



Give yourself the best chance by finding cancer early

Our Find Cancer Early campaign encourages those over 40 years of age in regional Western Australia to give yourself the best chance of finding cancer early by going to see a doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker straight away if you notice any unusual symptoms.

In August, Cancer Council WA relaunched the 'Give yourself the best chance' campaign which features two regional West Australians, Cherie Slater and Damien Healy, who generously and bravely shared their stories to raise awareness of the importance of early diagnosis. They highlight the three most urgent possible symptoms of cancer:

- Blood in pee
- Blood in poo
- Coughing up blood


The key message is to know your body and what's normal for you, and if you're over 40 and notice anything unusual, tell your doctor straight away. The campaign will run from August 2024 until March 2025 on regional TV stations (GWN and WIN), Aboriginal TV stations (ICTV and NITV) and will be complemented by advertising on radio stations (Radio Mama, PAKAM, NG Media, Goolarri, Ngaarda, 6WR Waringarri and 6PAC Tjuma Pulka), catch up TV, Facebook, YouTube and out of home media.

Prostate cancer is the most common cancer affecting men in Western Australia. Book an appointment with your doctor if you have noticed symptoms, such as:

Blood in your wee or semen (once or more)

Or, for more than four weeks:

- Waking a lot at night to wee
- Sudden or urgent need to wee
- Needing to wee a lot
- Problems starting or stopping weeing
- Slow or weak flow when weeing
- Dribbling at the end of weeing
- Losing weight without trying

It may not be prostate cancer, but it is important to get symptoms checked out; that way, we can get back to doing the things we love with the people we love.

Council News

Hi 'Dryblower' Readers,

Another month has come and gone, and it seems Christmas is just around the corner.

This month again has been a busy one. There is always productive dialogue between the Councillors and the Cue Shire Administration as we move to progress the many projects we are currently undertaking and developing plans for future project consideration. In all our projects we look to access various available grants to assist with funding. Council is also very mindful of the current housing crisis, the high cost of rent and the issues that come with little or no housing to offer our residents or newcomers to our town. In conjunction with the CEO and the Administration we are currently exploring a number of housing project options. One of the main issues affecting all local Governments is the housing shortage as its impact is felt most when regional Councils and local businesses are looking to employ and retain staff. Both Federal and State Governments need to do more but sadly the focus is not on towns like Cue where there is a low population base and less political impact.

The month kicked off with a Mayors and Presidents Forum in Floreat Park on 2nd August organised by the Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA'). The focus of the Forum was to address the now serious and rather concerning Polyphagus Shothole Borer problem. In my August report I provided some information about this exotic beetle which has destroyed over 3,000 trees in 26 Metropolitan Local Governments.

WALGA has been working with the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development ('DPIRD') to address the problem. Unfortunately, there does not seem to be a solution for eradicating the beetle. There was concern that the exotic beetle could find its way into the regions, and unfortunately, it has been sighted in the South West town of Harvey.

DPIRD will be undertaking a media campaign to create public awareness and include road signage on major road exit and entry points and alert all travellers and Local Governments to be on the lookout for the beetle. We are asked not to transfer firewood, tree branches, and other green waste into outside regions and thus run the risk of spreading the problem. What is of a real concern with the spread of the beetle in the South West is the avocado industry. The beetle attacks more than 400 tree species, including crops such as apple, avocado, macadamia and mango. Trees grown for timber, such as ash, elms and oaks are also at serious risk.

Whilst it in unlikely that we in Cue or the surrounding Local Governments will see this problem we should be mindful of its impact and be somewhat observant and report any sightings to DPIRD.


Shire Councillors were invited to WALGA's Local Government Awards night on 2nd August. The Awards were held in Winthrop Hall at the University of Western Australia. These awards celebrate 'Excellence in Local Government'.





Among the recipients were many current and former Elected Members and Local Government Officers who have dedicated as many as 45 years in the Local Government sector. We, and the State of WA, are better off because of the service these men and women have given to our communities and continue to give to Local Government.

Through the award winners, Councillors and Staff were given the opportunity to see firsthand the broad scope of work WALGA does on behalf of us all. The time away gave Councillors and Staff the opportunity to come together in an informal way. It was also great to see partners attend the awards night. We often forget that it is the partners who are supportive of Councillors and Staff who invest considerable time and effort to serving their communities.









