From the CEO

I would like to recognise our retiring Councillors Ian Dennis and Elizabeth Houghton who attended their last Council meeting on Tuesday 16 September 2025.

Councillor Ian Dennis was first elected in 2013, and for more than a decade he has contributed his time, knowledge and especially his passion for this community. Ian has brought a steady hand and a thoughtful approach to Council business, always considering what is in the best long-term interests of Cue.

Councillor Elizabeth Houghton joined Council in 2017, and from the beginning she demonstrated a strong commitment to ensuring the voices of our residents were heard and respected. Elizabeth's insight, her advocacy for the community, and her willingness to contribute to the many discussions have been invaluable.

During their time on Council, both Ian and Elizabeth have been part of significant projects that have left a lasting mark on our town. Together, they supported the repurposing of the old Post Office into the Cue Community Resource Centre, breathing new life into this iconic building. They played a role in transforming the old railway building into the Youth and Community Centre, creating a space for our younger generations. Repurposing of the old bank building into a café and dining experience which is soon to be completed and expected to add to Cue's economic development. They were part of developing the Oasis Visitor Parking Area to better welcome travellers, as well as the construction of the new bowling green and pump track providing another drawcard for visitors and locals to enjoy.

There are many aspects of being a Councillor that extend beyond these projects. The time commitment to keeping informed and making decisions on behalf of the community, the time committed to meetings, forums, personal development, attending events and interacting with the community are greatly appreciated. Your input has shaped the vision, progress, and community spirit that contributes to making Cue what it is today. Let these achievements stand as a legacy of the collective efforts of this Council, and Ian and Elizabeth please know that you have been integral to seeing them realised.

On behalf of the Council, staff, and the community, I extend our gratitude to Ian and Elizabeth for their years of service. We thank you for your commitment, for the many hours you have devoted, and for the personal sacrifices from both yourselves, your partners and your families that come with being an elected member.

As you step away from Council life, we wish you both all the very best for the future – in your personal pursuits, with your families, and in whatever new adventures lie ahead.

At the close of nominations at 4.00pm on Thursday, 4 September 2025, four nominations were received. As the number of nominations matched the four vacancies, all nominees were elected unopposed. Given that Council has three (3) four-year terms and one (1) two-year term, the Returning Officer conducted a ballot. The names of all nominees were placed into four balls. The first, second, and third names drawn were allocated the four-year terms, while the final name drawn was allocated the two-year term.

At the Special Meeting held on 5 August 2025 Councillors voted to purchase of Bell & Co. The intention is to lease the business to offer a goods and liquor outlet within the town centre and restore the shops to showcase the historic elements of the building. The Shire has engaged the services of Suzanne Hunt, a Heritage Architect to provide us with an initial concept plan to gauge what is needed to restore the building.

A reminder, the Murdoch University Vet Program will be in Cue on Friday 24 October 2025. Students from the University will be providing free pet checks and sterilisation under the guidance of a senior veterinarian. Other services available include microchipping and vaccination at the owner's expense. Please note this service is provided by the Shire of Cue and is only for dogs and cats registered with the Shire. Bookings are essential and can be made through the Shire office.

To everyone travelling on roads in the Shire of Cue, there are a number of roadworks taking place both on Great Northern Highway and on our local roads. Please drive to conditions, slow down and observe any traffic management directions. For up-to-date road conditions, please check our website for the latest information www.cue.wa.gov.au/roadreport/. Dog owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their dogs contained within the boundaries of their property or on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained dogs in public places. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Mosquito fogging will be carried out intermittently, when conditions are suitable. This is usually just before dusk but can also include early morning, to control their numbers.

Council News

Hi 'Dryblower' Readers,

Welcome to the October 2025 edition of the Cue 'Dryblower'.

By now many of you will be aware of the upcoming Local Government elections to be held on 18th October 2025. Cue was looking to fill four Council positions, and four nominations were received when nominations closed on 4th September 2025. Therefore, we will not be having an election.

September was as busy month with a lot happening around the elections. On 4th and 5th September Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA') took the State Council to the Shire of Dundas (Norseman) where President Laurene Bonza hosted the Goldfields Esperance Country Zone Forum. The Zone's constituent local governments include the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder and the Shires of Coolgardie, Dundas, Esperance, Laverton, Leonora, Menzies, Ngaanyatjaraku, Ravensthorpe, and Wiluna.

The Goldfields Esperance Region is the largest in Western Australia, covering over 950,000 square kilometres and comprising these 10 Local Government areas. The Zone Forum provides all 10 Local Governments with an opportunity to showcase their towns and promote opportunities that are available for industry, local businesses and tourists alike.



