CHC News

While on a gold prospecting trip late last year my husband and I came across timber headframe. After enquiring to the lease holder about it, the headframe was donated to the CHC conditional to picking it up from its current location 280km away.

It took two days to carefully and methodically disassemble it and another to transport it back to Cue. Fortunately, lots of photos in situ had been taken because it was a giant jigsaw puzzle working out which bits went where. A vintage winch was uncovered in the CHC yard and attached to the top with cables running to the kibble below. When it was in use in the early 1900s the kibble would have been lowered or raised in the mine shaft using such a winch.

The reconstructed headframe is now situated in the backyard within the CRC grounds. The headframe is a snapshot of how early gold mining took place throughout the Cue region. It is a sight that was once common in goldfields across Australia.



It has proven to be a popular attraction with our visitors.

From the CEO

We are still getting steady rainfall which is showing the beginnings of a great wildflower season. The opening of our historic buildings is proving to be very popular, and we are receiving a lot of positive feedback from visitors. The Railway building, Bank building and Masonic Lodge building are now open at regular times for public viewing. Check out the Shire notice boards or visitors centre for opening times.

Members of STORMCO (Service To Others Really Matters Company) were in Cue from 29 June to 6 July 2024 to present their school holiday programs. They hosted a Kid's Club at the school each weekday with activities and snacks provided. The effort put in by this group over many years is outstanding and I thank Rainer and the team for visiting again, and for his 20 plus years of service to Cue.

Naidoc Week was celebrated in Cue with a family disco held at the Cue Shire Hall on Saturday 13 July 2024. DJ Rev CB kept the crowd engaged and provided the entertainment for the night teaching dance moves and rolling out great music. A buffet dinner was provided for all. We wish to thank Horizon Power for their sponsorship of this event.

Bogan Shakespeare presented their entertaining take on Romeo and Juliet at the Cue Shire Hall on Tuesday 23 July 2024. Around forty people attended to see the satirical love story set between a Dockers family and Eagles family in suburban Perth. The shire provided beef and gravy rolls for supper.

On 29 June 2024 five Councillors and I flew over to Canberra to represent the Shire of Cue at the Australian Local Government Association convention. It was a nonstop week of activity. Opening the NGA, and speaking in her first major public address, Her Excellency the Honourable Ms Sam Mostyn AC, Governor General of the Commonwealth of Australia. We welcomed and thanked the many federal members of parliament who attended and spoke at the NGA or associated events, including Prime Minister the Hon Anthony Albanese, the Hon Catherine King, the Hon Kristy McBain, Senator the Hon Bridget McKenzie, the Hon Darren Chester, and Luke Gosling OAM MP. Across two days, numerous presenters spoke on the theme of building community trust, and how local government is integral to holding and building this trust. This year's Assembly program included consideration of 160 motions submitted by councils, outlining opportunities for the Federal Government to better support councils and Australian communities. These motions included solutions to address the financial sustainability of councils, support councils to deliver cost of living relief, facilitate more affordable housing, maintain safe and productive local roads, cycleways and footpaths and better prepare for and recover from natural disasters.

Barefoot bowls is on Wednesday nights from 6.30pm to 8.30pm. Everyone is welcome to attend this free event with all equipment provided. For more details call the Shire on 9963 8600.

Dog owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their dogs contained within the boundaries of their property or on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained dogs in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner. The only authorised area

within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Mosquito fogging will be carried out intermittently, when conditions are suitable. This is usually just before dusk but can also include early morning, to control their numbers.

Council News

Hi 'Dryblower' readers,

The business of Local Government can be demanding at times but also extremely rewarding and your Councillors make a great contribution to the development and growth of our town. The demands on Councillors to comply with the ever-increasing legislative changes is constant. I would like to thank all of our Councillors for the manner in which they undertake their Council duties and their efforts to better our town.

Councillors are not often recognised, given due credit for undertaking their Council roles or indeed or rewarded for that effort. We are often quick to criticise either the Administration or the Council but often slow or neglectful to recognise the good work that is being done by all involved in the Local Government process.

It was therefore, pleasing to see that, in conjunction with the CEO, Councillors were afforded the opportunity to attend the 24th General Assembly of the Australian Local Government Association ('ALGA') in Canberra. The event was attended by some 1,200 delegates from the 537 Australia wide Local Governments.



