# From the CEO

It is with sadness that I acknowledge the passing of Petronelle (Pixie) Pigdon and pass on condolences to Ross and family on behalf of the Shire of Cue. Pixie passed away on 17 April 2024 and a funeral service was held on 29 April 2024. Pixie served on Council from 2012 to 2017 and supported many community groups to bring positive change for the benefit of Cue.

Wayne Bramwell, Managing Direct of Westgold Resources Limited provided a community update on 8 April 2024. Wayne provided an overview of Westgold's operations in and around Cue as well as answered any questions from the community members in attendance. The main topics from the community centered around local employment opportunities, weather Westgold would consider allowing visitors to access Westgold leases for prospecting and the future use of the Brega Wells property.

The CRC held their opening night for the new gazebo on Saturday 13 April 2024. 

Be a witness to your kids success!







This year, viewing of the eta-Aquarids Meteor Shower will be limited by the Moon. The Eta-Aquarid Meteor Shower is active from 19th April to 28th May with the peak happening on 6th May. It's predicted that there will be up to 30 meteors per hour at the peak of activity. It's worth trying to see this meteor shower on the nights either side.

#### When and where to look:

The peak of the meteor shower can be seen from the evening of 6th May to the early morning of 7th May. Look near to Saturn in the east for the radiant point of this meteor shower.

#### Do I Need a Telescope to see a Meteor Shower?

You don't need a telescope or binoculars to see a meteor shower. It's a great time to gather with friends, roll out your favourite picnic rug, pack the drinks and snacks, and start counting how many "shooting stars" you all see!

It's best to view a meteor shower under a dark night sky. Most meteors will be quite faint so darker surroundings will make it easier to see them. You might consider heading out to a dark sky location at one of WA's Astrotourism Towns. If you're an astrophotographer, it is an excellent opportunity to image meteors over some of WA's iconic landscapes. Where are WA's Astrotourism Towns? Fingers crossed for a spectacular show!

#### What is a meteor shower?

Meteors are caused by debris entering Earth's atmosphere. The debris can be as small as a grain of sand which burns up in the atmosphere and causes a bright streak of light to appear briefly in our night sky. The debris that causes a meteor can be travelling between 11 to 73 km/second.

A meteor shower is a time when you see lots of "shooting stars". They are the result of Earth passing through the trail of debris left by a comet or other object that has come into our Solar System and orbited around the Sun.

The Eta Aquarid Meteor Shower is a result of Earth passing through the debris left by the well-known Halley's Comet. Earth also passes through Halley's Comet trail of debris in October which gives us the Orionids Meteor Shower.

# Council News

Hi to all 'Dryblower' readers,

April 2024 was again a busy time for Councillors and the Shire Administration with much activity focused on the Western Australian Local Government Association (WALGA) Murchison Country Zone Meeting, affectionately referred to as the 'Cue Parliament'.

April started off with WALGA holding its usual Information Forum on 3<sup>rd</sup> April with the main topic of discussion being Emergency Management Plans Policies and Agreements. Being prepared for an emergency is critical as well as having the capacity to recover from the event and having adequate available resources.

On 8<sup>th</sup> April Westgold Resources Ltd undertook a Community Update at the Cue Town Hall with Managing Director Wayne Bramwell, along with his team, delivering a 'meet and greet' session and providing the community with an update on the company's mining activities. The company is moving in a new direction and community engagement is an area of focus. Local employment opportunities and concerns over the inability of visiting prospectors to conduct their activities on Westgold mining tenements were some of the concerns raised by the attendees.

Councillors attended the Cue Shire Council Forum on 9<sup>th</sup> April which provided the opportunity to discuss the progress of current projects in and around the town and the status of new projects coming on stream. Councillors were provided with a briefing from CEO Richard Towell and Luke, Acting Works Supervisor, on the day-to-day activities.

Councillor Ian Dennis and I attended the Murchison Regional Vermin Council Meeting in Mt. Magnet on 10<sup>th</sup> April. The MRVC has the responsibility of constructing and maintaining the vermin proof fence which has been constructed around 52 pastoral leases and aims to prevent the incursion of wild dogs, which ultimately impacts the production of livestock and pastoral businesses.

The Council has been very supportive of the Cue Community Resource Centre, and we were fortunate to be invited to attend the opening of the new gazebo on 13<sup>th</sup> April. This will be a great asset to the town, and we have CRC Chairman Catherine Willett, supported by CRC Manager, Julie Humphreys, to thank for their dedication in bringing this project to fruition. For those who have not visited the CRC come in and browse through the shop and take a look at the gazebo.

WALGA conducted a Selection Committee meeting on 16<sup>th</sup> April which, I attended as part of my role on the State Council. The meeting considers the appointment or recommendations for an appointment, to various Government positions which, in this instance, related to the Local Government Grants Commission and the Local Government Advisory Board. Both these roles are of significant to all local Governments but more so, to the smaller regional councils who rely so much on funding for various planned projects. We encourage all elected members and Local Government Officers to apply for these roles to not only broaden their knowledge but consider opportunities which might result from these roles.

