Arthur Stanley Gurney, clerk and soldier, was born on 15 December 1908 at Day Dawn, on the Murchison goldfields, Western Australia, fourth of five children of George Gurney, miner, and his wife Jane, née Roberts, both from South Australia. Educated at the local state school and at Stott's Business College, Perth, Stan began work with a real-estate agent. From June 1927 he was employed as a clerk and meter-fixer with the City of Perth Electricity and Gas Department. An enthusiastic cyclist, he won a number of road-races and officiated at fixtures conducted by the League of Western Australian Wheelmen.

Quiet and unassuming, Gurney stated that he was an Anglican when he enlisted on 6 December 1940 in the Australian Imperial Force. In July 1941 he embarked for the Middle East and on 12 September joined the 2nd/48th Battalion at Tobruk, Libya; the 2nd/48th was sent to Palestine in October and to Syria in January 1942.

As part of the 26th Brigade, 9th Division, the battalion was deployed to Egypt in June to meet the threat posed by Axis forces pushing east towards El Alamein. Tel el Eisa lay approximately 16 km to the west, near the coast. The division was ordered to mount an attack on 22 July; the 2nd/48th's role was to capture Tel el Eisa Ridge. Major General Sir Leslie Morshead protested to the British commander-in-chief, General Sir Claude Auchinleck, that the plan was ill-conceived, pointing out that inadequate support would be provided. Because the 26th Brigade had to hold its existing ground, the 2nd/24th and 2nd/48th battalions could each spare only two companies for the assault and these would lack reinforcements. Yet the operation went ahead.

The 2nd/48th's 'D' Company, with Private Gurney in No.17 Platoon, crossed its start-line about 6.00 a.m. on 22 July, came under intense fire and began to take heavy casualties. Using a captured post as a fire-support position, 17 Platoon pushed on. Gurney carried a cumbersome Boyes anti-tank rifle. His platoon commander, Lieutenant Jim Wearing-Smith, recalled: 'Stan came up to me and I said, "For Christ sake drop that bloody Boyes, you'll do better with a rifle!"' Within the next few moments Wearing-Smith was critically wounded and the platoon sergeant was killed. Carrying a rifle and bayonet, Gurney rushed over open ground through a hail of fire, bayoneted three Germans and captured their machine-gun post. He then charged a second emplacement, bayoneted two of the enemy and sent back one prisoner. While preparing to attack a third post, he was blown off his feet by a grenade burst. Undeterred, he stormed the position. His comrades saw him 'using the bayonet with great vigour' before he disappeared from view and was killed.

Gurney's body was found and buried in El Alamein war cemetery; he was posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross. In 1994 his family presented it to the Australian War Memorial, Canberra. The Stan Gurney V.C. Memorial Bike Race, held annually in Western Australia, commemorates him.

From the CEO

Due to Cyclone Narelle, the town experienced an influx of concerned travellers seeking a safe place to shelter while weather conditions impacted the region. Cue provided a welcome refuge during this period, with approximately 40 caravans arriving and staying overnight on Thursday, 27 March 2026 with some extending their stay.

On Friday, 27 March 2026, I attended the Seniors Morning Tea kindly hosted by the Cue Community Resource Centre. It was wonderful to see our Seniors coming together and enjoying morning tea, which was supplied by the Shire of Cue. The room was filled with lively discussions and a strong sense of community connection.

At the Ordinary Council meeting held on Tuesday 17 March 2026, Council awarded the Concrete Pathway tender to WA Concrete. The project will deliver a new concrete pathway along Patterson Street and the remaining section of Wittenoom Street, including a connecting leader pathway to the Railway Building. Construction works are scheduled for completion by 30 June 2026. This project made possible by grant funding provided by the WA Bicycle Network and Department of Transport.

Pastor Geoff Van Schie has resumed his regular "Flying Visits" to Cue Primary School, where he has been a valued part of the community for over 10 years. Proudly supported by the Shire of Cue, these visits continue to provide encouragement and positive engagement for students and staff.

With regards to the "Cue Entry Statement" this is the last month for you to submit your opinions, ideas or designs on whether we keep our current entry statement, or should we have a new design that better reflects our local history. We encourage all community members to share their thoughts and ideas. Please see the "Have Your Say" article in the April edition of the *Dryblower*.

