The meeting was held in the Council chambers and was officially opened by recent WALGA Local Government Award winners Les Price and Harvey Nichols. Shane Love MLA, Leader of the Nationals WA and Merome Beard MLA Member for Northwest Central also attended. Presentations were provided by a number of agencies including a Road Safety forum facilitated by Nils Hay, CEO of the Mid West Development Commission.

In keeping with tradition, the Shire of Cue, with assistance from the Cue CRC, hosted the pre —Cue Parliament Sundowner and the seventh running of the Cue Calcutta Cup. Approximately 75 attendees enjoyed a night of networking with fellow Shires and government representatives from the regions. As a fundraiser, attendees purchased tickets for a chance to secure a horse in the phantom race. Our MC and race caller for the evening was David Julian Price. Proceeds from the ticket sales raised funds for the Cue St John Ambulance Sub Centre and Royal Flying Doctor Service. To celebrate WA Seniors Week the Shire of Cue, with assistance from the Cue Community Resource Centre held a luncheon for the seniors with Glenn Boyes from the Shire of Cue addressing the attendees regarding future projects to benefit the seniors and the community. Everyone enjoyed a relaxing lunch provided by the Cue Roadhouse.



The Shire working in conjunction with the Department of Fire and Emergency Services will be undertaking firebreak works around Cue town site. Owners and occupiers of land are reminded of their obligations to clear and maintain fire breaks over the summer months.

The summer months are a time of storms and cyclones. Residents are reminded to clean up and remove any unwanted or loose items from their property that could cause damage in a storm. Larger items can be collected by contacting the Manager of Works and Services to make arrangements.

Dog owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their dogs contained within the boundaries of their property or on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained dogs in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Mosquito fogging operations are being undertaken when weather conditions allow. Residents are asked to check their properties and remove any potential mosquito breeding areas, by emptying containers holding water, ensuring gutters are not holding water and checking yards for areas that hold water.

We ask everyone to be vigilant as the warmer weather brings out snakes in and around town. Please use caution when out walking. Keeping grass short and cleaning up around the yard will help to keep them away.



## **Council News**

With only a few weeks until Christmas the Council can look back on a year that has been very busy, and November was no exception.

Combined with the usual monthly Shire Council Forum and Council Meeting, there was considerable activity at the Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA') level highlighted by Cue hosting the Murchison Country Zone Meeting ('Cue Parliament').

I attended a WALGA State Council Information Forum on 10<sup>th</sup> November. The Forum provides State Councillors with the opportunity to canvass issues that are under consideration or emerging as important to the Local Government sector. The focus for the November Forum was on

- An overview and update of WALGA's Strategic Plan. The Plan is looking at what members want and can be summarised as follows:-
- o Clear Priorities
- o Efficiency
- o Value Resources
- o Time Management
- o Knowledge Management
- o Value For Money
- o Leading Voice
- o Demonstrative Curiosity (be proactive, listen and be a sounding board)
- o Service, Advocacy and Advice.
- o Communication and Build Relationships.
- As with everything Government there are some challenges around Government reform, existing and proposed legislation, finance and the ability to attract and retain good people.
- An overview of the Financial Sustainability in Australian Local Government. The review looks at to what extent Local Governments are financially sustainable, wise manages of ratepayer's money, the provision of basic services and how risk is managed and mitigated.
- Renewable energy Transition. WA's energy industry is transforming to achieve net zero emissions by 2025 and, at the moment, there is no framework that provides a consistent approach. There are also concerns about the impact of the renewable energy transition. WALGA conducted a survey of all 139 Local Governments in WA and 75% of those that responded were regional Local Governments. This is an important initiative and is designed to see some economic flow through to all Local Governments

On 12<sup>th</sup> November the Shire Council held its monthly Forum. The CEO, Richard Towell, provided Council with an overview of all current activities within the Shire and provided some discussion around ongoing and proposed activities. The Council also receives reports from the Works Supervisor, the Ranger and Health Officer. Council was also provided with an update on the progress of current grant applications and a schedule of all plant and equipment along with maintenance expenditure.

As part of my responsibilities as a WALGA State Councillor I attended a Selection Panel meeting to review and consider nominations for approval to take up roles on various Committees and Boards. Positions are open to elected members and Local Government Officers to further develop their careers and expand their skillset. WALGA openly encourages all those in Local Government to consider roles from time to time.

