People Leonie met hardly ever knew where Cue was but after talking with Leonie, they were eager to visit Cue. Leonie's love for Cue was infectious.

We welcome Lisa Keen and her husband Michael to Cue. Lisa is joining the Shire of Cue as our new Deputy Chief Executive Officer and comes with a wealth of experience. Her leadership, insight, and passion for making a positive impact will be invaluable as we continue to work toward enhanced services for the Cue community.

The Shire has started opening a number of historic buildings at regular times to allow tourists and travellers the opportunity to see inside these iconic places. The Railway building, Bank building and Masonic Lodge building are now open at regular times for public viewing. Check out the Shire notice boards or visitors centre for opening times.

The Carey Right Track Foundation are attending Cue on a fortnightly basis to provide programs at the Cue Primary School and after-school activities at the Youth Centre.

On Wednesday 21 May the Shire hosted Gina Williams and Guy House at the Cue Shire Hall. Those who attended the night enjoyed beef and gravy rolls and wonderful entertainment by Gina & Guy.



Later this month a number of Councillors and I will fly over to Canberra to represent the Shire of Cue at the Australian Local Government Association conference in Canberra from 24 to 27 June 2025. It will be a very busy week with the Regional Development Forum held on the first day where Delegates have an opportunity to discuss a wide range of issues affecting regional local governments. This year's National General Assembly will focus on key national issues, including emergency management, safer roads, housing and community infrastructure, and local government jobs and skills. The final day will hold a Ministerial Engagement Forum, which allows delegates to engage directly with the federal government on current issues.

Barefoot bowls is on every Wednesday night from 6.30pm to 8,30pm. Everyone is welcome to attend this free event with all equipment provided.

Roadworks are ongoing on the Beringarra - Cue Road with resealing works, guidepost installation and grid replacement work all taking place over the coming months. Road users are reminded to slow down through road work areas and obey all traffic directions.

Dog owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their dogs contained within the boundaries of their property or on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained dogs in public places. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Mosquito fogging will be carried out intermittently, when conditions are suitable. This is usually just before dusk but can also include early morning, to control their numbers.



# Council News

Hi 'Dryblower' Readers,

Welcome to the June 2025 edition of the Cue 'Dryblower'.

Now that the State and Federal Elections have been run and won, Local Governments across the State, in conjunction with the Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA'), have been looking closely at the various policies positions put to the electorate and the impact these policies are likely to have on the operations and statutory requirements of our Local Governments across the State.

The regions are again likely to be on the end of some budget restrictions and our call for improved health, mental health, and other Government services will likely remain unheard. The environment, climate change, renewable energy drive along with native vegetation clearing are now becoming a major focus of the State and Federal Governments as the 2050 net zero target date draws closer.

On 1<sup>st</sup> May 2025 I attended a Joint Environment and Infrastructure Policy Teams meeting to review and recommend WALGA's advocacy position on native vegetation clearing. There have been significant administrative issues around: -

- the imposition of statutory timeframes.
- Increasing the duration of clearing permits.
- Environmental data sharing.
- Increase in funding for Local Governments.
- Reducing duplication between State and Federal Government regulatory systems.
- Environmental impacts.

The joint Policy Team meeting considered a briefing on Road Safety, which is a major concern across the state but more so where there is intensive road haulage from mining and agriculture operations.

I attended a meeting of WALG's Metropolitan Waste Advisory Council, also on 1<sup>st</sup> May 2025. Some of the outcomes included: -

- The Municipal Waste Advisory Council endorsing the Better Practice Guideline to Waste Management at Public Events. The focus on waste avoidance as the first approach, followed by promoting reusable items to minimise waste generation.
- Encouraging the use of staffed waste stations, where possible, to ensure correct sorting and disposal of waste.
- Developing a draft Better Practice Guideline for Procurement of Waste Services to assist Local Governments in planning and procuring waste management services.
- Providing a concise overview of the waste procurement process. There is significant spend associated with waste management contracts and they are long term arrangements.

- Developing a Draft Position on the Circular Economy. At present a Background Paper is being developed for consideration.
- Discussion around the safe collection and disposal of end of life batteries and disposal points for e-cigarettes.
- WALGA is progressing to identify the work needed for an effective state waste infrastructure plan, contingency planning and governance around the disposal of waste.

On 7<sup>th</sup> May I attended WALGA's State Council Regional Meeting which was hosted by the East Metropolitan Zone and the City of Swan, this being one of WALGA's 17 Zones across the State. The meeting was held at the Vines Resort. Members of the East Metropolitan Zone include Bassendean, Bayswater, Belmont, Kalamunda, Mundaring and the City of Swan Local Governments.