Works at the Masonic Lodge are progressing well. Electrical and plumbing works have been undertaken, and all preparations have been completed in readiness for roof sheeting to be fitted once weather conditions permit.

Our Anzac Day Dawn Service will be held at Arthur Gurney Park (next to Shire Admin building) commencing at 6:00am on Saturday 25 April 2026. Following the service a free breakfast will be served at the Murchison Club Hotel.

Ongoing uncertainty with fuel deliveries has required the Shire to scale back parts of its roadworks program. While some works will be delayed, the Shire will continue to carry out essential maintenance such as grading, pothole repairs, and road signage to ensure road safety.

To everyone travelling on roads in the Shire of Cue, please drive to conditions, slow down and observe any traffic management directions. For up-to-date road conditions, please check our website for the latest information www.cue.wa.gov.au/roadreport/.

Dog and cat owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their pets contained within the boundaries of their property. Pets must be on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained pets in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

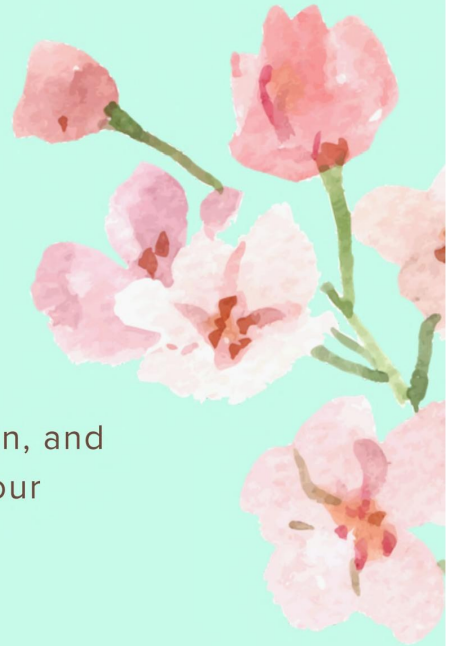

Council News

Hi 'Dryblower' Readers.

The year is very much underway, and a lot is on the agenda that is likely to impact Local Governments and their communities across the State.

With the retirement of President Karen Chappel (Shire of Morawa) and Deputy President Paul Kelly (Town of Claremont) the Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA') has elected Mayor Mark Irwin (City of Stirling) as President and Deputy President Chris Antonio (Shire of Northam) of the Association at its meeting of State Councillors held on 4 March 2026.

Nominations for President were received from (6) State Councillors from Metropolitan Zones while three (3) nominations from Country Zones were received for the position of Deputy President. These roles are critical to furthering the relationship with the State Government and advocating for the sector on many issues impacting communities across the State.

Newly elected President, Mark Irwin thanked the outgoing President for her dedication and loyal service to the Local Government sector in Western Australia. Karen leaves the organisation in a sound financial position along with the many successful negotiated outcomes she managed to achieve whilst she was in the Chair.

Both Mark and Chis were well supported by State Council and from what I have already seen and heard our Association is in good hands. Developing sound relationships with the State Government and other stakeholders while advocating strongly on matters that impact and affect Local Government and their communities across State requires a fine balancing act. This is no more evident than when the WALGA's advocacy position is in conflict with that of the State Government and other Departments and Agencies.

President, Mark Irwin

- WALGA President Mark Irwin was born and raised in Scarborough and was first elected as a Councillor for the City of Stirling in 2015 and has served as Mayor since 2017.
- President Irwin has a deep understanding of WALGA having previously served on WALGA State Council from 2021-2023, before being re-elected as a Zone Delegate of the WALGA Northern Metropolitan Zone and to State Council in 2025.
- President Irwin holds a degree in science from UWA, a Diploma in Management, and has completed both the Berkeley Executive Leadership Program and is a Graduate of the Australian Institute of Company Directors Course.
- He has previously served on government and community boards, most notably as President of Surf Life Saving WA and currently on the board of Warriapendi Primary School.
- Across his career, President Irwin has forged strong relationships with Local, State and Federal Governments, demonstrating an ongoing commitment to leadership and community service.

Deputy President, Chris Antonio

Deputy President Chris Antonio is a respected regional leader committed to strengthening community outcomes across Western Australia. First elected as a Councillor for the Shire of Northam in 2015, he has served as Shire President since 2017.