The Assembly dealt with many pressing issues being experienced by local Government ranging from the cost-of-living crisis, housing issues, employment, funding for roads, grants for a variety of projects, regional concerns, staff retention, access to skilled building and trades businesses and a host of other Local Government issues. Councillors were provided with the opportunity to hear from high level Federal Government Ministers and listen to presentations and debate on current issues and any proposed legislation likely to impact our

Region. Our Councillors took the opportunity to network with representatives from other Local Governments and to see that we are not alone in our concerns.

Presentations were made by the newly appointed Governor General Her Excellency The Honourable Sam Mostyn AC and the Prime Minister The Honourable Anthony Albanese MP.



Joining our Cue Shire Councillors were representatives from Yalgoo and it is great to see the rapport we have all developed in the region between our Local Shires. As our Federal and State representation diminishes and our populations continue to remain static, the political impact from our minimal population base and voting numbers means we have to constantly push for regional recognition and funding. Therefore, the need to 'stick together' in our region becomes increasingly important.

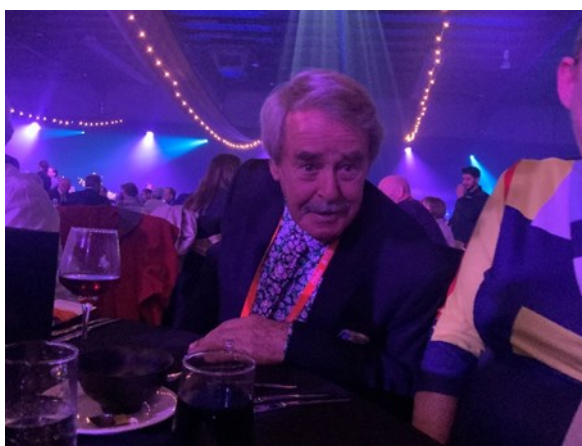
Yalgoo President, Mr. Raul Valenzuela was fortunate enough to be seated next to the Prime Minister at the official Parliament House dinner and I can assure all readers that Raul was engaging with the Prime Minister and very passionate about 'Cue Parliament' (Murchison Country Zone of WALGA) and our region and politely informed him of our needs, our social and business difficulties and anything else that Raul could think of at the time.



Raul is seated to the left of the Prime Minister, and this allowed for up close and personal conversation.

Western Australian was very well represented and approximately 145 delegates from across the State made the journey across. Our Councillors had the opportunity to meet with WALGA President Karen Chappel (President of Shire of Morawa) and Deputy President Paul Kelly (Councillor with the Town of Claremont);

Aside from the more serious side of the Assembly there was time to socialise and take some time out.



Aside from attending ALGA, July 2024 was a pretty busy month for our Shire Councillors. We held our Council Forum on 9th July to look at the upcoming budget and other projects in progress. The CEO provided Councillors with an overview of the monthly activities of the Administration while Works Supervisor, John Cutin ('JC') informed the meeting of his road and town crews' activities including what is planned by way of roadworks in the near future.

Our monthly Shire Council Meeting was held on 16th July. Any information readers would like to refer to can be seen on the Cue Shire Website.

On 9th and 10th July, I attended WALGA's State Council Meeting and Strategic Forum. As all Local Governments are currently undergoing their 2024 audit there was some a focus on the various audit processes and, in particular concerns over the proposed excessive increase in audit costs by the Office of the Auditor General. There was also discussion on the recent '2024 Audit Experience Survey Results' and WALGA's Advocacy Position. Amongst other

matters, discussions were held around Caravan and Camping Ground Regulations, WALGA's efforts to become a Registered Employer Organisation, the CEO Performance Review Report, and State Councillor election processes.

On 10th July I chaired WALGA's Environment Team Meeting where the focus was on changes to the Regulations involving Camping, Caravans and Tiny Homes On Wheels ('THOW'). The meeting also discussed the ever increasing and now rather concerning Polyphagus Shothole Borer problem currently destroying over 3,000 trees in 26 Metropolitan Local Government. These Local Government areas have now been quarantined by DPIRD. There is concern that the exotic beetle could find its way into the regions. Any sightings of this beetle in trees should be reported to DPIRD. We also discussed a campaign to create public awareness and include safety road signage on major road exit and entry points.



The meeting discussed other biosecurity and biodiversity issues impacting the State along with the current review of the BAM Act.

