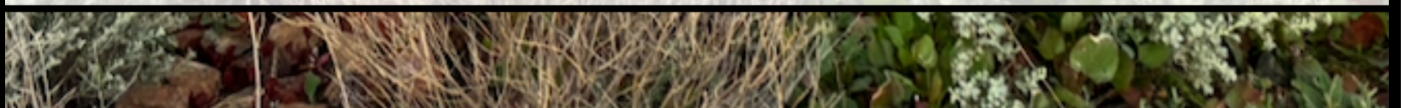

## Welcome to Cue

As we move into the cooler months, Cue continues to welcome travellers, prospectors and visitors from across the country. Whether you are exploring our rich heritage, enjoying the outback landscapes, or spending time in the goldfields, we hope your stay in Cue is both enjoyable and memorable.

For those heading out prospecting or travelling remotely, please remember to prioritise safety. Carry sufficient water, fuel and supplies, let someone know your travel plans, and remain aware of active mining leases and changing weather conditions. Up-to-date road condition information is available on the Shire website at [www.cue.wa.gov.au/roadreport](http://www.cue.wa.gov.au/roadreport). Cue currently continues to have reliable fuel supplies available for travellers.

## Youth Centre

The Shire of Cue Youth Centre has resumed regular afternoon sessions from 2:30pm to 5:00pm, Monday to Thursday and every second Friday, with encouraging attendance averaging around 15 children each day.

## **Community Reminders**

Dog and cat owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their pets contained within the boundaries of their property. Pets must be on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained pets in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Mosquito fogging operations may be undertaken when weather conditions allow. Residents are asked to check their properties and remove any potential mosquito breeding areas, by emptying containers holding water, ensuring gutters are not holding water and checking yards for areas that hold water.

# Council News

---

Hi 'Dryblower' Readers.

The year has gone so quickly, and we are nearly at the end of the 2026 financial year.

There is so much activity at both the Federal and State level with Local Governments across the State coming under continued scrutiny with the appointment in January 2026 of the inaugural Local Government Inspector under the watchful eye of the Hon. Hannah Beazley, Minister for Local Government. It was disappointing to see the Minister provide a negative view of Local Government and announce in the Parliament ....'Members, there is a new cop on the beat to keep elected local government members accountable for their actions'. The Minister went further to suggest there has been a 'period of significant dysfunction and poor governance across the sector.' This reference suggests the 'sector' as a whole is in disarray....not so!

We have 139 Local Governments in Western Australia, and all do their best for their communities. Whilst there are instances of personality conflict, mismanagement, and councillor and Administration behavioural issues across a small number of Local Governments, the sector as a whole is highly functional and responsible. Changes to the Local Government Act have placed a renewed focus on the responsibilities and roles of both Councillors and the Administration.

The Shire of Cue is well administered and has a Council that is genuinely wanting to see progress and development and, whilst we have a divergence of opinion at different times, we are united in wanting the best for our community. To this end Cue has been recognised by the Office of the Auditor General ('OAG') in the last three (3) years as being one of the top twenty (20) Local Governments for high-achieving Councils. In its annual 'Best Practice Entities' list Cue was recognised as having achieved this status by producing timely CEO-certified financial reports, high-quality working papers, minimal control weaknesses, and an unmodified audit opinion. This is a great outcome for our Shire.

The Cue Shire Council is far from *dysfunctional and engaging in poor governance practices!*

May was a busy month at both the Cue Shire level as well as at the Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA') level.

WALGA held its Regional State Council Meeting in Pingelly on 6 -7 May 2026. The Central Country Zone hosted State Council and showcased the region. The Central Zone is made up of 15 Local Governments from the Central Wheatbelt region with Pingelly being one the most prominent.

The Zone Chair, President Cr Des Hickey, welcomed State Council to Pingelly and provided an extensive report on all aspects of Local Government business within the Zone. The Zone is a diverse group covering a large area and has a proud history. There is a real focus on tourism, the environment, preservation of the woodlands regions, the arts, heritage, community engagement and the promotion of events like Woolorama, the Newdegate Field Day and Pingelly Heritage Festival to name a few.





It is always interesting to visit the other parts of the State and hear of the successes and learn of the difficulties that other regional Local Governments are experiencing. We in the Murchison are not alone when it comes to dealing with some of the concerns which include:-

- Staff retention.
- Housing.
- Exemption from some tendering processes.
- Bureaucratic red tape.
- Telecommunication issues.
- Funding for regional development and infrastructure.
- Clearing permits for roads.
- Cost shifting onto Local Governments by the State causing a disproportionate burden on ratepayers.
- Loss of the live sheep export trade has caused serious impacts.
- Community division on windfarm renewable projects

Renewable energy projects involving windfarms have left Central Country Zone Local Governments with a number of issues to deal with which include:-

- Local Governments have little or no say in projects.
- No definite community benefits .
- Loss of farmlands.
- Pressure on existing road networks, services and other resources.
- Community disharmony.
- Long term social impacts.
- Risk and liability to farmers.
- End of project consequences.
- Lifetime legacy. Scarred land and no absolute and complete rehabilitation assurances
- Some wind turbines are located too close to housing.
- Lack of volunteers for emergency services including St. John Ambulance, Fire Brigade, and SES.
- Homelessness.
- Available medical practitioners are on the decline and there is little uptake when positions are announced.

