CUE HERITAGE CENTRE

The original town hall was bought from the Australian Workers Union for £150. Called the Worker's Hall and the Amalgamated Workers Association Building. It was lit with power from the Cue One Goldmine and later was powered from the town supply.

The town hall was destroyed by fire during a thunderstorm on the 4th of March, 1955.

Below is an excerpt from 'Just a Century Ago, A History of the Shire of Cue' pg 109,110 by P.R Heydon

'The fire was noticed about 3:55 am, when the Cue Volunteer Fire Brigade sounded the alarm. A severe flash and thunder clap occurred about 3:45 am and this is believed to be the cause of the fire. Ironically a heavy downpour started around the same time and lasted towards 5:00 am, water was flowing everywhere, yet this rain had little effect on the fire, it did help to prevent damage to fences, screens and trees.

A claim was later signed on behalf of the Board for a sum of £2727 for buildings, furniture and a piano that were claimed in the fire. The large change room at the closed Big Bell Mine was purchased by the Board it was to be dismantled and brought to Cue to replace the burnt down hall.'

From the CEO

Vale Councillor Ross Pigdon



The Shire of Cue acknowledges with deep sadness the passing of Deputy Shire President, Councillor Ross Pigdon, who passed away on 9 April 2026.

Ross Pigdon was well known as the owner of Bell & Co and dedicated many years of committed service to the Shire of Cue and the wider community, leaving a legacy of leadership, integrity and community pride.

Ross was first elected as Deputy Shire President in 1999 - 2005, quickly establishing himself as a strong advocate for the Shire and its residents. Ross then had a break from Council until being elected in 2015, and voted as Shire President, a role he held with distinction until his retirement from Council in 2023. During this period, Ross provided steady leadership through times of change and growth, always guided by a deep respect for Cue's history and its future.

At an extraordinary election in 2024, Ross answered the call to serve once more and was re-elected as a Councillor. In 2025, his fellow Councillors elected him as Deputy Shire President, recognising his experience, sound judgement and unwavering commitment to local government.

A long-standing member of Cue, Ross was deeply connected to the community he served. His strong appreciation for Cue's history and people underpinned his approach to local government and his commitment to ensuring a resilient and sustainable future for the district.

The Shire of Cue extends its sincere condolences to Ross's family, friends and loved ones. He will be remembered with gratitude and respect for the significant contribution he made to the Shire and its community.

Cue has great facilities for travellers. The Cue Tourist Park offers powered and unpowered sites, and there are other accommodation options in town including the Cue Motel, Murchison Club Hotel and the Queen of the Murchison Guest House. If you're travelling self-contained, the Shire provides a free 48-hour RV area, along with a handy day stop opposite the Cue Community Visitors Centre where you can park, enjoy the gardens and seating, and top up with potable water making your stay easy and well supported.

Anzac Day

Around 200 people gathered in the early morning light for Cue's Dawn ANZAC Service, including local families, community groups, Shire representatives, a sea of hi-vis workers and visitors. The service was conducted by Shire President Les Price, who led a respectful and heartfelt commemoration of those who served including the late Deputy Shire President Ross Pigdon. After the ceremony, attendees made their way to the Murchison Club Hotel, where a community breakfast was waiting, including a few people continuing tradition with a "gunfire coffee," adding a splash of rum to their morning brew as they shared stories and reflected on the day.

Masonic Lodge

Stage One works at the Masonic Lodge continue to move ahead steadily and have now reached an important milestone, with the roof sheeting completed. This is a significant and clearly visible step forward in the project's delivery, bringing the build closer to being fully weather-tight and ready for the next phase of works.



Town Developments

As part of the Austin Street Heritage Project, Jason and Felicity Trevenen of Kaboom Toons are back in town to continue the work on bringing history back to life on Austin Street. As part of the Heritage Project, eight new historically inspired shopfront signs have now been installed, with more to come, reflecting businesses from Cue's early commercial days.



It is disappointing to see the amount of disruption in town recently. We encourage everyone to stay alert, secure your property, and report any suspicious activity to Police. Working together helps keep Cue safe and welcoming for all.