- In addition to being a WALGA State Councillor since 2023, and a Director of LGIS, Deputy President Antonio also serves on the District Leadership Group for the Avon-Midland Zone and represents WALGA on the State Road Funds to Local Government Advisory Committee.
- Deputy President Antonio holds a Bachelor of Business (Agriculture), is a graduate of the Australian Institute of Company Directors, and holds Diplomas and Graduate Diplomas in Local Government, Financial Planning, and Business Financial Management.
- Deputy President Antonio has more than 20 years of experience in Agribusiness Finance, having worked with a major Australian Bank as a specialist, and is a Sessional University Lecturer, specialising in Agribusiness Business Planning and Risk Management.

Both Mark and Chris are acutely aware of the issues facing regional and remote Local Governments and their communities and will be mindful of the need to provide leadership and support where political representation and sparse populations often mean our voice is not heard.

Aside from election the President and Deputy President of WALGA on 4 March 2026 State Council confirmed a number of items that were previously considered by State Council by way of a Flying Minute. These included:-

- The 2026-2027 State Budget Submission.
- Select Committee into Land Development and Planning.
- Statutory Review of the Work Health and Safety Act 2020 - WALGA Submission.
- Draft State Waste Strategy - WALGA Submission.
- Inquiry into Local Government Funding and Fiscal Sustainability.
- Sector Consultation - Compulsory and Voluntary Voting and Election Frequency.

Flying Minutes are items of an urgent nature that are considered by State Councillors where time does not permit an 'in person' meeting. Minutes are prepared by WALGA and sent to each State Councillor for recommendation. All Flying Minutes are then ratified at the next State Council meeting.

Newly appointed Local Government Inspector Tony Brown delivered a presentation on his role with a focus on Conduct and Compliance. Whilst the majority of Local Governments operate smoothly and with efficiency there are some where there is conflict between Councillors as well as with the Administration where there are compliance concerns. Tony has the power to appoint a Monitor to go in and deal with the various issues of a Local Government.

As Chair of the Environment Policy Team I provided a report to State Council covering issues which included:-

- Transit Oriented Development and Planning around 10 metropolitan train stations designed to ensure sound planning and development around urban infill.
- A report on Renewable Energy Community Benefits Plan covering wind, solar and batteries designed to provide financial support for Local Governments and their communities.
- A Climate Change Discussion Paper designed to develop an Advocacy Position around the Federal and State Governments push to attain 'Net Zero' targets by 2050. Not all Local Governments are in support of the target which is unlikely to be met. The cost to achieve this target is likely to impact all Local Governments and their communities.
- A report on Water Management Discussion Paper designed to deliver water security for all Western Australians. Service Delivery, Clearing Permits, Public Open Space and Planning for Water are the main issues under Consideration.
- The Urban Greening Strategy for the Perth/Peel Region was announced whereby it is hoped that there will be 30% treen canopy cover by 2040. Grants for communities and schools will be available to participate in the project.

From the Murchison Country Zone perspective we are continually advocating for better outcomes, cost of living support, improved services, project capital support and general health and well-being services for our regional local Governments and communities.

Council held its monthly Forum on 10 March 2026 and received a report from Mr. Richard Towell, CEO as to the various projects underway.

- Discussion also centred on Westgold Resources Ltd.'s plans to further develop its Cuddingwarra mining tenements and open two new pits on Coodardy Station.
- The Forum was also provided with a progress report on the increased operations of Fenix Ltd.'s activities at the Weld Range. The current price of gold and other minerals has enabled mining companies to consider what would otherwise be marginal economic value and expand their projects in and around Cue.
- Council is in the process of considering a new Entry Statement. Ideas for a conceptual design by all residents and visitors of our town are encouraged and I ask that you submit your ideas to the Cue Shire Administration office or email to the Shire with your suggestions. It is important that we get input from as many as we can so that the final design is a reflection on what our community wants. All submissions will be considered. ***PLEASE TAKE SOME TIME TO PROVIDE YOU IDEAS AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.***
- Rejuvenation of Bell's Emporium.
- Update on the progress of the Masonic Lodge Project.
- Street Sign project progress.
- ALGA National General Assembly 23 to 25 June 2026.

Council also received a report from CEO Richard Towell and the Works Manager, John ('JC') Curtin advising Council of the monthly activities and forward planning. Finances, of course are always an integral part of any Shire Meeting.

