
Council has resolved to undertake the 2025 Local Government Election by postal vote and have engaged the WA Electoral Commission to facilitate the election.

A number of road work projects are underway in and around the Shire. Works are ongoing on Dalgaranga Road, Wilgie Mia Road and Beringarra Road. Much awaited flood damage repair works are scheduled to start in the coming month as well. Road users are reminded to slow down through road work areas and obey all traffic directions.

The hot weather can bring out snakes in and around town. Please use caution when out walking. Keeping grass short and cleaning up around the yard will help to keep them away.

Dog owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their dogs contained within the boundaries of their property or on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained dogs in public places. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

The Shire of Cue administration office and works depot will be closed for the Easter period from 4pm Thursday 17 April 2025 and opening at 9am on Wednesday 23 April 2025. The Shire will be closed again on Friday 25 April 2025 for ANZAC Day. 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Council News

The last month has been very busy with a lot of focus on the recent WA State Election. We congratulate all those candidates who won a seat and offer commiserations to those who did not win but dedicated their time to run for public office. We in the regions are very mindful that our representation at both the State and Federal level is shrinking to a point where we now find it difficult to have a voice that is listened to. This eventually impacts the ability to access funding and receive the various Government services required by our town including medical, mental health, dental, BreastScreen WA Mobile Clinic visits, eye specialists and other essential services.

It is hoped that those Members of Parliament who now represent the regions will become a strong voice and promote the needs of those who live in towns like Cue, Meekatharra, Yalgoo, Sandstone and Mt. Magnet.

Since the Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA') acquired the remaining share in the premises at 170 Railway Parade, West Leederville the top level of the building is now dedicated to a new State Council board room, conference rooms, interview rooms, breakout area and kitchen. Council held its first meeting in the new facilities. The work undertaken by WALGA is impressive.

On 5th March I attended a Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA') State Council Meeting where the Governing Body undertook a **State Council Performance Evaluation**. This is essentially a self-assessment on how State Councillors feel their Governing Body is performing. Some of the feedback centred on the following:-

- Strategic Decision Making.
- Monitor Performance and Ensure Accountability.
- Process for Strategic Planning and quality of State Council participation.
- Common Understanding of WALGA's Mission.
- The need to build commonality and trust between metro/country Local Governments. There seems to be lack of understanding of differences in issues experienced by metro -vs-country Local Governments.
- The Finances and Services Committee need more time at State Council meetings to provide Councillors with a deeper understanding of the financial position of the Association. Some found the Zone system ineffectual.

We need to be reminded that there were 14 new State Councillors elected in 2023, and the workings of State Council and the Administration would have been somewhat unfamiliar to them in the early part of their term on Council.

The three areas that scored highly included:-

- CEO Evaluation and Development Process.
- Fiduciary Compliance.
- Ongoing Monitoring of Financial and Investment Performance

I also attended The **State Council Strategic Forum** at which Councillors were given a presentation on the State and Federal political insights. The presenter, Patrick Fagan, is a political analyst and has previously worked with the Labor Party providing insight into the mood of the electorate particularly around election time. The meeting held some significance (at the time) with a State and Federal election on the horizon. WALGA was active in the media engaging with all major parties in a bid to promote the big issues impacting Local Governments. Of course, the State Election has now been run and won, and I fear nothing will change for the regions. Our regions will have to fight even harder for recognition and funding as preferential spending on major infrastructure projects in the metropolitan area gains momentum.

New Local Government legislation is now in place which is intended to ensure that all Local Governments across the State are subjected to a process for early intervention around conduct, complaints, misappropriation of funds, misbehaviour, fractious Councils along with a number of other concerns. A new 'Office of Inspector' will have carriage of these areas of concerns and have the power to appoint a monitor. An inspector can conduct inquiries and can delegate but not to a Monitor.

Questions were asked by some State Councillors over the various roles that the Office of the Inspector, Monitor and Adjudicator will undertake in due course.

<u>Adjudicators</u> (Replace the current Standards Panel)

All adjudicators must be legal practitioners with at least five years' experience (potentially employees of DLGSC or SSO/DOJ)

Adjudicators cannot be council members, Local Government employees or WALGA employees.

Monitors

Also, the Inspector can be a monitor to the Local Government concerned.

The role of a Monitor is not to be punitive.

Local Governments bear the cost of a Monitor.

Councils can bring in a Monitor.

City of Perth Deputy Lord Mayor Cr. Bruce Reynolds presented to State Council and high-lighted:-

- The concern by ratepayers over the continuing rise in Law and Order problems within the City
- Parking fees to go up in the City precinct.

The City has treated 75 trees and destroyed 35 others due to the impact of the polyphagus shot hole borer (PHSB).

LGIS CEO Anthony Voleta provided State Council with some insight into:-

- The Monitoring of Industry direction across the State.
- Looking to introduce young LG Pro groups targeting TAFE, University and High School level student to educate them about Local Government how to get in and how to create a career pathway.
- Working on new training programs.
- Introducing a new level of membership around flexibility for parenting

State Council also considered two new advocacy Positions;

- Climate Change Advocacy Position
- Waste Management Legislation Advocacy Position

Climate Change has created a lot of debate around the State Council table with varying views around Climate Change and its impact on Local Governments and their communities. The proposed Advocacy Position is currently being reviewed by the Environment Policy Team for further development.