Mining and agriculture play a significant role in the region with annual gross domestic product of \$37 billion, a major contributor to the State's economy. Local Governments in the Zone face the same difficulties and issues as all other regional Shires across the State some of which include:-

- Housing shortages.
- Water security.
- Law and order.
- Staff retention.
- Lack of State and Federal Government funding.
- Revitalisation of the town and regional precincts.



Tony Brown, WALGA Executive Director Member Services (pictured above second from the left) has been with WALGA for 19 years and has now accepted a role as WA's inaugural Local Government Inspector. Tony was a fierce supporter of Local Government and assisted many councils to navigate the many changes in the Local Government Act and provide advice on issues that impacted the sector. Tony will be missed, and we wish him well in his new endeavour.

As part of the State Government's Local Government Reforms, the State-funded Office of the Local Government Inspector is to be established to provide support, advice and clarity for Mayors, Presidents, Elected Members and Council Chief Executive Officers on their roles and responsibilities. The establishment of the Office of the Local Government Inspector will provide improved and more efficient monitoring should early intervention on issues be required.

WALGA President Karen Chappel AM JP acknowledged the significant contribution Mr Brown has made to WALGA and the entire Local Government sector in WA over the last 40 years. President Chappel said Mr. Brown has 'dedicated his life to the service of WA Local Governments and during this time, he has provided expert guidance and advice across the sector'.

The Shire held its monthly Forum on 9th September. The Forum was advised that the rate notices for 2025/2026 budget year had been printed and mailed out. Be sure to take advantage of the cash draw that is on offer for those who pay their rates in full by in full by 17 October 2025. Each financial ratepayer will be automatically entered into the draw to win one of three cash prizes. The prize winners will be drawn at the Ordinary Council Meeting on 18 November 2025.

Nominations are now open for Citizen of the Year Awards. Please take the time to consider who has made a contribution, worthy of recognition. There are four categories available for your consideration.

- Citizen of the Year
- Senior Citizen of the Year
- Youth Citizen of the Year
- Active Citizenship (Group or Event)

On 12th September I attended a Joint Governance and Environment Policy teams meeting. The meeting had a focus on providing guidance to State Council on 'Differential Rating of Unoccupied Properties' and looking at its application to both residential and commercial properties. Many Local Governments are experiencing issues around 'land banking'. WALGA currently has an advocacy position on the Legislative reforms to counter land banking. WALGA is also looking for Local Governments to be agile, enhance community wellbeing and drive economic prosperity.

The meeting also looked at the legal and practical constraints around planning and building matters particularly in relation to preventing the demolition of habitable dwellings until a development approval is granted and to impose time limits on such developments.

I also attended an Environment Policy team meeting on 18th September to consider recommendations from various s Zones across the State. Some of the matters to come before the meeting included:-

- Translocation of wildlife.
- Development of a planning code around Wind Energy Facilities.
- Short Term Rental Accommodation (STRA).
- H5 Bird Flu.
- Cat Containment.
- Polyphagous Shothole Borer strategies.

Council held its monthly Shire Council Meeting on 16th September, the last meeting to be attended by the current Elected Members. Council considered and passed a recommendation to adopt the Council Meeting dates for 2026. Readers should access the Minutes of the Meeting on the Shire website and note the meeting dates.

The meeting also had a sombre tone with the announcement that Cr. Liz Houghton and Cr. Ian Dennis would not be seeking a further term on Council. Both Liz and Ian made a significant contribution to our town, and we thank them for their dedication and commitment as elected Members of the Cue Shire Council.



The WALGA's Annual Local Government Convention was held at the Perth Convention and Exhibition Centre from 22nd to 25th September. Cue Shire was well represented by Councillors and the Administration who were given the opportunity to participate. The convention is an opportunity to engage with other Local Governments around the State and share experiences. It offers an excellent opportunity to network and hear of the work WALGA undertakes in the support of its members. The Convention also provides an overview on the direction of the State Government on legislative reforms and other matters being considered which affects Local Governments and their communities.

The Association Annual General Meeting was also held during the Convention with the Shire of Mt. Magnet requesting advocacy support from WALGA and the broader section around the Supreme Court decision to rate miscellaneous licences. There has been significant pushback by the State Government and the mining sector with the Minister Hon. Hannah Beazley, suggesting there will be legislative changes designed to prevent the rating of these licences. I commend Mt Magnet for having the courage to challenge the system and be successful. The impact of this decision will be felt by Local Governments across the State with the sole purpose of being able to derive more revenue to meet increasing costs and to provide ongoing community benefits at a time when both Federal and State Governments are cost shifting essential services to the sector.