Dog and cat owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their pets contained within the boundaries of their property. Pets must be on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained pets in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Mosquito fogging operations may be undertaken when weather conditions allow. Residents are asked to check their properties and remove any potential mosquito breeding areas, by emptying containers holding water, ensuring gutters are not holding water and checking yards for areas that hold water.

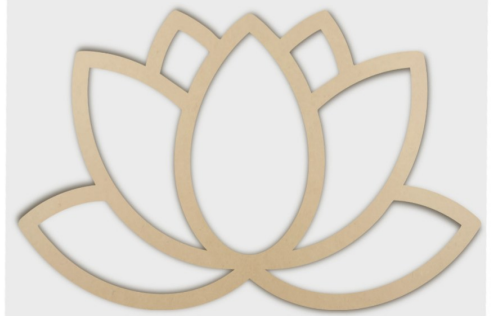
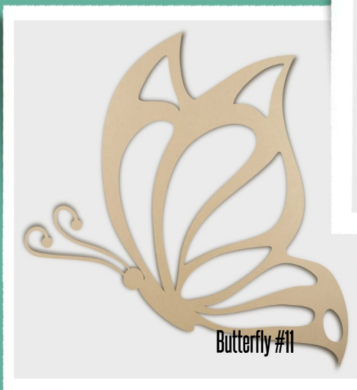

Council News

Hi 'Dryblower' Readers.

April was a hectic month at both the Cue Shire level as well as at the Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA') level. April will also be remembered as a sad month as we learned on 9 April 2026 of the passing of local businessman and Shire Councillor, Ross William Pigdon.

WALGA held its bimonthly Information Forum on 1 April 2026. WALGA CEO. Mr. Nick Sloan presented an update on the Fuel Security concerns raging across the country. Whilst several service stations across the State were struggling to get supply, most Local Governments have been able to manage to receive deliveries but have had to cut back on some operational activities.

Cue has not been impacted to the extent of some other Local Governments; we have been fortunate to have had a continuous supply of fuel. Some of the larger regional distributors have been able to deliver fuel whilst the smaller independent suppliers have been struggling to get fuel to their clients. The price of both diesel and petrol have slowly come down, and it is hoped that this price drop will continue.

I attended WALGA's Selection Committee Meeting on 7 April where State Road Funds to Local Government Advisory Committee (SAC) nominations were considered and recommendations were made for consideration by the Minister.

On 8 April I attended a meeting of the Murchison Regional Vermin Council ('MRVC'), of which the Shire of Cue is a member. CEO Geoff Brookes has done an outstanding job in managing the affairs of the MRVC and provided a review of the finances of the Council and operational matters going forward.

One of the main discussion items was the ongoing maintenance of the new vermin cell, which is the main function of the MRVC. The MRVC is a small Regional Council established in 1963 with the prime function of constructing and maintaining a vermin proof fence for the protection of livestock. At the moment the concentration is around wild dogs which have decimated the sheep and wool industry in the Southern Rangelands. Successful pastoral businesses have a direct impact on local businesses, not to mention the economic value to the State of Western Australia. Therefore, the MRVC has a key role to play in controlling the incursion of wild dogs and other vermin.

On Friday of each week I, along with other regional State Councillors, attend a WALGA/State Government convened Fuel Security Meeting where Fuel Security State Controller, Rob Cossart provides insights from Local Governments that directly inform statewide fuel security and resilience planning.

Council held its monthly Forum on 14 April which provides the Administration and Councillors the opportunity to discuss all aspects of Shire activities, proposed and ongoing projects and progress on operational matters.

I attended WALGA's Honours Panel meeting on 15 April to consider the annual Local Government awards in recognition of the contribution both elected members and officers have made to Local Government across the State. This year we had 78 nominations across 5 categories to consider.

Councillors were invited to attend the Sundowner on 16 April which was held at the WA Bank Building This event is the precursor to the 'Cue Parliament' and provides Councillors and those who attend the opportunity to network with representatives from organisations like Regional Development Australia Mid-West Gascoyne, Mid West Development Commission, Westgold Resources Ltd, Main Roads Geraldton, DFES, WACHS, Water Corporation, Barmingo and local business identities. Representatives from the National and Liberal Parties were also present to engage with the region and the many others who attended the event.

