Selection Committee meeting to determine a number of recommended Nominations for a variety of advisory and Government related appointments. Such positions can include the Library Board of WA, the Local Government Standards Panel, Local Health Authorities Analytical Committee and Fluoridation Advisory Committee amongst others. I encourage all of our Elected Members and Local Government Officers to give consideration to nominating for any one or more positions of interest that come up from time to time. Such roles can be very rewarding.

Finally, on 21st February 2024 I also attended the Metropolitan Waste Advisory Council ('MWAC') meeting where I and other State Councillors represent WALGA. Our business centres on waste management, the container deposit scheme (which local Cue business 'Ethos Recycling' is an active participant) and other topical issues. Concerns around landfill, hazardous waste management and policy development over the potential implementation of a waste levy are but some of the matters we discussed at the meeting.

February 2024 has turned out to be a busy month and I and all Councillors look forward to hearing from you should you wish to raise and discuss any issue that is of concern to you. Please contact anyone of the Councillors as we are here to represent you and the interests of the wider community.

The new Shire website is now up and running and I urge you to explore the site to see the significant changes and to familiarise yourself with the new layout. Any suggestions to better the product or make changes is most welcome. Check out our new site at https://www.cue.wa.gov.au.

On a final note, on 12th February 2024 I and other Councillors along with representatives of the Cue Shire Administration attended the funeral of Rodney Dongara. The large number of family and friends who attended the funeral is a testament to the respect Rodney had from those who knew him and those whose path he crossed on his journey. Our thoughts are with Dianne and the family. Rodney will be missed around town.

SunSmart relaunches graphic campaign Two sides of the Sun to educate people living in the Midwest/Gascoyne regions that it is UV not hot weather that causes skin damage. When the UV is 3 or above, protect yourself!

Australia has the highest rate of skin cancer in the world, yet it is highly preventable by using sun protection. There were nearly 200 deaths from skin cancer in Western Australia in 2020 and more than 117,000 skin cancer treatments in 2023.

Diagnosis and treatment of skin cancer is estimated to cost the WA health system approximately \$172 million per year.

Two sides of the sun was originally launched during the summer of 2021/2022 and the latest phase of this campaign has just been launched and shows us that there are two sides of the sun; a pleasant and nurturing side, and a dangerous side which can lead to skin damage and skin cancer.

This campaign hopes to motivate people to use multiple sun protection strategies during outdoor activities when UV levels reach 3 or above. UV not heat causes skin damage and UV can still be high on cool or cloudy days – it is different to heat and can't be felt. Protect your skin in five ways – Slop, Slop, Slap, Seek & Slide.

The campaign will run from February – May 2024 on radio (including digital audio), out-of-home and online channels (including social media and search activity).

- A new spot or mole on your skin that is red, pale or pearly in colour
- A spot that is different from other spots on your skin
- Any crusty or non-healing sores
- Any spots, freckles or any moles changing in size (width), thickness (height), colour, or shape



BBQ Sweet Potato Wedges & Haloumi Salad

INGREDIENTS

- 500g sweet potato cut into wedges
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 tsp lemon, herb & garlic spice blend
- 180g packet haloumi, sliced
- 2 baby cos lettuce, leaves thickly sliced
- 1/2 small red onion, thinly sliced
- 1 Lebanese cucumber, thinly sliced
- 150g chickpeas, rinsed
- 1/2 cup fresh mint leaves
- 125ml dressing of choice

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Place sweet potato in a microwave-safe bowl. Cover with a square of wet paper towel. Microwave on high for 5 minutes or until just tender. Drizzle over half the oil and half the spice blend. Toss until coated. Preheat a barbecue grill or chargrill pan on mediumhigh. Grill sweet potato, turning occasionally, for 5 minutes or until lightly charred.
- 2. Meanwhile, pat dry the haloumi with paper towel. Sprinkle with remaining spice blend. Heat remaining oil in a non-stick frypan over medium heat. Cook haloumi for 1-2 minutes each side or until golden.
- 3. Arrange the cos leaves in a serving bowl. Top with the onion, cucumber, sweet potato, haloumi, chickpeas and mint. Season to taste. Drizzle over the dressing to serve. Enjoy.



Delightful Watermelon Cake

INGREDIENTS

- 1 kg watermelon
- 250 g low-fat fresh ricotta
- 1 lime
- 2 tbs maple syrup

- 1 fig cut into wedges
- 2 tbs roasted unsalted pistachios
- 1 handful fresh mint leaves
- 2 tbs extra maple syrup to decorate

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Using a peeler gently peel the rind of the lime and slice each piece into long, fine strips. Retain 2 tablespoons of juice from the lime.
- 2. In a small bowl combine the ricotta, lime juice and maple syrup. Set everything aside until ready for dessert.
- 3. Remove the skin and rind from the watermelon keeping the fruit in one piece. From the flesh, cut a thick, circular cake-like piece of fruit. Keep the remainder to decorate or eat!
- 4. Before serving: On a serving dish, place the piece of watermelon down. Top with the ricotta mixture. Top the ricotta with the fig, mint leaves, pistachios and lime rind. Drizzle the top with maple syrup if desired.
- 5. Cut into wedges and serve!

How to treat a snake bite

Snake bites are not common in Australia, but all should be treated as life threatening. Snakes force venom out under pressure through fangs in the upper jaw. The spread of snake venom depends on its absorption through the lymphatic system.

What to do

- 1. Follow <u>DRSABCD St John Action Plan</u>.
- 2. Urgent medical aid. Call Triple Zero (000) for an ambulance.
- 3. Ensure the casualty does not move.
- 4. Lay the casualty down, rest and reassure.
- 5. If the bite is on a limb, apply a broad pressure bandage over the bite site as soon as possible.
- 6. Then apply a further elasticised or firm bandage start at fingers or toes and move up the limb as far as can be reached. Apply tightly but without stopping blood flow.
- 7. Splint the limb including the joints on either side of the bite.
- 8. Write down the time that the casualty was bitten and when the bandage was applied.
- 9. If the casualty becomes unconscious and not breathing normally, Commence CPR & Defibrillation.

Do not

- Do not wash the venom off the skin (it may aid in identification).
- Do not cut the bitten area and try to suck the venom out of the wound.
- Do not use a tourniquet.
- Do not try and catch the snake.

Signs and symptoms

- Visible in an hour or more after the person has been bitten.
- In children, signs and symptoms may appear within minutes.
- Paired fang marks, but often only a single mark or a scratch mark may be present. Marks or scratches may bleed.
- Nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea.
- Headache, drowsiness, giddiness or faintness.
- Double or blurred vision, drooping eyelids.
- Voice changes, trouble speaking or swallowing.Pain or tightness in the throat, chest or abdomen.
- Breathing difficulties, respiratory weakness or arrest.

Caused by

• Fangs puncturing the skin.


