Australia Day 2025 celebrations will be held on the town oval from 6.00pm Sunday 26th January, with fireworks, live music with Geoff Udy, food and refreshments. Celebrations for Australia Day have been made possible by funding from Auspire, part of the Australia Day Council National network. Councillors considered Australia Day active citizenship nominations at the November Council meeting and the recipients of these awards will be announced at the Australia Day celebrations.

The summer months are a time of storms and cyclones. Residents are reminded to clean up and remove any unwanted or loose items from their property that could cause damage in a storm. Larger items can be collected by contacting the Manager of Works and Services to make arrangements.

Dog owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their dogs contained within the boundaries of their property or on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained dogs in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Mosquito fogging operations are being undertaken when weather conditions allow. Residents are asked to check their properties and remove any potential mosquito breeding areas, by emptying containers holding water, ensuring gutters are not holding water and checking yards for areas that hold water.

We ask everyone to be vigilant as the warmer weather brings out snakes in and around town. Please use caution when out walking. Keeping grass short and cleaning up around the yard will help to keep them away.

### Council News

Hi 'Dryblower' Readers,

I hope you all had a great Christmas and New Year. The 2024 year seemed to come and go so quickly. Looking back on 2024 it was a busy and productive year for Council with a number of notable achievements some of which included: -

- Two successful Sundowners, the running of the 'Cue Calcutta Cup' and Murchison Country Zone Meetings ('Cue Parliament') which were held in the CRC.
- The opening of the new 'Cue Fitness Centre' gym in Austin Street.
- Completion of the construction of the quality 7m x 7m Gazebo at the CRC.
- Re-election of former Shire President Cr. Ross Pigdon.
- Successful Australia Day celebration with Tracy Bachraty being awarded the Community Citizen of the Year Award for her outstanding service to the people of Cue.
- Attendances at various Murchison Regional Vermin Council meetings and successful WALGA
  State Council Meetings throughout the year as well as attending WALGA's Environment Policy
  Team meetings, Selection Panel and WALGA's Metropolitan Waste Advisory Council ('MWAC')
  Meetings, all of which provided great support for Local Government consideration.
- Introduction of reforms to the *Local Government Act 1995* which impacted both Councillors and Local Government Administrations.
- Attending the premiere of the movie, 'Before Dawn' which was partly made in the Shire of Cue and on Coodardy Station. The Shire was an early financial contributor and supporter of this very successful production and continues to support the growing culture and arts footprint.
- Adopting the 2025-2029 Corporate Business Plan.
- Successful ANZAC Day Service attended by many towns' folk and representatives from our mining and business community. It was a privilege to have Phil Gurney, a great grandnephew of Arthur Stanley Gurney attend the service and lay a wreath in Arthur's honour.
- Australia's 'Biggest Morning Tea' which was held at the CRC in the new gazebo.
- Councillors had the opportunity to attend 24<sup>th</sup> General Assembly of the Australian Local Government Association ('ALGA') in Canberra and the Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA') Convention in Perth.
- Shire Councillors were also invited to WALGA's Local Government Awards night which was held in Winthrop Hall at the University of Western Australia. These awards celebrate 'Excellence in Local Government'.
- The re-purchase of the Masonic lodge from the National, Trust was a significant event as was the progressing of key projects at the Masonic Lodge, the Old Gaol, the WA Bank Building and the Municipal Chambers in Robinson Street and reconstruction of the old Stables.
- Band 4 Local Governments across the State attended a meeting in Perth with the Hon. Hannah Beasley MLA Minister for Local Government and Youth, and the Minister Assisting the Minister for Training and Workforce Development and representatives from the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries. The workshop was designed to identify Local Government issues and priorities in remote and regional WA.
- On a sombre note, Council was saddened to learn of the passing of longtime favourite Cue residents in Rodney Dongara and former Councillor, Petronelle ('Pixie') Pigdon whose funeral services were held in 2024. R.I.P

In finishing off the 2024 year the CEO, I and support staff attended the 'Keep Australia Beautiful' Awards at Ascot Racecourse on 29<sup>th</sup> November where the Town of Cue was awarded the WA Tidy Town Award in the Heritage Section. This is a fantastic achievement, and I thank Deputy CEO Glenn Boyes for his efforts in promoting the Railway Building Precinct Project and showing the Keep Australia Beautiful judges around our town and inviting them into some of our old heritage buildings. In speaking with one of the judges she was extremely impressed with the way in which our town continues to take care of and restore our well-known old buildings. Well done, Glenn!







On 2<sup>nd</sup> December Deputy President, Cr. Elizabeth Houghton, and I, along with the CEO and the Shire Finance Department attended the 2024 Audit Exit Meeting conducted by the Shire's Auditors AMD and the Office of the Auditor General. The outcome from the audit was very positive and I thank the Shire staff involved, the Audit Committee and the Councillors for their efforts in achieving yet another highly recognised result.

On 5<sup>th</sup> December the annual Volunteer's night was held at the Murchison Club Hotel. Thanks to Cr. Ian Dennis who delivered Council's message of appreciation for those who selflessly put themselves out to support our community in times of need. Volunteering, whether it is in the local Fire Brigade or Service, St. John Ambulance, or other available support services, makes a significant contribution to our town. If you have some time to consider how you can be a part of these services, please contact the Shire office and I am sure you will be most welcomed.