As is customary, a Strategic Forum was held prior to the State Council Meeting. The Forum provides Councillors with an update of developments with the Local Government sector and enables State Councillors to have input into matters under consideration. Some areas of discussion included:-

- A presentation on the 'Containers for Change Scheme' performance outcomes. The containers recovered across WA since the inception of the scheme has exceeded 1Billion.
- A presentation on the Strategic Issues around 'Cyber Security Risk' involving resourcing, internal and external capability and IT Systems.
- A presentation on WALGA's 'Strategic Policy Agenda' with the prime focus being on:
  - o Economic Diversification
  - o Housing
  - o Cost of Living
  - o Health
  - o Infrastructure
  - ο Law and Order
  - o Regional Issues.

The formal State Council meeting endorsed WALGA's recommendations contained in the 'Regulations for CEO KPI's and public registers submission'. This has resulted from the draft Local Government Regulations Amendment Regulations 2024 (Draft Legislation), which give effect to reforms relating to the publication of online registers, publication of CEO performance criteria and performance review, and other CEO matters. These requirements will create further red tape and excessive administrative burden, which is in conflict with a stated aim of the reform and without clear public benefit.

State Council agreed to update its Puppy Farming advocacy position with a revised Dog and Cat Management position. State Council recommended pushing back on State Government around cost recovery around the administration and compliance with the Dog Amendment (Stop Puppy Farming) Act 2021, the Dog Act 1976 and the Cat Act 2011. The Local Government Sector has concerns regarding the PetsWA centralised registration system.

State Council recommended updating WALGA's 'Native Vegetation Clearing Regulations Advocacy Position' with a focus on Statutory timeframes, extending Area and Purpose Permits for 10 years, sharing environmental data, improved case management referrals and clearing permits, investigation and enforcement action, adequate State Government funding and reduce and avoid duplication.

State Council endorsed WALGA's submission on:-

- Health (Public Buildings) Regulations Consultation to the Department of Health and .
- WALGA's 2025 State Wage Case submission to the Western Australian Industrial Relations Commission.

The meeting also received an update from WALGA's Policy Teams, these being: -

- Infrastructure.
- People and Place.
- Environment.
- Governance.

These Policy Teams are key drivers for the gathering of data and other information in the preparation of advocacy positions and various submissions to State Government for State Council consideration and recommendation.

Each of the East Metropolitan Local Governments presented on the various activities and projects being undertaken in each of their areas. The extent of grants and other funding being provided to the metropolitan Local Governments is exceedingly high although the respective CEO's would argue that they could do with more. I'm sure the Shire of Cue could do with a serious uplift in financial assistance considering the high value GDP which is generated within the Shire for State economic benefit.

Council held is monthly Forum on 13<sup>th</sup> June and welcomed Lisa Keen who commenced in the position of Deputy Chief Executive Officer and husband, Michael. Lisa attended her first Forum evening and saw firsthand the engagement of councillors and the administration in discussions around the activities and operations of the Shire.



The Forum was briefed by the CEO on the upcoming 2025/2026 annual budget. Councillors discussed the various items that are likely to impact our finances over the forthcoming year and discussed the proposed differential rates. The CEO also briefed the meeting on the current projects and proposed capital expenditure in the forth coming year.

On 16<sup>th</sup> May Mike Fitgerald from Fitz Gerald Strategies conducted the annual CEO performance Review. Councillors and the CEO were given the opportunity to discuss the outcome of the review and the expectations of Council for the year ahead. Council is fortunate to have a CEO who manages the financial and statutory obligations of the Shire in a

responsible and professional manner, such that this is the third year in succession that the Office of the Auditor General has cited the Shire of Cue in the top twenty performing Local Governments across the State.

Shire Council held its monthly Shire Council Meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> May. The meeting agenda was not burdensome, and council approved the Differential Rates Budget, the Differential Rates to be applied in rate notices for 2025/2026, superannuation contribution payments to Council members and the 2025 Financial Management Systems Review.


# The Perth Mint State Batteries Program

Between the late 1890s and the 1950s the WA Government established 73 state batteries in mining towns. These ore crushing facilities supported small-scale miners and prospectors who lacked the scale of operations to justify their own facilities.

The Perth Mint is responsible for managing 22 State Battery sites. Some of these sites require maintenance works and further investigation.

You may see our team or contracting partners at the State Battery site near you undertaking these works.

We are engaging closely with the WA Government and other stakeholders as we progress these works.