At the Convention Mr Basil Zempilas, MLA, Leader of the Opposition; Leader of the WA Liberal Party; Shadow Minister for State Development; Trade and Investment; provided a detailed presentation outlining the opposition's vision for WA and offering solutions to the issues faced by Local Governments across the State. As a former radio personality and football commentator Basil certainly knew how to captivate an audience. It is imperative that the State have a strong opposition to ensure our communities are not overlooked and to combat the significant political imbalance in the Parliament.

Attendees at the convention were also treated with two great presentations from Glen McGrath and Adam Goodes. Glen, of course, was a highly decorated cricketer who played for Australia while Adam was a two time Brownlow Medallist and had a successful career with the Sydney Swans.

Readers, please feel free to contact myself or any of the other Councillors if you have a matter you need to bring to the attention of Council and the Administration. Council is always looking to the community to provide input into the future direction of our town.

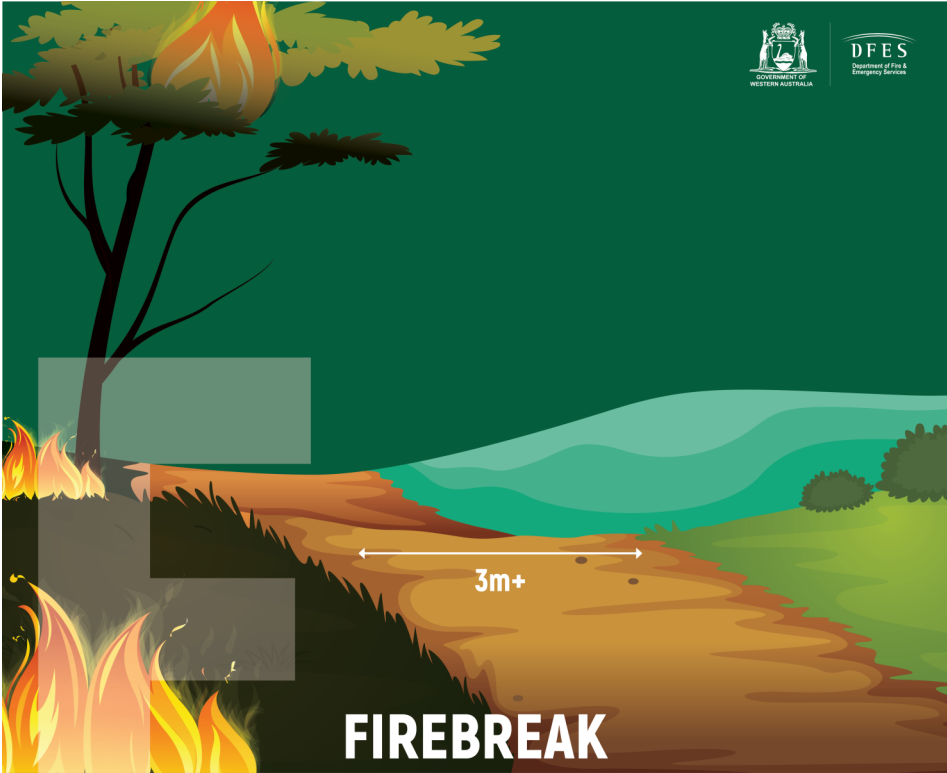

CLEAN YOUR GUTTERS

Cleaning your gutters regularly will help protect your home from ember attack in bushfire season and water damage during storm season.

FIREBREAK

Fire breaks are a cleared gap in the vegetation that can provide access for firefighting vehicles and also slow the spread of low intensity bushfires.



Property Preparedness: What every WA resident can do

- **Keep your property well-maintained** - clear away dry leaves, branches, and rubbish that could fuel fires or block drains.
- **Trim and manage vegetation** - this helps reduce bushfire risk and limits damage from storms.
- **Secure loose items outside** - furniture, tools, toys, and anything that strong winds could pick up and throw.
- **Inspect your roof and gutters** - fix damage and keep gutters clear to prevent leaks and flooding.
- **Clear access ways** - make sure emergency vehicles can reach your property quickly and safely.

Prepare an [emergency kit](#) with essentials: water, food, medications, important documents, and first aid supplies.

For those in Bushfire-Prone Areas

- Cut the grass around your property to 10cm or less.
- Prune thick shrubs or remove any vegetation from against your home - create a minimum 2m gap between your house and tree branches.

Move any wood, mulch, or flammable materials away from the outside of the house.

For those in Cyclone and Flood-Prone Areas

- Check and reinforce windows and doors; consider installing cyclone shutters or storm-proof screens.
 - **Plan for power outages**, have a supply of batteries, torches, and a portable radio.
- Elevate or protect electrical outlets, appliances, and valuables if you are prone to flooding.

Tips for renters and landlords

- **Renters:** Report any maintenance issues promptly and know your evacuation plans.
- **Landlords:** Regularly inspect and maintain your properties and share emergency plans with tenants.