On 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> December, I attended WALGA's State Council Regional meeting ('South West Country Zone') which was held in the City of Busselton. Regional Meetings provide State Councillors with an opportunity to see firsthand what is happening in other parts of the State. Unsurprisingly, nearly all remote and country Local Governments experience similar issues and concerns around health, housing, job opportunities, staff retention, project funding, aged care, law and order along with other priorities.

On 7<sup>th</sup> December representatives from Council attended the Annual Town Christmas party at the Murchison Club Hotel. I thank those Councillors who did attend and trust that the night was enjoyed by everyone.

I and Councillors attended the monthly Shire Forum on 10<sup>th</sup> December where Councillors are given the opportunity to express their views and bring forth ideas and suggestions for future project work or simply looking at new ways of doing things in an around our town.

The CEO provided a progress report on a number of projects we are undertaking which include the Masonic Lodge, the Old Gaol, the WA Bank Building, the completion of the restoration of the old Stables and the work being carried out on the old Municipal Chambers in Robinson Street. Deputy CEO, Glenn Boyes, provided further background on the progress of the proposed development at the upgraded Railway Building. On behalf of Council, I thank Glenn for his dedication and hard work in working with the various agencies to accept our project and assist with the funding. Whilst funding from either the WA State or Federal Government has not been secured, we are nonetheless continuing to promote this as a very worthwhile project, particularly for the local children who can get involved with a series of engaging and worthwhile activities. We will keep you posted as information comes to hand.

On 11<sup>th</sup> December I attended WALGA's Environment Policy Team meeting where there was a focus on Native Vegetation and permits required for clearing along with a raft of other environment issues being considered by both the State and Federal Governments.

I also attended WALGA's Metropolitan Waste Advisory Council ('MWAC') meeting on 11<sup>th</sup> December where all things waste is considered. Waste across the world is now a serious concern and progress is being made to promote a 'Circular Economy', increase recycling and reusable waste and profit from the economic outcomes that can be achieved. Product Stewardship is now being looked at on a national level where manufacturers of packaged goods should be more accountable for their packaging and make a dedicated contribution to the control of waste and the amount that ends up in landfill.

The Container Deposit Scheme ('CDS') in WA has been very successful and since the commencement of the scheme approximately one billion containers have been sent to receiving points across WA. I am sure Cue has made a healthy contribution to those numbers! That is a significant achievement and MWAC is looking to support a proposal to include other containers in the scheme such as wine and sprit bottles.

The Shire Councill held the last of its 2024 Council meetings on 17<sup>th</sup> December 2024 and followed up with a tour of the town to determine the winner of the Christmas Lights Competition. The winning entry was Phil and Sandra Box. 2<sup>nd</sup> Place went to Norn and Doris Lyons and 3<sup>rd</sup> Place to Michelle Lowen.

In closing off the year I would like to thank all of those on Council for their contribution to the continuing growth of our town. Many thanks to the CEO and his staff for their efforts during the year and Julie at the CRC for publishing the monthly 'Dryblower'.

Finally, thanks to all those who contribute to and continue to read the Dryblower.

### SHIRE OF CUE FIRE RESTRICTIONS

#### **Prohibited Burning Period**

15th December to 31st March

STRICTLY NO BURNING

#### **Restricted Burning Period**

1st October to 30th April

#### PERMITS ARE REQUIRED

Firebreaks should be maintained for the whole of the restricted period.



#### SHIRE OF CUE FIRE RESTRICTIONS

#### **TOWNSITES**

On or before 1st October all town lots within the town sites of Cue and Tuckanarra are required to be treated as follows;

Where the area of land is less than 3,000m<sup>2</sup>, the property must be cleared, mowed, slashed to a MAXIMUM height of 7.5 cm of all flammable material.

Where the area of the land is 3,000m<sup>2</sup> or more, a firebreak must be provided not less than 3 metres in width inside and along the whole of the external boundaries of the properties owned or occupied and all flammable material must be cleared a distance of 2.7m from all buildings and/or haystacks situated on the land and maintained free of such material until the 30th April.

#### **FUEL STORAGE AREAS**

On or before the 1st October all grass and similar material is to be cleared from such places where drum ramps are located and where drums, empty or full, are stored and such areas to be maintained cleared of grass and similar flammable material.

#### FARM BUILDINGS AND UNATTENDED ELECTRIC MOTORS AND HAY STACKS

Fire breaks at least 3 metres in width completely surrounding and not more than 20 metres from the perimeter of any building, group of buildings or haystacks, All flammable material must be removed from an area 2.7 metres in width immediately surrounding the building. All flammable material must be removed from an area 3 metres in width immediately surrounding an unattended electric motor site.

#### **UNATTENDED FUEL OPERATED MOTORS**

All flammable material must be removed from an area 3 metres in width immediately surrounding an unattended fuel operated motor whether the motor is intended to be used or not.

#### **RURAL LAND**

Firebreaks must be provided not less than 3 meters in width inside and along the whole of the external boundaries of the properties owned or occupied: where this is not practicable the firebreaks must be provided as near as possible to, and within, such boundaries.

#### BARBEQUES AND INCINERATORS

Gas and electric barbeques are permitted any time. Solid fuel barbeques and incinerators are PROHIBITED on days of VERY HIGH FIRE DANGER or above.

#### PENALTY

The penalty for failing to comply with this notice is a fine of up to \$5,000 and a person in default is also liable, whether prosecuted or not, to pay the cost of performing the work in this notice, if it is not carried out by the owner or Occupier by the date required by this notice.