The 15 Local Governments pride themselves on community connection. A major focus is on an '*Ageing Place Project*' to keep older residents 'at home'. This encompasses looking at health and social welfare of older residents and creating support systems and additional services.

Pingelly has a number of attractions to interest tourists. Some of these include '*The Hub - Arts Centre*', *Ninja Park*, *Pump Track*, *Pingelly Heritage Festival*, *Christmas Village*, *Pingelly Museum* (this is an amazing place that has been set up by the community), and a *Community Garden*



The Central Zone presented the Regional Forum to State Councillors which included a briefing on WALGA's Electoral reform Advocacy Position which included compulsory voting and election frequency and retirement of all councillors at the next election. The WA Electoral Commission provided a review of the issues experienced during the last WA State Election. Finally, the Forum was given a presentation on WALGA's 'Employers Value Proposition'.

Westgold Resources Ltd ('Westgold') held its regular Communities Forum at the town hall on 5 May 2026 which was well attended by local residents and visitors alike. Managing Director, Wayne Bramwell provided the forum with an update on the activities of the company at all of its sites in the Cue area and his plans to see the company produce 400,000 ounces of gold per year to become the 7<sup>th</sup> largest gold miner in the country. Westgold are our largest ratepayer and have an extensive business footprint in the Shire.

Again, the Prospectors Association representatives requested Westgold to re-consider gold detecting on its leases. For reasons of safety Westgold was not able to approve access. Wayne was asked to consider a greater contribution towards community benefits and potentially look at a communities fund to provide grants to those with a worthwhile cause or project in mind. There was some discussion around potential tours of one of the company's minesites; for example, Big Bell and the opportunity to set up a shopfront in Austin Street with Westgold providing the equipment, maps, diagrams and other artifacts to be displayed inside the shop.

The Forum ended with a light refreshment provided by the Westgold Camp in Cue.



Council held its monthly Forum on 12 May 2026. The CEO, Richard Towell, provided the Forum with a brief rundown of the shire activities including a review of the ANZAC Service, Murchison Country Zone Meeting ('Cue Parliament') and projects underway in the shire. The CEO also referred to the successful Sundowner held at the Western Australian Bank building and the passing of longtime resident, former President and local businessman Mr. Ross Pigdon.

Other discussion points centred on Bells' Emporium upgrade, the Masonic Lodge project and a review of the Shire's Capital Budget considerations. Councillor apparel is being considered, and an update will be provided in the near future.

I attended a Fuel Security meeting on 15 May 2026. Fuel Security State Controller, Rob Cossart, provided an overview of the current fuel status across the country and the measures that are being put into place to secure diesel and petrol fuels. . The meeting was attended by several regional zone representatives who provided the Controller with an overview of any impacts of fuel shortage on the Agriculture, Mining and Transport industry sectors. There seems to be a steady flow of fuel with prices slowly coming down. Rob Cossart warned that future purchase of fuel may see an increase in prices at the bouser in light of continued unrest in the Middle East.

I chaired WALGA's Environment Team meeting on 18 May 2026. The main items under discussion included:-

- Metropolitan Train Station Precinct Advocacy Position.
- The Planning and Building Performance Monitoring Project.
- National Biosecurity Reforms
- Second generation anticoagulant rodenticides (e.g. to combat the extensive mice plague in Morowa and other Shires)
- Climate Change Advocacy Position

Council held it Ordinary Council Meeting on 19 May 2026 and dealt with several matters some of which included:-

- Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee - appointment of independent presiding member and deputy presiding member. Council approved the appointment of David Price as Chair and former President Steve Manning as Deputy. Changes to the Local Government Act 1995 and Regulations now require all Councils to have an independent member to chair Audit Committee Meetings.
- Council adopted the Shire of Cue's draft 2027 - 2031 Corporate Business Plan.
- Council also adopted the Shire of Cue Code of Conduct for Council Members, Committee Members and Candidates.
- Council approved the Electoral Commissioner to be responsible for the conduct of the 2026
- extraordinary election to be held on 24 September 2026, together with any other elections or polls which may be required. The election will be held by postal vote.

I attended WALGA's Joint Governance and Environment Policy Teams Meeting on 25 May 2026. The Department of Local Government, Industry Regulation and Safety ('LGIRS') has opened consultation on the review of the Cat Act 2011. The review will include registration of cats, enforcement and compliance, sterilisation, microchipping, breeding and cat limits. The meeting endorsed WALGA's submission.