The annual Cue Shire Audit Entry Meeting was held on 16 March 2026 with our auditors AMD and the Office of the Auditor General ('OAG'), both providing a briefing on the processes and areas of audit focus in the upcoming 2025/2026 audit. Your Shire has an impeccable audit record and is regularly considered by the OAG as one of the State's better audit compliance

Council held its monthly Council meeting on 17 March 2026 and considered several matters which included:-

- 2025/2026 Budget Review.
- A request for financial support from Pastor van Schie's of the Wheatbelt Christian Fellowship visits the Cue Primary School offering pastoral support and advice. Council is happy to continue to support this program for the 2026 school year.
- Council also considered a tender for the Concrete Pathway Construction which was granted to WA Concrete.

On 19 March 2026 I attended WALGA's Environment Policy Team meeting which covered an extensive number of ongoing activities around the environment, waste and planning all of which impact the State at some level. Items discussed included:-

- Consultation with Local Governments cross the State seeking a Council endorsed position on Climate Change so that WALGA can develop an Advocacy Position. This matter will come up when the Murchison Country Zone meets at its 'Cue Parliament' in April 2026.
- Renewable Energy Facilities Draft Code which aims to establish a consistent assessment framework, clear development standards and improved certainty around impacts such as noise, landscape, environmental considerations, and safety. Consideration of community benefits is a factor that must be taken into consideration.
- Translocation of kangaroos in the City of Wanneroo was considered and rejected as a project that did not have a wider sector issue along with other considerations around animal welfare.
- Request to WALGA by the Southeast Metropolitan and Peel Country Zones to develop an Advocacy Position prohibiting mining and exploration activities within designated water catchment areas, particularly where there could be a potential impact on drinking water. This was identified by Water Corporation as being a significant factor.
- Feedback provided to the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation ('DWER') on Compliance and Enforcement Policy and the legislation covering such requirements.
- Feedback provided to the Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority on Anticoagulant Rodenticide Ban which rodenticides are problematic in relation to secondary poisoning risk.
- The development of a Water Management Advocacy Position designed to modernise current water management legislation, to adequately sustain and fund critical water infrastructure programs for Local Government. The meeting also considered access to water data and capability for Local Governments to ensure evidence-based decision making. Feedback from Local Governments was extensive with 27 submissions, 14 of which were Council/CEO level feedback with over 200 individual comments.

Also, on 19 March 2026 I attended a Joint Environment and People & Place Policy Teams Meeting for the purpose of reviewing a DFES 'Bushfire Place of Last Resort' Discussion Paper. In light of the Yarloop fires of some 10 years ago and the evacuation issues at Preston Beach, DFES is asking Local Governments to identify a 'Place of Last Resort' and take on responsibility when every exit has been closed off and there is no other pathway out of the imminent danger.

The Joint Meeting considered that for Local Governments to take on the responsibility there were too many foreseeable problems and serious concerns which include:-

- Liability.
- Duty of Care.
- Work, Health and Safety concerns.
- Change of wind direction.
- Funding.
- 'Place of Last Resort' upkeep and maintenance.
- Signage.
- Awareness and Education programs.
- Local amenities and utilities at such places.

The risk to Local Government is too great for it to assume such responsibility.

On 27 March 2026 I attended a Mayors and Presidents Forum run by WALGA. This Forum presented a valuable opportunity for Mayors and Presidents and State Councillors to discuss key issues, share insights, and collaborate on initiatives that impact our communities.

Newly elected WALGA President, Mark Irwin, provided an update on his vision for the Association and how he plans to build on the success to-date, bringing a strong voice for the sector and ensuring WALGA is advocating effectively for WA Local Governments and their communities.

Minister for Local Government Hon Hannah Beazley MLA addressed the group on the State Government's priorities for 2026, and Local Government Inspector Mr Tony Brown provided an overview of the function of the Local Government Inspector and shared his priorities for the year ahead.