On 10th March Cr. Ian Dennis and I attended a meeting with the Shire of Cue, Cue Primary School and Westgold Resources Ltd and with the Carey Right Track Foundation. The Foundation is a not for profit organisation and develops programs for the youth both at school and part of the Youth and Community Centre. I would like to thank Ian for his tireless efforts in coordinating the various meetings and engaging with Westgold for their input and assistance as well as working closely with the Foundation.

I would also like to thank Westgold Resources Ltd for its commitment to the program for the kids in our town and especially General Manager, Simon Waters for allowing flights for those delivering the program and then allowing Carey Right Foundation personnel to stay at the Cue Camp and use the mess and other available facilities. The significant contribution by Westgold is greatly appreciated and has enabled the program to be extended and so deliver more regular services. It is hoped that the benefits from the program will provide the children with a sense of engagement, belonging, positive interaction and a sense of responsibility. The health and well being of our children is paramount.

On 11th March Council held its monthly Forum where Councillors were briefed by the CEO Mr. Richard Towell, Mr John Curtin, Manager Works and Services and Senior Administration Officer, Stephanie Wandek on the current and upcoming activities of the Shire. The Forum provides Councillors with an opportunity to have informal discussions with the Administration around, projects, grant funding, roadworks and finances and other topics of interest.

The Forum also discussed Abandoned Mines Program (AMP) run by the Department of Energy, Mines, Industry Regulation, and Safety (DEMIRS). The program is referred to as the 'Safer Shafts for Towns Project'. This program commenced the in 2022 with the key objective of reducing the risk to any single child that may be exposed to old mine shafts.

On 18th March I attended the Shire Audit Committee meeting which reviewed the audit outcomes and carried a recommendation that Council Endorse the Compliance Audit Return 2024. As has been the case in the past few years the Shire came through the audit process with flying colours. Council acknowledges the efforts of the CEO Richard Towell, Deputy CEO Glenn Boyes and administration staff for their efforts in providing and maintaining the sound financial position we currently find ourselves in.

The Monthly Council meeting was also held on 18th March where the Audit Committee recommended to Council that it adopts the 2024 Compliance Audit Return. On 19th March I attended a briefing with WALGA's joint Environment and Infrastructure Policy Teams to discuss the Native Vegetation Clearing Regulation Advocacy Position designed to improve the permit process and require decisions to be made within statutory timeframes. The meeting also considered the proposal to require Government, Local Government and Industry to strengthen environmental data sharing, reduce duplication and undertake bioregional planning for native vegetation management with a focus on highly cleared areas.

Following a decision by State Council at its Meeting on 5th March to refer the Climate Change Policy Statement Advocacy Position back to the Environment Policy Team for further development, a meeting of the Policy team was called on 24th March. A variety of views on the impact of Climate Change were put forward for consideration. Several State Councillors provided written comments on their thoughts as to the direction the Advocacy Position should take. The team agreed to allow the Executive additional time until May 2025 to provide further information for consideration.

On 21st March I attended the Shire of Cue Audit Entrance Meeting which was attended by Shire Auditors AMD from Geraldton and a representative from the Office of the Auditor General. The meeting agreed the process the upcoming 2025 audit was going to take. There is now an ever more concern around cyber security and the protection of Shire and Council data.

On 27th March the CEO, Mr Richard Towell and I attended a meeting of the Cue Community Resource Centre ('CRC') to meet with DPIRD Representative Aaron Johnston and other members of the CRC Board. Aaron is the Program Manager responsible for the delivery and administration of the CRC program across WA's 103 CRC 's registered with DPIRD. President Catherine Willett recently attended a CRC Presidents forum and workshop in Perth as part of the administration of our local CRC. Aaron was very impressed with the way in which the CRC is run and administered by the Board and offered some sound advice on how to improve the operations of the Cue CRC to meet with the funding requirements of DPIRD. Aaron also met with CRC Manager Julie Humphreys to go over the CRC processes and procedures. The CRC is a real asset to the town of Cue and its Community and the many visitors to our town. Please take some time to visit the CRC and see what it has to offer.

Subject to budget, Council is happy to continue the financial support it has over the last 3 years.

With the tourist season coming up the CRC is planning to run a series of Market Days, the latest being held on 22nd March. As the season changes and the cooler weather sets in it is hoped that readers will keep an eye out for the next Market Day in April. Manager Julie Humphreys cooked up some great pancakes and provided juices, tea and coffee for purchase. Those that did come along picked up some great bargains.

We were again saddened to learn of the passing of another Cue resident and former owner of the Cue Roadhouse, Jefto (Jeff) Radanovic. Jeff was a very likeable person and an active member of the Community where he served as a Councillor on the Cue Shire Council for 10 years from 1988 to 1999. Jeff dedicated a lot of his time and energy in serving the people of Cue and was elected as Deputy Shire President 3 years, during which time he also took on the duties of acting Shire President from time to time in the absence of the then President Jim Price. Jeff was also instrumental in organising the 100th Anniversary of the Shire of Cue in 1992. Jeff will be sadly missed by his many Cue friends and business associates.








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




SUE COMMUNITY RESIN ART WORKSHOP