Although not strictly Council business, I attended the Annual General Meeting of the Cue Community Resource Centre ('CRC') on 18<sup>th</sup> November. The Council has approved financial support for the CRC and Heritage Centre this has become a very important aspect of town life and is visited by many tourists from around the State, Australia wide and visitors from overseas.

The CRC provides a variety of personal, and business services and now runs a profitable and efficient retail store. With the construction of the gazebo during the year, the Shire and CRC were able to hold several functions and showcase its versatility and useful purpose. This is a quality structure and thanks to the efforts of CRC Chair, Catherine Willett, ably assisted by CRC Manager Julie Humphreys, for persisting with this project.





The Heritage Centre will take visitors back in time when life was not so easy and provides a window into the agricultural and mining history of our town. The Centre has been well managed by Sandra Box and provides an opportunity for visitors and local residents to 'engage with the past'. Cue prides itself on preserving its rich history. If you haven't visited the Heritage Centre and Retail Shop in the CRC it is worth taking some time to check it out.

The Council held its ordinary Council Meeting on 19<sup>th</sup> November. At this time of the year there is a tendency for agenda items to be somewhat limited since much of the Shire business is underway and any required development or other approvals have been previously dealt with. Our meeting approved the three prizes for the 'Rates Incentive Prize Draw'. It was great to see longtime residents Dave and Kath Leach from Beebyn Station and town residents Phillip and Sandra Box feature amongst the winners.

Also, Council approved the naming of the new Gym which has been well patronised by town folk and mining company personnel. For those who have not yet visited the gym you are encouraged to drop in and check out the great asset we own. Council thanks the CEO and his staff for the effort undertaken to bring this project to fruition. Council received 24 suggested names and congratulations go to Angela Pickering for her name choice of 'Cue Fitness Centre'.



Councillors were well represented at the annual Sundowner held at the Cue Community Resource Centre and Heritage Centre on 21<sup>st</sup> November. This event is the precursor to the Murchison Country Zone ('Cue Parliament') meeting, which is hosted by the Shire of Cue and held the following day. The event gives Councillors and those who attend the opportunity to network with representatives from organisations like Regional Development Australia Mid-West Gascoyne, Fenix Resources Ltd, Newhaul, MLG, Westgold Resources Ltd, Main Roads WA, Midwest-Gascoyne Region Central and Northern Regions Main Roads WA, Water Corporation, Mid-West Development Commission, David Price Consulting along with many others who attended the event.





We were fortunate to have Ms Merome Beard MLA, Member for North West Central, and Mr Shane Love MLA, Member for Moore, Leader of the Nationals attend the Sundowner. It was also great to see Presidents and representatives from our Murchison Shires from Yalgoo, Meekatharra, Murchison and Mt. Magnet attend and support the event.







The traditional 'Cue Calcutta Cup' was run and won by local resident Angela Pickering who drew the winning horse. Thanks go to David Price for calling the event with his own quirky sense of humour.

Julie Humphreys and the CRC staff along with Shire staff prepared the Cue Heritage Centre with well laid out silver service tables for all attendees to enjoy a sumptuous meal topped off with a variety of dessert. Thanks also go to the Murchison Club Hotel for preparing the evening cuisine and making the evening a success.

On 22nd November CEO, Richard Towell and I attended WALGA's Murchison Country Zone meeting ('Cue Parliament') which was held in the Cue Shire Council Chambers. Representative from our six (6) Murchison Shires of Meekatharra, Yalgoo, Sandstone, Cue and Mt. Magnet and the Shire of Murchison converged on Cue to discuss issues which impact our local shires and the region in general. The main focus of the meeting was a session on heavy vehicles causing damage to the regional road network and loose material falling off passing quad trailers and causing damage to other road users. Mr Nils Hay, CEO Mid West Development Commission presented the Roads Forum and speakers included:

Another issue to be discussed was a recommendation from the Shire of Cue regarding the 'Need for Accessible Medical Services in the Murchison Region'. The Murchison region in Western Australia faces ongoing challenges in accessing reliable healthcare due to its remote location and limited healthcare infrastructure. Existing services, such as the Yalgoo and Cue nursing posts, are generally open only during standard business hours (Monday to Friday), leaving residents without essential care on weekends, public holidays and after hours.





