Water supply in a bushfire

This information could save your life



While leaving high-risk bushfires is the safest option, if you plan to stay and defend your home, you must have an **INDEPENDENT** water supply and pumping capability. This typically requires water tanks of at least 20,000 litres, pump and generator.

This is required as mains water supply and pressure cannot be guaranteed during a bushfire due to the risk of power cuts, fire damage and extreme demand.

Use the Department of Fire and Emergency Services resources to develop your personal bushfire plan: mybushfireplan.wa.gov.au
You can also download the My Bushfire Plan app via the App Store or Google Play to access your bushfire plan anytime - even without an internet connection.

To support bushfire plans, if you have groundwater bore access to surface water, you can take and store emergency water without it counting against your annual entitlement. For more information on this, and for the location of emergency bushfire water supplies in dryland agricultural areas, visit the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation website.

Drinking water

We recommend you keep a supply of drinking water on hand throughout summer in case your water supply is interrupted.

Assistance for customers affected by bushfire

After a bushfire, we can assist you with issues such as damaged water meters and payment difficulties. If you have been affected by bushfire please call us on **13 13 85**.

The Emergency WA website emergency.wa.gov.au provides emergency information and community safety warnings. Call **000** in a life-threatening emergency or the SES **132 500** for emergency assistance.

Mains water supply cannot be guaranteed during a bushfire

Water Corporation is prepared for bushfire season. However, we cannot guarantee that water pressure or water supply will be maintained in the event of a bushfire. Extreme demand, fire damage and power cuts can all result in a total loss of water.

If you plan to stay and defend your property during a bushfire, you must have your own independent water supply and pumping capability. You cannot rely on mains water.

Australia Day 2026 celebrations will be held on the town oval from 6.30pm Monday 26 January, with fireworks, live music with Geoff Udy, food and refreshments. Celebrations for Australia Day have been made possible by funding from Auspire, part of the Australia Day Council National network.

The Shire working in conjunction with the Department of Fire and Emergency Services will be undertaking fire break works around Cue town site. Owners and occupiers of land are reminded of their obligations to clear and maintain fire breaks over the summer months. The summer months are also a time of storms and cyclones. Residents are also reminded to clean up and remove any unwanted or loose items from their property that could cause damage in a storm. Larger items can be collected by contacting the Manager of Works and Services to make arrangements.

Dog and cat owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their pets contained within the boundaries of their property. Dogs must be on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained pets in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Mosquito fogging operations are being undertaken when weather conditions allow. Residents are asked to check their properties and remove any potential mosquito breeding areas, by emptying containers holding water, ensuring gutters are not holding water and checking yards for areas that hold water.

Proposed lease of two units at 28 Heydon Place, Cue

In accordance with *Section 3.58(3) of the Local Government Act 1995*, notice is hereby given that the Shire of Cue proposes the following dispositions:

Lease of two Shire of Cue owned industrial units located at 28 Heydon Place, Cue. The proposed leases are for one year each with the option of extending for two one-year periods at the discretion of both parties. Rental for each unit is proposed at \$5,200 per annum or \$100 per week, each, payable monthly in advance. Power and water are to be paid for by the tenants. The property valuation as of 30 June 2023 determined the fair value of each unit to be \$183,333. This was declared as a true indication of the current market value of the property for the purpose of satisfying *section 3.58(4)(c)(ii) of the Local Government Act 1995*.

At the Ordinary Meeting of Council held on 16 December 2025, Council resolved that the successful candidates for the proposed lease arrangements are as follows:

Seven Golden Rules for prospecting

1

Safety first

- Make sure you have enough water, fuel, maps and first aid supplies.
- Importantly, be sure to take a registered Personal Locator Beacon (PLB) – it may be your most important safety device.

2

Obtain a Miner's Right

when prospecting on available Crown land.

3

Obtain a 40E permit

prior to prospecting within an exploration tenement (if you don't have written permission from the tenement holder).

4

Get written permission

from the tenement holder when prospecting on:

- a mining lease;
- an exploration licence (if you don't have a 40E permit); or
- a prospecting licence.

5

Comply with all legal requirements

when prospecting on a pastoral lease.

You cannot prospect within 100 metres of any occupied building or within 400 metres of any livestock watering point without the consent of the pastoralist.

6

Show respect when on Crown land

because it is used by other people or set aside for many purposes.

7

Fill any holes

that you dug and repair ground that has been disturbed.

Council News

Hi 'Dryblower' Readers, Happy New Year to you all and welcome to the January 2026 issue of the Cue 'Dryblower'.

The 2025 year came and went so quickly but on reflection your Council had a busy year with three new Councillors elected in October 2025 and with former Councillor, Ian Dennis deciding to retire from Council duties and relocate with Jenni to Victoria.