On 20th July all Councillors attended a long budget briefing session delivered by the CEO, Richard Towell and Deputy CEO, Glenn Boyes. Councillors are aware of the need to be across budget matters. This was an very informative meeting and one which should be encourage when reviewing budgets.

Until next month that's about it from me. Again, please feel free to contact any of your local Councillors to discuss any matters that you would like Council to consider. It is important that we, as Councillors, get to know and understand the direction and pathway you would like out town and Shire to head down.

I hope you all enjoy reading our regular Council News and any feedback is most welcome.

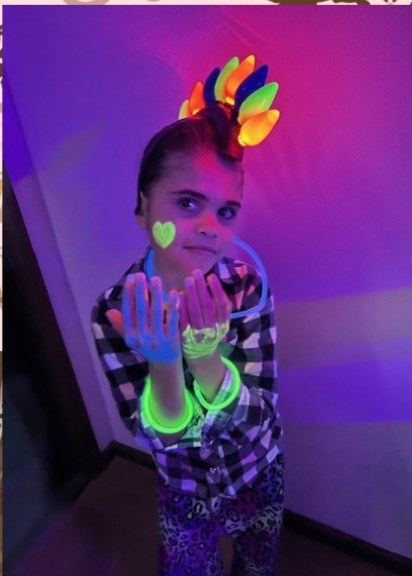

Thank you to the volunteers on the night as well as the Shire of Cue. Special thank you to Horizon Power for the Grant Funding which helped make the night a success.



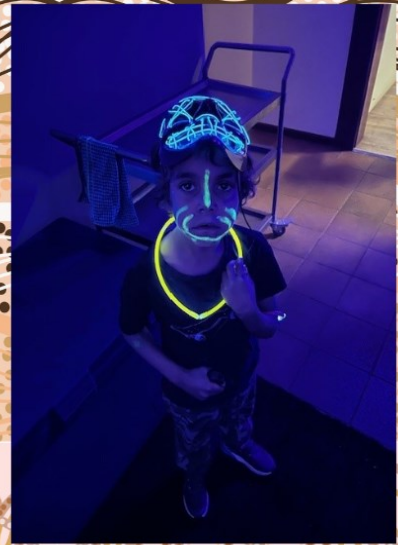

CUE SUB CENTRE NEWS

Responding to an extreme and unexpected call for help!

In June St John Ambulance Subcentre volunteers, Tracy and Michelle, were called to a single vehicle MVA rollover at 1145hrs, approximately 180km east of Cue. The crew were supported by the Cue DFES volunteers Harry and Peter, and Community Paramedic MWT52, Jennie.



The drive to the scene was complicated by some locals causing a traffic jam and lots of water of the road. Despite DFES receiving information that they were no longer required on scene the Cue VFRS crew chose to continue to scene with the ambulance due to safety concerns regarding the road quality, a decision which was supported by DFES. It took approximately 3 hours to travel to the scene where the volunteers began a comprehensive patient assessment.

Although Harry had attended the call as part of the DFES crew, his commitment, and assistance with the delivery of patient care and ensuring the safety of the ambulance crew made him an invaluable asset to the ambulance crew.

The crew supported the CP to complete further patient assessments and management of the following 10 hours whilst waiting for RFDS to retrieve the patient from a nearby mine site as there were crew and patient safety concerns regarding road transport.

After multiple delays due to crew availability and weather concerns RFDS finally landed, and the crew were able to handover the patient to RFDS.



At 2am, 14 hours after the initial call, with the patient on the plane heading down the runway there was a massive feeling of relief... until the plane was stationary at the end of the runway for a bit too long.



The plane had become bogged when one of its wheels had left the tarmac sinking into the mud. With the assistance of the mine site caretaker and the RFDS pilot, Harry used the recovery equipment from the ambulance and CP car to recover the RFDS plane with them finally getting off the ground at 3am.



The ambulance crew and DFES finally arrived back in Cue at 730am, 19 and a half hours after the initial call for assistance.

These volunteers epitomised the St John Values of Think Team, Lead with heart, Walk the talk, Make it Better during this case. Tracy and Michelle showed amazing teamwork with each other and the CP as well as with the other agencies and people present throughout the job. Tracy and Michelle both spent time getting to know the patient ensuring that she felt safe and making sure her concerns were being addressed; further to this even when fatigue became a factor the delivery of high-quality care and communication remained a priority.