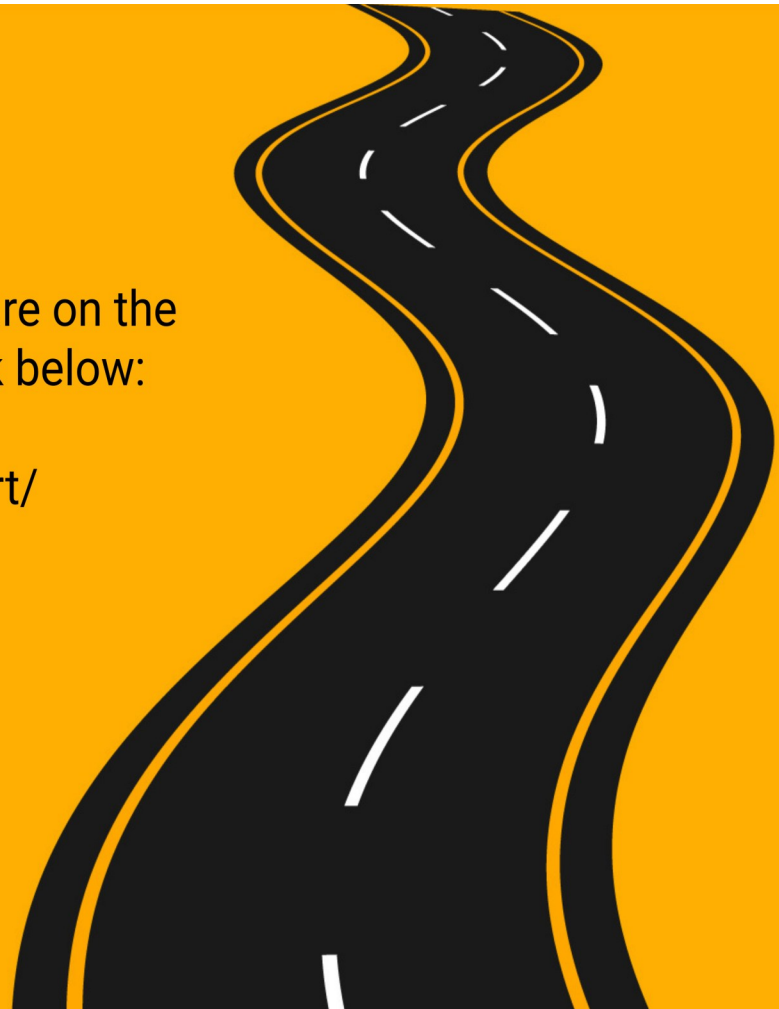

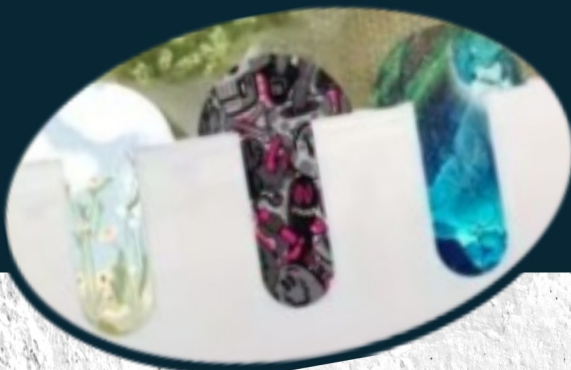

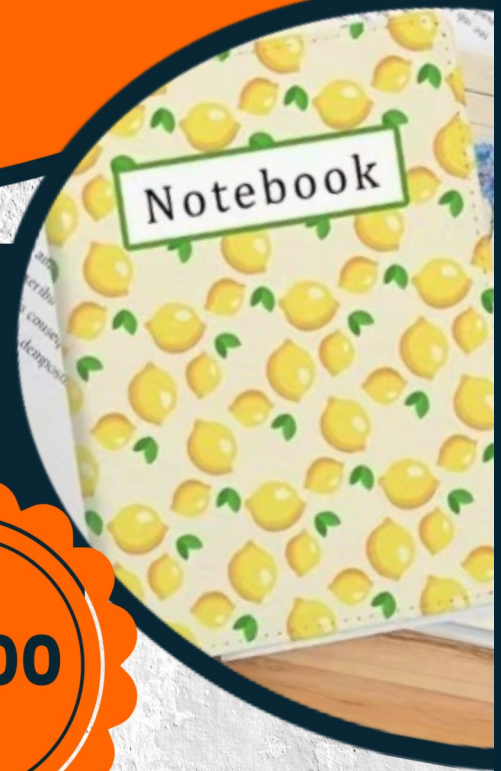