As a follow up to that meeting I also attended the Environment Policy Team Meeting on 25 May 2026. The meeting considered and recommended several items put forward by the Administration which included:-

- Replacement of the existing Climate Change Policy Statement and Advocacy Position with a new Climate Change Advocacy Position.
- Approving WALGA's submission on the National Biosecurity Reforms
- Noting comments on the Exposure Draft of the National environmental Standard for environmental Offsets.
- Approved WALGA's submission on Proposed Restrictions on the use of Second Generation Anticoagulant Rodenticides.

WALGA represents all 139 Local Governments across the State and advocates a sector position on all significant matters that come before it. In light of the number of positions that require State Council approval it is logistically impossible to call the Council together to approve each position. Instead, WALGA has created an approval process for State Council by way of a 'Flying Minute'. These are recommendations that are considered online rather than around the table. During May 2026 State Council considered and approved the following Flying Minutes:-

- WALGA Submission on the Exposure Draft of the National Standard for Matters of national Environmental Significance (MNES).
- State Hazard Plan Hostile Act - WALGA Draft Submission

And finally, The Shire of Cue put on a fantastic evening with the stage show 'Catalpa'. The event was well attended by local residents and visitors who all enjoyed a light meal and refreshments including a little wine to go with the meal. The event gave some councillors the opportunity to switch off from the usual Council duties and enjoy an evening out. Thanks go to the CEO and Staff for arranging this event.



Over time you will receive information and Public Notices on the upcoming extraordinary election of one (1) council position. Your community needs good representation, and I ask readers to give consideration to nominating. It's an important and fulfilling role and your input would be most welcomed.

Readers, as usual, I welcome your views on any matter you consider important and am open to hearing any suggestions you might like to see in my monthly 'Dryblower' article. It is important you are aware of the constant flow of activity that comes with running a Council and our interactions with WALGA, where we are represented at the State and Federal level of Government. It is essential we work together as a community for the betterment of the town, you as residents and those visitors who stay in or simply pass through Cue.

Please feel free to contact myself or any of the other Councillors if you have a matter you need to bring to the attention of Council and the Administration. Council is always looking to the community to provide input into the future direction of our town.

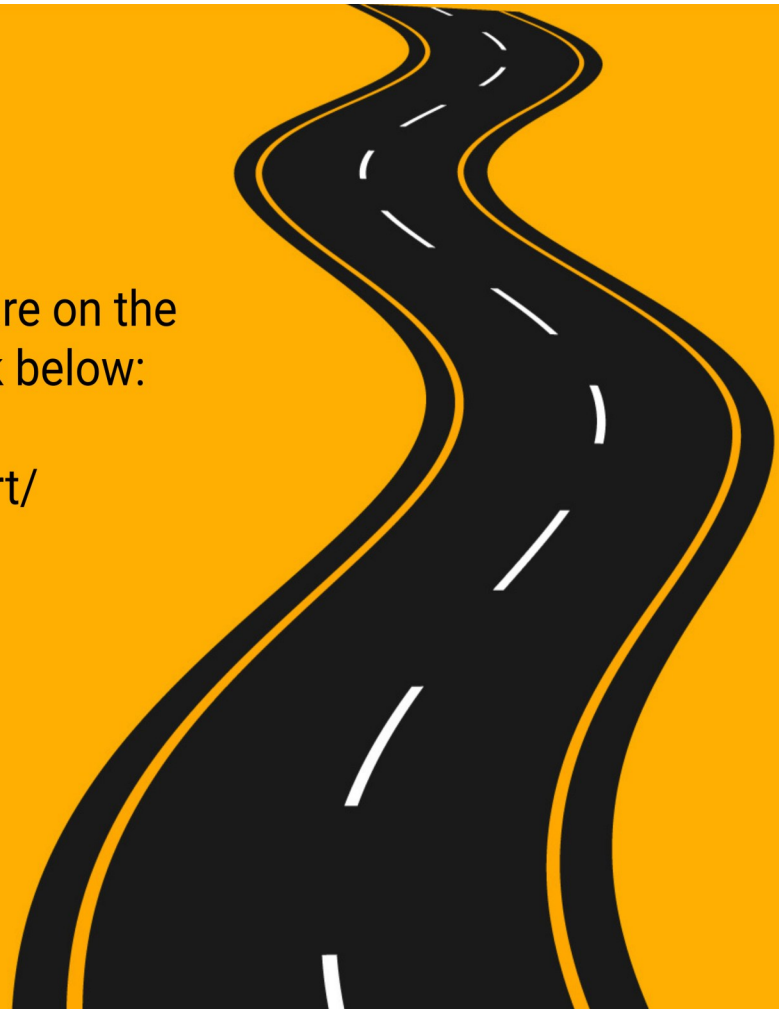