I would like to thank the tireless support of the St John Ambulance Subcentre volunteers, Cue VFRS, the team from Beringarra Station, and the caretaker at the Jack Hill mine site for all their help on scene. A massive thank you to the Shire of Cue for supporting your staff to volunteer and be released from work to answer the community's call for help. Finally, the biggest thank you goes to the families of the volunteers for supporting them and being there when they return home.

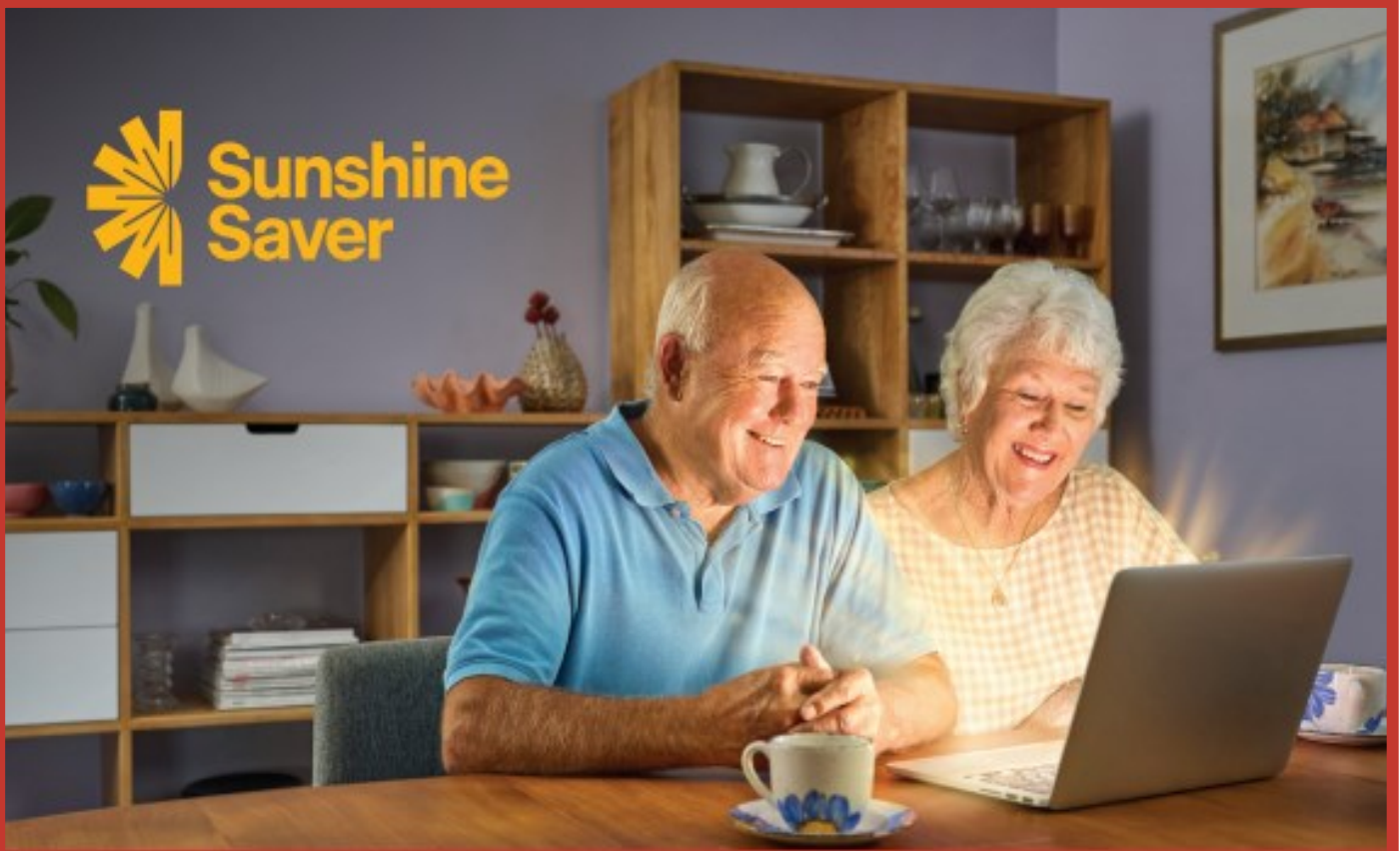