Newly elected WALGA President Mark Irwin and CEO Nick Sloan enjoyed the change of pace from their hectic Local Government activities and attended the Sundowner along with CEO's and Presidents from our six (6) Local Governments who make up the Murchison County Zone of WALGA.

Thanks also go to the Cue Shire Staff for preparing the evening cuisine and making the evening a huge success.



On 17 April the CEO, Richard Towell and I attended the April 2026 meeting of the Murchison Country Zone ('Cue Parliament') which was held in the Cue Sire Council Chambers. Representative from our six (6) Murchison Shires of Meekatharra, Yalgoo, Sandstone, Cue and Mt. Magnet and the Shire of Murchison converged on Cue to discuss issues which impact our local shires and the region in general. The meeting was attended by members of Parliament with Hon Neil Thomson MLC, and Hon Shane Love MLA both providing the meeting with an insight into the activities of the Federal and State Governments. Representatives from various Departments including DFES, MRD, WACHS, Regional Development Australia Mid-West Gascoyne, Water Corporation and Mid-West Development Commission made themselves available.

As usual, the Cue Shire Staff worked tirelessly to make the event a huge success. Thanks also to Helen and staff at the Murchison Club Hotel for putting on the lunch. Rossco Foulkes-Taylor from the Shire of Murchison chaired another successful meeting for the Murchison Country Zone of WALGA.



On 18 April Cr. Jackie Lacy, Cr. Julie Humphreys, CEO Richard Towell and I attended a Governance & CEO Performance Review Training Session hosted by the Shire of Mt. Magnet. The workshop was conducted by Anthony Quahe, Principal Partner in Civic Legal, who provided the meeting with an overview of the roles and responsibilities of Councillors and CEO's along with a detailed review of some of the more recent changes to the Local Government Act 1995 that is now impacting the way we operate. Anthony also provided all attending Councillors with a run down on those areas we are to consider when undertaking the CEO Performance Review.



Shire Council held its usual formal monthly meeting on 21 April where Councillors elected Cr. Ron Hogben as the new Deputy Shire President. We congratulate Ron on his election and thank those who nominated for the position. With the recent passing of former Deputy Shire President Ross Pigdon, an election for the vacant seat around the table will be held at some time in the future. This would present a perfect opportunity for readers to consider nominating for the role.

A further Selection Panel meeting was held on 21 April where nominations were considered for positions on Local Health Authorities Analytical Committee (LHAAC) and WA Local Government Grants Commission (Country Urban - Cities or Towns).

I attended the ANZAC Dawn Service on 25 April where we were fortunate to have two relatives of Arthur Stanley Gurney VC in Kevin Clues (great nephew) and Lorraine Button (great niece) lay a wreath in his honour and for those men and women who lost their lives in the pursuit of freedom for our country. The service has been growing in popularity over recent years with over 200 braving the early morning start. Following the service approximately 80 enjoyed a hearty breakfast put on by Helen from the Murchison Club Hotel.



Ross William Pigdon

Ross was one of the very long time residents of Cue with family, business, Cue Shire Council and regional connections. Ross was proud of Cue, and he didn't mind letting outsiders know of Cue's history and his allegiance to a town he grew up in, lived in and worked in.

Ross dedicated many years of committed service to the Shire of Cue and the wider community, leaving a legacy of leadership, integrity and community pride. Ross was first elected as a Councillor and Deputy Shire President in 1999 where he served until 2005, quickly establishing himself as a strong advocate for the Shire and its residents. Ross then had a break from Council until being re-elected in 2015, and voted in as Shire President, a role he held with distinction until his retirement from Council in 2023. During this period, Ross provided steady leadership through times of change and growth, always guided by a deep respect for Cue's history and its future.

At an extraordinary election in 2024, Ross was re-elected as a Councillor. In a further election in 2025, his fellow Councillors elected him as Deputy Shire President, recognising his experience, sound judgement and unwavering commitment to local government.

