Special Council Meeting

A Special Council Meeting was held on 7 July to consider responses received to three Requests for Quote advertised through the WALGA Vendor Panel.

The quote submitted by HC Construction for Masonic Lodge Stage 2 works was accepted by Council, as was the quote they submitted for renovation and repair works at Bell's Emporium. HC Construction are currently finalising the Masonic Lodge Stage 1 works and will remain in Cue to commence this newly awarded work.

A quote submitted by Catwest for asphalt surfacing works at the intersection of Lakeside Road and Miners Pass as well as a section of Beringarra Road was also accepted at the meeting.

Community Reminders

Dog and cat owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their pets contained within the boundaries of their property. Pets must be on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained pets in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner. The only authorised area within the townsite where dogs are permitted to be exercised off leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.

Mosquito fogging operations may be undertaken when weather conditions allow. Residents are asked to check their properties and remove any potential mosquito breeding areas, by emptying containers holding water, ensuring gutters are not holding water and checking yards for areas that hold water.

Nominations Requirements

Candidates are required to lodge with the Returning Officer:

- The Commission's preferred method for candidates to nominate is through the Commissions Nomination Builder. This tool assists candidates in completing their nomination form, including their profile and additional information. The Nomination Builder can be accessed via www.lgportal.waec.wa.gov.au/noms. Candidates can complete their nomination details and profile, print the completed form with the allocated nomination ID, and lodge it with the Returning Officer. Alternatively, a copy of the prescribed nomination form is available from the Returning Officer or via www.elections.wa.gov.au/Candidate-Information
- a single A4 page profile of not more than 1,000 characters (including spaces) containing information about the candidate;
- a nomination deposit of \$100 (cash, EFT, bank cheque or postal order);
- a recent passport-sized photograph (optional);
- every candidate must complete the online course titled *Local Government Candidate Induction*, available at [Induction for Prospective candidates | LGIRS candidates](#), prior to nominating and provide the course code on the nomination form; and
- in addition to the candidates A4 profile, Candidate can provide additional information that they consider to be relevant to their candidature. This written statement cannot be more than 2,000 characters (including spaces), must be in the English language and is for publication on the local government's official website only. (optional)

Please Note:

Where an agent lodges a nomination on a candidate's behalf, it must be in the prescribed form with a written authorisation signed by the candidate. The documents may be hand delivered or posted to the Returning Officer and must be received by the close of nominations.

Council News

Hi 'Dryblower' Readers.

The new year is underway, and Council has been busy with the 2026/2027 Budget and the setting of rates for the forthcoming year.

With a number of new projects in the pipeline 2026/2027 is going to be a busy year.

On 1 July I attended the Western Australian Local Government Association ('WALGA') State Council meeting. As is usual practice, State Council held its Strategic Forum which preceded the main meeting and provides an opportunity for Councillors to listen to presentations from various stakeholders on issues that are impacting the Local Government Sector.

The Commissioner for Fire and Emergency Services, Daren Klemm, provided an update on key topics that included:-

- Resourcing and Capacity for bushfire mitigation.
- Local Government Grants Scheme reform and effective funding for Bush Fire Brigades.
- Emergency Services legislation
- Work health and safety obligations for Bush Fire Brigade Volunteers, noting the significant resourcing and capacity constraints.
- Changes proposed by the Australian Government to the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements.



The Forum also received a presentation from Nudge CEO, Mairead Connolly. Nudge is a not-for-profit that gives personalised advice and tailored support to young people looking to kickstart their careers and employers looking for trainees to participate in traineeship work. Of importance, Mairead provided an overview on how Nudge could work with Local Government.

The Forum also considered proposed amendments to WALGA's Corporate Governance Charter following a workshop designed to thoroughly review and update the Charter where necessary. For the most part, there was consensus amongst participants with a few additional amendments being put forward, which again received general support.

President Mark Irwin and WALGA CEO Nick Sloan each provided a report on their current activities. Mark has continued to be a proactive leader of WALGA and is always open to suggestions and ideas to advance the cause of Local Government while Nick is heavily

invested in the sector and continues to advocate for Local Government on the many issues that come before the Association.

The State Council meeting then considered a number of matters which included:-

Developing a Climate Change Advocacy Position. Climate Change has been somewhat of a contentious issue with the net zero target by 2050 set by the Federal Government being considered by some to be an unattainable goal. State Council agreed that WALGA will advocate to the Australian and Western Australian Governments to:

- Provide the necessary climate leadership, coordination and action to ensure an orderly transition to achieve emission reduction targets and address the impacts of climate change.
- Ensure that Local Government has the funding, guidance and practical support required to meet increasing risk and expanded legislative requirements to plan for, mitigate and adapt to climate impacts.

State Council considered and approved the *Train Stations Precinct Advocacy Position* and supports a coordinated approach to the planning and development of train station precincts that is transport-orientated, place responsive and provides for increased housing density and diversity.

State Council approved a submission in response to the Department of Local Government, Industry Regulation and Safety (LGIRS) opened consultation on the second statutory review of the *Cat Act*

2011 (the Cat Act). The submission identifies the need to consolidate the Cat Act and Dog Act 1976 and strengthen compliance provisions, clarifying definitions of owned and unowned cats, developing a Model Cat Local Law, limiting cat numbers, and lowering the age of sterilisation.