Sometimes the work of the Council goes unnoticed however, behind the scenes there is a lot of good work being done for the town and its people. Whilst we are a small regional town with a limited budget Cue has gained a reputation as tourist stopover place to visit with significant investment in our heritage buildings and general townscape. This culminated in Cue being selected as a finalist in the 2025 'Heritage and Culture' section of the Australia Beautiful Council 'Tidy Town' awards. Having achieved this award in the 2024 year there were high hopes for a repeat outcome. Although we were unsuccessful it was a credit to the town to have been selected as a finalist in 2025.

Let's hope that the 2026 year is a productive and prosperous one for all.

December 2025 was again a very busy time at both the Shire and the Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA'). On top of the various Christmas functions, last minute meetings and preparation for winding down for the Christmas break, Councillors took a welcomed break from the usual formalities.

On 3 December I attended a State Councillor Induction workshop. With the Local Government Elections held in October 2025 the mix of State Council included five (5) new State Councillors. The December State Council meeting was the first time new Councillors had the opportunity to meet continuing Councillors and experience the workings of WALGA and State Council for the first time.

The workshop provided Councillors with a complete overview of the structure of WALGA and the make-up of the 17 Zones which represent all 139 Local Governments across the State. Councillors were also shown how the Policy Teams function within WALGA and how matters impacting Local Government are considered and eventually come before State Council for endorsement.

WALGA held its Strategic Forum on 3 December with a presentation from the Minister for Local Government Hon. Hannah Beasley detailing some of the Local Government Reforms with the main focus being:-

- Roles and Responsibilities of Councillors and the Administrators of Local Governments.
- Financial Sustainability.
- Compulsory Local Government Elections
- Full election of all Councillors every four (4) years.

WALGA State Council met on 3 December, this being the first meeting involving newly elected members. Some of the matters discussed and endorsed included:-

- Submission for draft guidelines on community benefits for renewable energy projects.
- Submission on Phase 2 reforms to Western Australia's working with children check law.
- Rateability of Miscellaneous Licences resulting from an action involving the Shire of Mt. Magnet.
- Submission to the 2026 Salaries and Allowances Tribunal Remuneration Inquiry for Local Government Chief Executive Officers and Elected Members.

Cue recognised the importance of the work our Volunteers and celebrated with a function on 5 December 2025 at the Murchison Club Hotel. Deputy President Ross Pigdon thanked all Volunteers for their continued support and encouraged others to offer their time and assistance for the community.



Council held its monthly Forum on 9 December. Aside from a general discussion on the up-to-date work aspects of the Shire and the series of upcoming events, Council has been considering an update of the Cue Entry Statement at both entrances to the town. The proposal was initiated by former Councillor Ian Dennis and has gained some momentum with Council. Our Entry Statement is tired and in need of a facelift in keeping with the progress of other Local Governments. The CEO provided the meeting with a series of initial proposed designs for Councillors to consider. These drawings are simply suggestions to give Council and the Community some ideas to contemplate.



The concept is very much in the development and forward planning phase, and no decision will be made until the Community has been given the opportunity to provide input and offer suggestions. This is not a decision that Council will make without Community feedback and involvement. As I said, it is very much early days and I am sure you will have further information over time and if undertaken, this project will take some time to deliver.

On 10 December I attended the Murchison Regional Vermin Council ('MRVC') meeting in Mt. Magnet. The Council was established in 1963 and is responsible for the construction and maintenance of the vermin proof fence within our region. With State and Federal Government assistance and the support of our immediate Regional Local Government neighbours we were able to complete the 1,000km fenceline. This has been a major project over a considerable number of years.

At present the goal of the MRVC is to ensure the vermin proof fence is maintained to prevent any further incursion of wild dogs into the cell. The Council has been proactive in engaging local contractors to carry out this work. Other than reviewing the fence maintenance requirements, it was business as usual.



The Council held its monthly ordinary meeting on 16 December. The meeting formerly acknowledged the passing of former Shire President Ian Hamilton and on behalf of the Shire of Cue, we passed on our condolences to his family.

The Local Government Inspector is a statutory officer appointed to improve the accountability, transparency, and decision-making of local governments across Western Australia. The Inspector provides oversight through complaint handling, inquiries, compliance review, and education.

As Tony has extensive knowledge of Local Government and having been a former CEO and Senior Executive with WALGA he is ideally placed to carry out his new role.





Council extends its appreciation and thanks to former Councillor Ian Dennis for his service to the Cue Community. Ian served as a Councillor for 13 years and dedicated an extraordinary amount of time and energy in carrying out his role. We wish both Ian and Jenni all the best in their future endeavours.

It is with sadness that we learn of the recent passing of former Councillor and President, Ian William Hamilton who passed away on 4 December 2025. Ian and his family were long-time residents in Cue and at different times owned Nallan, Kalli and Madoonga Stations. Ian was a keen pilot who used his skills to carry out mustering activities on his properties.

Ian was first elected to Council in 1994 and became President from 1995 to 1998. We pass on our sincere condolences to Ian's family for their sad loss.
