

We look forward to another month filled with creativity, community, and memorable events at the Cue CRC!







From the CEO

We had some good rainfall over the month of June and the cold morning and blue skies let us know Winter is here. The Tourist Park and RV Park have been very busy this month and we enjoy the Tourists conveying their positive feedback about our beautiful Town and attractions.

The Shire has started opening a number of historic buildings at regular times to allow tourists and travellers the opportunity to see inside these iconic places. The Railway building, Bank building and Masonic Lodge building are now open at regular times for public viewing. Check out the Shire notice boards or visitors centre for opening times.

Axiis Contracting have undertaken works on the Shire's shared use pathway program. Works were completed this month on the latest sections of the townsite dual use pathway network. Funding from the WA Bicycle Network Grants program through the Department of Transport and the Shire of Cue contributed to build pathways along Railway Street, Robinson Street and part of Wittenoom Street providing links to the Youth and Community Centre located at the Railway building and town oval. The pathways are dual use for walking and cycling. A bike rack has been added to the network at the Shire Hall. This project ensures safety for the community through providing connected pathways and to encourage walking and cycling as means to get round town.

The Community Gym is nearing completion. All the exercise equipment is now assembled and in place. The bathrooms are waiting on the tiling to be completed and the foyer is being painted.

This month a concrete pad was installed at the back of the old Western Australian Bank building. With the assistance of a crane the ablution block was moved to its foundations. Construction of the kitchen and alfresco area will follow once the Community Gym is completed.



On Tuesday 18 June 2024 Smith Broughton Auctioneers, on behalf of the Shire of Cue, conducted an online auction of surplus plant and equipment. We had a very successful auction with nearly all of the items being sold.

The Local Government Extraordinary Election was held by postal vote on Friday 21 June 2024. We had three candidates nominate to fill one vacancy on Council. We had twelve people attend the Council chambers for the count with Ross Pigdon being elected as Councillor to hold office until October 2027.

On 29 June 2024 five Councillors and I will fly over to Canberra to represent the Shire of Cue at the Australian Local Government Association conference in Canberra from 1 - 5 July 2024. It will be a very busy week with the Regional Development Forum held on the first day where Delegates have an opportunity to discuss a wide range of issues including regional connectivity, road maintenance, healthcare, energy transition, natural disasters, and skills shortages. From Tuesday 2 – 5 the National General Assembly commences with Delegates attending conferences and events spread out over 4 days.

On Friday 21 June 2024 the Shire of Cue held a Seniors Morning Tea at the Cue Community and Resource Centre. I had the opportunity to meet everyone that attended and enjoyed morning tea with them.

Barefoot bowls is on every Wednesday night from 6.30pm to 8,30pm. Everyone is welcome to attend this free event with all equipment provided. It is great to see the numbers growing over the weeks.

Mosquito fogging will be carried out intermittently, when conditions are suitable. This is usually just before dusk but can also include early morning, to control their numbers.



Council News

Hi 'Dryblower' readers,

June 2024 was a pretty busy month for our Shire Councillors. As always, Council is mindful of the Shire's budget and the setting of rates for the forthcoming year. Rates are always a hot topic for all ratepayers, mining companies, townsfolk, pastoralists and the like. Council is also mindful of the current financial pressures and the cost of living concerns and at the May 2024 meeting Council approved a modest increase in rates of 1%, one of the lowest rates increases in the region.

Council adopted the Objects and Reasons for the 2024-2025 differential rates and, if no objections are received during the public consultation period, an application will be made to the Minister for Local Government for approval to adopt the rates for the forthcoming year.

At our 18th June 2024 Meeting Council considered a review of the existing town planning scheme which needs to be to be reviewed every five years. This review is undertaken by a Report of Review prepared by the Shire, and when adopted by the Council will be forwarded to the Western Australian Planning Commission for approval. Essentially, the Report of Review should determine if the existing local planning scheme is satisfactory, should be amended or should be replaced. Eugene Ferraro is our Shire Town Planner, and he has been engaged to undertake this task.

As part of amending the Scheme, Council will assess the relevance of existing local planning policies to determine which policies (if any) should be amended/revoked and whether any new policies are required. Proper town planning is a critical aspect of Council business to ensure that we have capability and capacity to progress and grow as a town and encourage businesses to set up within the town's industrial area.

For those interested in town planning issues you can access June 2024 Agenda and Minutes on the Shire website for further detail where you will see very detailed maps and other important information.

On 5th June I attended a WALGA State Council information Forum where we considered the State Government's intentions to amend the Public Health Act to require all Local Governments to adopt a Local Public Health Plan. Discussions are still underway on the implementation of these legislative changes and the impact to Local Governments.

The Forum also considered WALGA's draft 2024/2025 draft budget. This is an important part of State Council's responsibilities to ensure we remain cost effective and can deliver quality services to our members.

Council held its usual Forum on 11th June at which Councillors provided positive feedback to the Administration on current and future projects and other matters of importance and relevance that have, in some cases, stemmed from the community. This is a positive step when the community engages with Councillors as to matters of concern and interest.