On 13 July I attended the Environment Advisory Group Meeting. The environment portfolio is very demanding and covers a wide range of activity which includes:-

- Planning and Building
- Environment and Waste

Some of the more significant issues considered by the team centred on:-

- *Planning and Building Performance Monitoring Projects* across Local Governments designed to collect a range of data on Local Government planning and building regulatory functions and seeks to provide a representative and evidence based analysis of the performance of the sector.
- Submission on *Exposure Draft of the National Environmental Standard for Matters of National Environmental Significance (MNES)*. The Australian Government is developing five (5) new National Environmental Standards as part of its reforms to the Environment Protection and Biosecurity Conservation Act 1999 (EPBC Act). WALGA's submission provides general support with key recommendations focusing on establishing a robust bilateral process with jurisdictions.
- Submission on *Proposed Restrictions For Second Generation Anticoagulant Rodenticides*. The Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (DAFF) is proposing to declare certain rodenticides as restricted chemical products. WALGA's submission calls for a review of emergency use permits, clarification of authorised user eligibility and a Government led public education program on best practice pest control.

- The *H5N1 strain of the contagious bird flu* has now hit Australian shores with many cases being reported here in Western Australia. The disease has been caused by migratory birds that have rested on our shores during times of offshore storms which interrupted the migration pattern. This is the same strain that has caused mass mortality in poultry, wild birds and sea mammals in other countries. At this stage there is no evidence of spread to other wildlife or poultry in Australia. As of July 30, 2026, there is no evidence of H5N1 bird flu spreading to commercial poultry, captive birds, or other livestock anywhere in Australia. Detections remain limited to a small number of wild seabirds (such as giant petrels and terns), with no signs of mass wildlife impacts.

The meeting also considered the shortage of building surveyors in the Local Government Sector being amongst the hardest positions to fill. WALGA is advocating in discussions with State Government Agencies and Ministers to increase recruitment into the building surveyor profession, including funding for support education and professional development particularly focusing on ensuring the Advanced Diploma of Building Surveying TAFE course is established.



In the hope of easing the housing shortage the Western Australian Government recently announced significant reforms to the *Residential Design Codes (R-Codes)* to modernise the planning framework and include:-

- Enabling development and subdivision potential from 900 square metre blocks to 700 square metres.
- Reducing statutory timeframes for single house approval to 30 and 60 days.
- Extending the scope of exemptions to reduce the number of development applications.
- Removing minimum parking requirements for apartments and granny flats.

I also attended a Joint Environment and Governance Policy Teams Meeting to discuss the submission on the Cat Act Review, which was considered and approved by State Council as outlined above. Cats are a major threat to many species of fauna with some species on the verge of extinction. Control of these animals is critical if we are to preserve wildlife.



Council held its monthly forum on 14 July and received a report from Acting CEO Lisa Keen on the activities of the Shire. The Forum received a report on the various projects underway within the Shire which included:-

- **The Old Goal** - this project has been ongoing for some time with a few remaining tasks to be completed.
- Painting to be finalised.
- Doors to be repaired- Shutters to be addressed.
- Original hinges to be retained.
- Hinge installation and finalisation to be completed.

Masonic Lodge - Phase 1 of this project is progressing well with tiling, inner walls and interior sheeting is well underway. White goods and benches have arrived and lock up stage almost completed.

Transfer Station - A review is being undertaken to ensure the Cue Landfill is EPA compliant. This includes:-

Asbestos Management File - Recording sheets and process when dealing with asbestos and clinical waste at Cue Landfill site.

Daily Recording File - Record keeping and return process of all vehicles utilising the Cue Landfill site. Management and Regulation File - Outlining EPA (Landfill) Regulations, Shire of Cue Management and Rehabilitation Plan, also including current outstanding actions.

65 Austin Street Building (main street of Cue) - Work is progressing with this project with roof trusses having been erected in the southern shop. The electrical power box and earth lines have been re-connected and are awaiting Horizon inspection. The aged floorboards are being processed for laying.

Bell's Emporium - Roof replacement has begun on the building with the rear shed now cleaned out ready for work inside the Emporium. The rear of the building has been cleaned up and the inside progressing.



On 17 July a Special Meeting of Council was held to consider the following quotations:-

Masonic Lodge Stage 2 - Renovation and repair works to the existing structure.

Bell's Emporium - Renovation and repair works to the existing structure on Tenancy 1 and Tenancy 2.

Asphalt Surfacing Works - Maintenance and upgrade of various sections of the Shire's road network.

Council agreed to accept the quotation from HC Construction Services Pty Ltd for the Masonic Lodge at a cost of \$774,018.20 (including GST) and for Bell's emporium at a cost of \$549,714.00 (including GST) with work on both projects to commence very soon.

Council also accepted the quote from Catwest for \$422,095.30 to undertake work on various parts of the Shire's road network.

On completion of the Masonic Lodge and Bell's Emporium Cue will have further strengthened its reputation for maintaining valuable historic buildings.

Council held its monthly meeting on 21 July 2026 with a minimal number of matters to be considered.

Council resolved to reschedule the meeting date on 15 September to 22 September, commencing at 6.00pm. The proposed change is required due to elected members attendance at the 2026 WALGA Local Government Convention being held between 16-18 September 2026.

The revised meeting date will be published on the Shire of Cue's official website and advertised to the community. All other Ordinary Council Meeting dates adopted by Council on 16 September 2025 will remain unchanged.

There are a number of other matters afoot which will come before Council in due course which are currently being handled by the CEO, MR. Richard Towell who is away on annual leave.

The usual financial reports were presented to Council, and it was resolved to receive the payments for the period 1 June 2026 - 30 June 2026 and the monthly Financial Reports. The Agenda and Minutes of the meeting can be located using the following link:-