The Murchison Country Zone passed a recommendation that WALGA make representation to the Minister for Health and lobby the State Government to implement a range of measures to improve health services in the region.

As usual, the Cue Shire Staff worked tirelessly to make the event a huge success. Thanks also to Helen and the Murchison Club Hotel for putting on the lunch. Rossco Foulkes-Taylor from the Shire of Murchison chaired another successful meeting for the Murchison Country Zone of WALGA.

In the interests of improving the way in which the Council conducts its meetings Councillors attended a training session on 23<sup>rd</sup> November where we received a presentation from David Julian Price. Councillors were guided through a mock meeting in which David identified all the accepted protocols and practices when conducting a meeting. David has a reputation for delivering meeting procedure presentations to Local Governments across the State. This is the second time David has presented to the Councillors.

On 27<sup>th</sup> November, along with CEO Richard Towell and other staff members, I attended The WA Local Government Grants Commission public hearing which was held in the Council Chambers. The Commission conducts various hearings across the State, and it was the Murchison-Gascoyne visit program which provided the opportunity for those interested to attend. The Hearing discussed the methodology used in calculating each individual local government's Financial Assistance Grants. Councils most affected are those in remote regions with a low population base. The grant assists with the Shire's operational and road maintenance programs.

I hope you all continue to be informed of some of our regular Council activities and any feedback is most welcome.

Also, a timely reminder that we will be celebrating our generous Volunteers on 5<sup>th</sup> December. The event will be at the Murchison Club Hotel, and I encourage everyone to take a little time out top attend the function. Please contact Tracy Bachraty from the Shire to register your interest in attending.



### SHIRE OF CUE FIRE RESTRICTIONS

#### **Prohibited Burning Period**

15th December to 31st March

STRICTLY NO BURNING

#### **Restricted Burning Period**

1st October to 30th April

#### PERMITS ARE REQUIRED

Firebreaks should be maintained for the whole of the restricted period.



#### SHIRE OF CUE FIRE RESTRICTIONS

#### **TOWNSITES**

On or before 1st October all town lots within the town sites of Cue and Tuckanarra are required to be treated as follows;

Where the area of land is less than 3,000m<sup>2</sup>, the property must be cleared, mowed, slashed to a MAXIMUM height of 7.5 cm of all flammable material.

Where the area of the land is 3,000m<sup>2</sup> or more, a firebreak must be provided not less than 3 metres in width inside and along the whole of the external boundaries of the properties owned or occupied and all flammable material must be cleared a distance of 2.7m from all buildings and/or haystacks situated on the land and maintained free of such material until the 30th April.

#### **FUEL STORAGE AREAS**

On or before the 1st October all grass and similar material is to be cleared from such places where drum ramps are located and where drums, empty or full, are stored and such areas to be maintained cleared of grass and similar flammable material.

#### FARM BUILDINGS AND UNATTENDED ELECTRIC MOTORS AND HAY STACKS

Fire breaks at least 3 metres in width completely surrounding and not more than 20 metres from the perimeter of any building, group of buildings or haystacks, All flammable material must be removed from an area 2.7 metres in width immediately surrounding the building. All flammable material must be removed from an area 3 metres in width immediately surrounding an unattended electric motor site.

#### UNATTENDED FUEL OPERATED MOTORS

All flammable material must be removed from an area 3 metres in width immediately surrounding an unattended fuel operated motor whether the motor is intended to be used or not.

#### **RURAL LAND**

Firebreaks must be provided not less than 3 meters in width inside and along the whole of the external boundaries of the properties owned or occupied: where this is not practicable the firebreaks must be provided as near as possible to, and within, such boundaries.

#### BARBEQUES AND INCINERATORS

Gas and electric barbeques are permitted any time. Solid fuel barbeques and incinerators are PROHIBITED on days of VERY HIGH FIRE DANGER or above.

#### **PENALTY**

The penalty for failing to comply with this notice is a fine of up to \$5,000 and a person in default is also liable, whether prosecuted or not, to pay the cost of performing the work in this notice, if it is not carried out by the owner or Occupier by the date required by this notice.