Council also held its monthly Councill Meeting on 18th June. As mentioned above matters pertaining to the meeting can be viewed in the Agenda and Minutes which are available for your review on the Shires website.

On 12th June Cr. Ian Dennis and I attended a meeting of the Murchison Regional Vermin Council ('MRVC') held at Mt. Magnet. The 2024/2025 budget was discussed along with an application to the Department to create and register an easement along a 6km section of the No. 1 vermin fence. Also, matters of continued vermin fence maintenance were discussed and reviewed.

The MRVC meeting also considered the Council's Audit Plan for 2023/2024 and approved and awarded the Grading and Construction Contracts for a 6km section on the fence line of the No.1 Vermin fence. The Council continues to be aggressive in the control of wild dogs.

On 20th June I was invited by the CEO to attend a staff 'Toolbox' breakfast meeting at the Murchison Club Hotel. This gave me the opportunity to engage with all levels of staff and provide support for the work our staff carry out on our behalf. I took the opportunity to chat informally with a number of staff members.

21st June was an important day for the Council with the election of our 7th Councillor, a position vacated by the resignation of former Cue Primary School Headmaster, Neil Montgomery. We were fortunate to have three (3) nominations for position and would like to thank those who did nominate.

Under the new 'Optional Preferential' system of voting the process to elect a Councillor is somewhat more convoluted and time consuming and the wait for a decision on the outcome of the election was tense. The end result was an extraordinarily close election and saw a return of former President Cr. Ross Pigdon. We welcome Ross back onto Council.















On 24th June I also attended a WALGA Selection Committee meeting to recommend a number of appointments to various Boards and Committees which will be forwarded to the relevant Minister for consideration.

On 29th June Councillors will get the opportunity to attend the Australian Local Government Association ('ALGA') National General Assembly. The Assembly will deal with many local Government issues from across the country and enable attendees to tap into a high level of Government and listen to presentations and debate on current issues and the proposed legislation direction of the Federal Government. There will be attendees from various Local Governments from all over Australia and it is hoped our Councillors will take the opportunity to network.

That's about it from me for the moment. Please feel free to contact any of your local Councillors to discuss any matters that you would like Council to consider. It is important that we, as Councillors, get to know and understand the direction and pathway you would like out town and Shire to head down.

Midwest and Gascoyne community encouraged to ditch the booze in July to help those affected by cancer.



Cancer Council WA is encouraging people living in the Midwest and Gascoyne region to sign up to Dry July 2024 and quit alcohol for the month, in a bid to raise much-needed funds for the 13 11 20 Cancer Information and Support Line; a free service for all Australians affected by cancer. The Dry July campaign is run by the Dry July Foundation to support cancer charities, including Cancer Council.

Our 13 11 20 Information and Support Line is a confidential service run by experienced cancer nurses and is available to those affected by or concerned about cancer. This service is not government funded – it is funded through the generosity of donors and fundraisers.

Those seeking cancer advice can speak to a health professional about anything to do with cancer including emotional support, how to reduce your risk, questions about early detection, dealing with a cancer diagnosis, how to cope with treatment and its side effects, practical support that is available to anyone affected by cancer, and end of life issues. Last year the service provided support to almost 5800 West Australians.

Going dry for July is a great opportunity to look at how you can reduce your overall alcohol use and in turn benefit your health. Alcohol is a cause of cancer; research shows that every year more than 3,500 cases of cancer can be attributed to alcohol use, such as mouth, pharynx, larynx, oesophagus, liver, bowel and breast cancer in women.

There is no safe level of alcohol use, as any level increases the risk of developing an alcohol-caused cancer. The more you drink, and the more often you drink, the greater your risk.

To reduce your cancer risk, reduce your drinking.



Australian children are falling through the education gap every day. The "education gap" refers to the difference in academic achievement between groups of students experiencing varying levels of educational disadvantage due to factors outside their control.

Teach Learn Grow (TLG) is committed to bridging the education gap, envisioning an Australia where all students reach their potential. TLG is a volunteer-lead organisation based in Perth, Western Australia, with the mission to help rural, regional, and remote students overcome barriers by improving their educational outcomes and expanding their aspirations. Since 2011, TLG has been determined to make a real and long-term impact on the educational outcomes of students experiencing disadvantage in rural, regional and remote Australian communities. In 2023, TLG delivered over 10,000 hours of individualised one-on-one tutoring and mentoring to 1,682 primary school students. TLG delivers programs at no cost to schools or volunteers, thanks to hundreds of hardworking volunteers and the generosity of our sponsors.

Over two weeks from the 17th to the 28th of June TLG volunteers will visit 24 schools across Western Australia. The Rural Program does not focus solely on academic achievement. In addition to tutoring based on students' educational outcomes, volunteers act as positive role models for their students, by forming meaningful relationships and exposing students to the opportunities that education can provide.

- 10. The jumper who has done 78 previous jumps doesn't wear indigo.