On the topic of service to our community you will see from the CEO's report that nominations have now opened for the Australia Day Community Citizen of the Year Awards. Nominations can be made online at citizenshipawards.com.au, by scanning the QR code on the poster included in this edition of the Dryblower or by visiting the Shire Administration Office. It is important that we recognise that there are those in our community who are deserving of being nominated, and it is up to us to look for those in our town who are worthy of such recognition.

At our monthly Forum held on 13th August Council was given a progress report on a number of projects we are undertaking which include the Masonic Lodge, the Old Gaol, the WA Bank Building and the work being carried out on the old Municipal Chambers in Robinson Street. Council is always mindful of preserving our valuable buildings. It is pleasing to see that there are now guided tours whereby tourists and our towns folk can visit these impressive buildings and feel the history our town has to offer. The new gym in the main street is taking shape and is not far off opening its doors to new members. I am certain this will be a boost for the town. Council was very pleased to have supported this project

On 14th August Cr. Ian Dennis and I attended the Murchison Regional Vermin Council ('MRVC') meeting in Mt. Magnet along with other Elected Members from Mt. Magnet, Sandstone, and Yalgoo. CEO Geoff Brookes presented the 2024-2025 Annual Budget which was adopted by Council. The Council is responsible for the construction and maintenance of a dog proof fence to assist in the eradication of wild dogs which, over time, have decimated the sheep industry in the region. Unfortunately, whilst we appreciate the financial assistance from both the Federal and State Governments over time to construct the 1,007km vermin proof fence line, there is little likelihood that pastoralists will ever return to the days of a valuable sheep and wool industry. Thanks also go to our regional Shires for their ongoing support.

Council was also pleased to receive a copy of the Conservation Management Plan for the upcoming preservation work of the Masonic Lodge. Council has identified this project as a major undertaking with National Trust significance and we have been fortunate to have received LRCIP funding of \$340,300 from the Department of Infrastructure. Council will consider the architectural drawings when completed and the structural Engineering report on the integrity of the building. Deputy CEO Glenn Boyes has worked tirelessly on this project and was able to convince National Trust to sell the building back to the Shire. Council looks forward to the commencement of this project.

At our Shire Council Meeting on 18th August Council considered and adopted the 2024-2025 Annual Budget. This followed an extensive review by Councillors on 20th July with the CEO and Deputy CEO providing a very detailed overview of Council's expected revenue and expenditure for the forthcoming year.

Our budget always takes into consideration our Corporate Business Plan 2023-2027. The Corporate Business Plan is reviewed every year and sets out the priority actions required to achieve the objectives in the Strategic Community Plan over the 4 year period. Major projects over this time are expected to be funded by grant funding, reserve funds or operating revenues.

The Shire's Community Strategic Plan was developed in consultation with the community and reflects the values, goals, aspirations and vision of the broader community.

On 20th August I attended a meeting of WALGA's Selection Committee at which meeting a recommendation was made to the relevant Minister for an appointment to the State Library Board. WALGA encourages Elected Members and Officers to nominate for and be appointed to various Local Government Committees and Boards.

I encourage all Councillors to consider nominating for a Committee or Board position which may be of interest to them.

On 21st August I also attended a meeting of the Metropolitan Waste Advisory Council ('MWAC'). This Council sits under the WALGA banner. The Council is made of State Councillors, representative from Local Governments across the State and the Waste Management Industry. The Council is involved in advocating to Government on many waste matters which includes, E-Waste landfill, Asbestos and other Hazzard Waste products, Container Deposit Scheme, and Waste Levy proposals, including a review of Waste Management Legislation.

That's about it from me. Again, please feel free to contact any of your local Councillors to discuss any matters that you would like Council to consider. It is important that we, as Councillors, get to know and understand the direction and pathway you would like out town and Shire to head down.

I hope you all continue to be informed of some of our regular Council activities and any feedback is most welcome.



- "Heat oil in a large wok or frypan and add onion. Cook, stirring for 2 mins, until onions are starting to softent tsp canola oil
- *Add the chicken and cook for 3 mins, until outside is golden brown.
- "Add frozen mixed vegetables and continue to cook on a high heat, stirring often, until the vegies are defrosted and the chicken is cooked through
- *Add the rice, sweet chill sauce, soy sauce and cook, stirring, until rice is hot.
- "Serve, and sprinkle with roasted cashews.