A notable achievement during Ross's time as President of the Shire of Cue was the successful purchase of the Masonic Lodge from the National Trust. This is a significant building and was dear to his heart. Ross was the last of the official members of the Cue Lodge living in Cue.

During Ross's time on the Cue Shire Council, he was an active Councillor on the Murchison Regional Vermin Council ('MRVC') where he imparted his extensive local knowledge and assisted in the positive pathway the MRVC has gone down today. His experiences in working on Madoonga Station for Roy Murphy gave him an invaluable insight into the impacts on livestock of vermin and feral animals, particularly wild dogs. This knowledge he brought to the MRVC table.

Ross was also an active Cue Shire Council Elected Member delegate on the Murchison Country Zone of the Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA'). Ross participated in many 'Cue Parliaments' (as the Zone meeting was affectionately referred to) and always with a focus on the Regional benefits surrounding our six (6) member Councils of Mt. Magnet, Sandstone, Meekatharra, Yalgoo, Murchison and Cue.

Ross had a broad sense of focus and responsibility realising in this time of a dwindling regional population and limited political representation that a unified approach would achieve much more for the region than a singular Local Government focus.

On behalf of the Shire of Cue Council, the Murchison Regional Vermin Council and the Murchison Country Zone of WALGA, I extend our sincere thanks to Ross for his selfless contribution, all of which was for the betterment of Cue and the surrounding region.

He will be remembered with gratitude and respect for the significant contribution he made to the town of Cue, the Shire and its community.

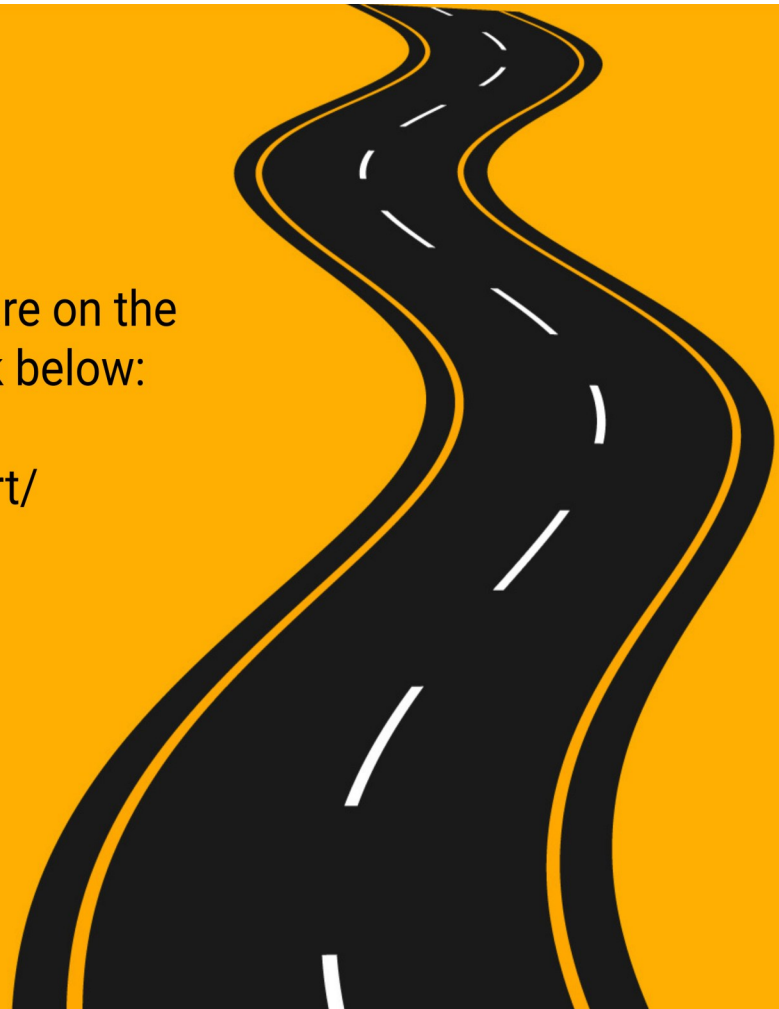