The monthly Shire Council meeting was held on 16<sup>th</sup> April. Council considered and adopted the Cue Master Plan 2025-2029 - the proposed Recreation Precinct project adjacent to the railway building. This is a significant plan, and it is hoped that funding from the Department of Infrastructure through the 'Growing Regions Program' will see the plan evolve. The April 2024 Shire Council Meeting Agenda sets out the concept and it is worth seeing what we have planned.

The meeting also adopted the draft 2025-2029 Corporate Business Plan. The Administration has worked tirelessly to provide a plan that sits within the Vision, Mission and Values of our community.

On 17<sup>th</sup> April I attended a further meeting of WALGA's Selection Panel to consider further matters related to the recommendations adopted at the meeting on 16<sup>th</sup> April. The appointments we recommend are presented to the relevant Minister for consideration. These appointments are a valuable connection between the two tiers of Government being the State Government and the Local Government sector.

Councillors were invited to attend the Sundowner on 19<sup>th</sup> April which was held at the Cue Community Resource Centre. This event is the precursor to the 'Cue Parliament', which is held the following day. The event was held in the CRC's new gazebo and gives Councillors and those who attend the opportunity to network with representatives from organisations like Regional Development Australia Mid-West Gascoyne, Westgold Resources Ltd, Main Roads Geraldton, DFES, the ABC, Civic Legal, David Price Consulting along with many others who attended the event. With the help of CRC staff, Tracy Bachraty prepared the Cue Heritage Centre with a well laid out restaurant like area for all attendees to enjoy a sumptuous meal topped off with a pavlova and cheesecake dessert. Thanks also go to the Cue Shire Staff for preparing the evening cuisine and making the evening a success.







On 19<sup>th</sup> April the CEO, Richard Towell and I attended the April 2024 meeting of the Murchison Country Zone meeting ('Cue Parliament') which was held in the Cue Sire Council Chambers. Representative from our six (6) Murchison Shires of Meekatharra, Yalgoo, Sandstone, Cue and Mt. Magnet and the Shire of Murchison converged on Cue to discuss issues which impact our local shires and the region in general. The meeting was attended by members of Parliament with Hon Melissa Price MP, Hon Merome Beard MLA and Hon Shane Love MLA providing the meeting with an insight into the activities of the Federal and State Governments. Representatives from various Departments including DFES, MRD, WACHS, Regional Development Australia Mid-West Gascoyne, Water Corporation and Mid-West Development Commission made themselves available. The ABC Mid-West also attended while Anthony Quahe from Civic Legal provided an overview of the services on offer which might affect Local Government, and David Price from David Price Consulting provided an entertaining presentation on meeting procedures.

As usual, the Cue Shire Staff worked tirelessly to make the event a huge success. Thanks also to Helen and the Murchison Club Hotel for putting on the lunch. Rosco Foulkes-Taylor from the Shire of Murchison chaired another successful meeting for the Murchison Country Zone of WALGA.







All Councillors attended a training session on 20th April in which David Price delivered an informative presentation on Councillor Meeting Procedures while Anthony Quahe from Civic Legal presented to Councillors on their roles and responsibilities as elected Members.

I also attended WALGA's Metropolitan Waste advisory Council on 24<sup>th</sup> April. Topics relating to waste and waste recovery, hazardous and e-waste, landfill, product stewardship, the circular waste economy along with a discussion on the proposed waste levy.

25th April saw a well-attended ANZAC Day Dawn Service followed by a hearty breakfast at the Murchison Club Hotel. This ANZAC Day service was of special significance. Arthur Stanley Gurney VC is remembered by those in our town for his feats on the battlefield where he sacrificed his life for the freedom we enjoy today. Amongst those who attended the Dawn Service was Phil Gurney, a great grandnephew of Arthur and we were pleased to invite Phil to lay a wreath in Arthur's honour.





On a more sombre note, I make mention of the passing of one of Cue's favourite residents and former Councillors, Petronelle (Pixie) Pigdon who passed away recently. Not only was Pixie fondly remembered in Cue but highly regarded across the Murchison region where she worked as a nurse and at Bell's Emporium in Cue.

Pixie served on the Cue Shire Council from May 2012 to October 2017, where she was a fearless and proactive supporter of Cue and all that it had to offer. As a Councillor Pixie was a selfless advocate for Cue and stood firm on her principles and beliefs.

Pixie was a member on the Mid West Health Board for four years and served tirelessly to improve the health services in the Murchison region and fought to have two nurses located in Cue. Pixie also assisted the Cue Nursing Post when required to relieve pressure from the nursing staff at that time.

Such was Pixie's dedication to her role as a Councillor and the town of Cue she was also one of the founding members of the Cue Community Resource Centre. Pixie served on the CRC Board and dedicated her time to ensuring that Cue was able to be part of a wider CRC network whereby visitors, tourists, and town folk could have access to a range of Government services which included Centrelink, Department of Transport and others as well as access to a computer network for people to undertake online banking and attend to emails.




